# **Mayor's Newton Update**



### **Save This Summer With Newton Power Choice**

Good news: Newton Power Choice is less expensive even at 100% Green than Eversource's new summer prices.

Eversource just asked the Massachusetts
Department of Public Utilities (DPU) to approve new
electric supply rates for residential customers for
July 1 through December 31, 2023. We expect the
DPU to approve these or similar rates.

Eversource's request to the DPU is for 16.08 cents per kWh.

This is higher than Newton Power Choice (NPC) prices under our existing NPC contract:

- NPC Standard: 13.45 cents per kWh (the default rate—what you pay if you take no action, includes 84% renewable power).
- NPC 100% Green: 14.36 cents per kWh (an opt-up rate, with 100% renewables).
- NPC Basic: 10.65 cents per kWh (an opt-down rate, with the State minimum level of renewables, which is 22% this year).

So, NPC is less expensive even at 100% Green than Eversource's summer prices. We know that Eversource's winter prices are always more expensive than its summer prices.

To avoid confusion:

• These prices refer only to the electric *supply* portion of your electricity bill, which is about half the bill. (The rest of the bill covers mostly delivery costs.)

 A few days ago, I announced a new NPC contract. The prices referred to in this message are about this summer's prices under the existing NPC contract, not about the new NPC contract which starts in January 2024.

#### Also remember:

You'll save money if you use less energy. Don't overcool your home; do operate major appliances during the cooler parts of the day; and, keep blinds and curtains closed when it's hot out. If you are on a tight budget, there are opportunities for financial assistance with electricity bills. Customers with low incomes may qualify for Eversource's low-income rate, which provides a discount of approximately one-third. ## FY 2024 City of Newton Budget Approved

The City Council last night unanimously approved my proposed \$570,016,326 City of Newton Budget for Fiscal Year 2024 which begins on July 1.

To each and every City Councilor, your voices were heard. You make a difference in how I think, how I strategize, and how I try to lead.

I want to thank Interim Superintendent Kathy Smith, Assistant Superintendent Liam Hurley and Sean Manion, as well as the Assistant Superintendents, Principals and so many other NPS staff for their thoughtfulness and hard work that went into crafting an override package, and then when the operating override failed, in reimagining the school budget yet again. They've been amazing.

They've been supported in their work by an incredibly hardworking School Committee. Curriculum, pedagogy, delivering academic excellence, educational equity, social and emotional supports - the School Committee is right in the center of it. I thank them.

Each year the City Council hears from the heads of each City department who outline their goals and answer questions about their proposed budgets. I love that this year they heard from Mignonne Murray, a first timer as Director of Senior

In between, Councilors heard from so many good, thoughtful, hardworking and caring Department Heads and the staffs behind them. They're here day after day after day. They will now do the hard work to implement what is contained in the budget that just passed, and they will continue to do so to the best of their ability.

I want to thank the people who live here and work here and pay all our taxes, the people that fuel the work that we do. It's you that we're all trying to serve.

In Newton, we have a really engaged community. We hear from so many of you. Keep it up, keep sending the emails and letters, keep calling. I'll ask, sometimes please be a little more gentle. We hear you even if it's a quiet touch rather than a loud noise.

With the amazing leadership of the School Committee and the City Council, we will work through our fiscal constraints, and we'll meet the challenges of our times – zoning and housing, transportation and roads, education and human services, policing and firefighting, and climate change. We're right in the thick of it, and there's no place else in the world I'd rather be doing this work.

Thank you to the City Council for passing the FY 2024 Budget.
