Re: Citywide Streetlight LED Conversion

The Administration is seeking an appropriation to undertake the replacement of approximately 8,400 streetlights with new, energy efficient Light Emitting Diode (LED) lights. Newton last undertook a full-scale light replacement in 2006, switching out mercury vapor lights in favor of high pressure sodium lights. These high pressure sodium lights are reaching the end of their useful lives (we are replacing 80-100 lights per month) and replacing them with LED fixtures will save considerable electricity and labor costs.

<u>Costs</u>

The City issued an IFB for the labor to switch over the 8,400 lights, as well as an RFP for the supply of lights. We received six responses for each part of the project. The lowest bidders in each category have been determined to be responsive and we are developing contracts now. We are also asking for funding to cover police details we will require for certain roads.

	Cost
8,425 lights of various wattages	\$1,139,000
Labor to install 8,400 lights in three months	\$386,000
Police details	\$25,000

The cost of this project is further reduced as we have received a Green Communities grant for \$250,000, and will be receiving an incentive from NStar of at least \$454,000.

Savings

The new LED lights emit much more light per watt, allowing dramatic energy savings. We also expect to save a consider amount on maintenance, as the lights will be warrantied for 10 years but have useful lives of 100,000 hours, or about 23 years.








Energy Use by Component







I respectfully request the Finance Committee's consideration of appropriation of \$69,617.69 to complete installation of a stormwater management system for Hammond Pond.

BACKGROUND

As part of a 2009 "Hammond Pond Stormwater Management Fund Agreement," dated September 21, 2009, Chestnut Hill Shopping Center, LLC, S.R. Weiner Associates, Inc. (The Street), and Star Markets Company, Inc. agreed to establish a fund under the City of Newton's control for the purpose of installing stormwater treatment devices on two pipes running through the shopping center property and discharging into Hammond Pond. This agreement was a condition of a Special Permit that was granted to the above mentioned parties on December 15, 2003 (Board Order No. 401-03) when improvements to the shopping center were approved by the Board. The fund created under this agreement made \$150,000 available

towards these stormwater improvements and this money was received by the City in November 2012. At this time, the City is prepared to move forward with installation of a treatment device on the second of the two pipes and is seeking approval of an appropriation of \$69,617.69 out of the \$150,000 received.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The City Planning Department and the Engineering Division propose to install a "Vortechnic" unit within the parking lot of The Street and in line with the DCR-owned 24-inch pipe that runs from the Hammond Pond Parkway to Hammond Pond. City staff will oversee the installation process, coordinating with the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) and the property owner, both of which have approved the proposed project. DCR will be responsible for future maintenance of the system and is working with the property owner to secure the necessary easement. The work will be performed by the same contractor who completed the first phase of this project under a contract extension agreement.

The requested funds will be used to pay for necessary site planning design work (\$4,000) as well as the acquisition and installation of the "Vortechnic" treatment device. Any remaining funds will be returned to the shopping center as per the requirements of the Board Order and Agreement. While the funds requested should be sufficient to complete this project, there is also the possibility that environmental conditions on the site, for example the presence of "ledge" or the need for extensive "dewatering," could bring the total cost to exceed the remaining funds. DCR has agreed to cover any additional costs that may arise.
