Biography

Ruth has devoted her 30-year career to the environment, youth leadership development and experiential education, both in the philanthropic and non-profit sectors. Beginning with 15 years in outdoor education, primarily at the Outward Bound Schools in Canada, Ruth worked extensively with young people from diverse backgrounds, including First Nations and court involved teens, as well as adults recovering from trauma. Returning to the U.S. in 1998, she began a career in philanthropy, serving as the Merck Family Fund's Program Officer where she oversaw a \$1.2 million portfolio dedicated to revitalizing urban communities through youth leadership and open space projects. From 2004 - 2011, while her children were young, Ruth was an independent consultant to non-profits, foundations and philanthropic networks, managing projects that addressed critical urban environmental issues including food systems, green infrastructure, sustainable communities, and the role of urban youth in the emerging green economy.

In 2011, Ruth re-joined the Merck Family Fund where she is the Program Officer for the Urban Agriculture and Youth Leadership program and the special initiative on Democracy. She is also a program consultant to the Ajana Foundation. Ruth is steeped in food system, environmental justice and climate issues across New England, New York, Pennsylvania and North Carolina and has a strong working knowledge of the youth development and education sectors.

Ruth has been active as a volunteer in Newton since her children were young, first as PTO at the Bowen School, and then on the 2013 Override, as well as several affordable housing campaigns. Ruth was elected to the Newton School Committee in 2013 and served from 2014 – 2022, as Vice-Chair in 2016 and as Chair from 2017 – 2022.
