<u>NOTE</u>: Commissioner of Public Buildings Josh Morse reviewed the request for \$275,000 for funding to continue with the feasibility study and schematic design up to site plan approval for Fire Station #3 (Willow Street) and Fire Headquarters. The Board of Aldermen approved funding for the initial feasibility study for Station #10 (Dedham Street), Station #3, and headquarters in 2012. Portions of those funds were used to complete programming and staffing studies at headquarters and Station #3.

The logistics of the fire station and headquarters site are difficult. There is an aqueduct located on the headquarters site and both sites are bound by a hair salon. The city has met with the Massachusetts Water Resource Authority and learned that access to the aqueduct must be maintained for maintenance purposes. The Administration is currently in the early stages of discussion with the property owner of the salon site but nothing has been decided. The additional funds will narrow down the options for Station #3 and fire headquarters such as entering and exiting the fire station onto Centre Street to improve response time. The funds will also be used to look at the possibility of phased construction to eliminate the need for a temporary station and headquarters during construction. Chief Proia stated that there is not really an appropriate site in Newton Centre for a temporary station and it is very important to maintain fire response times in that area.

The feasibility study will also look at how to best utilize the land with the future of Newton Centre's development in mind. The headquarters building is listed on the National Register of historic buildings and the City itself has designated the building as historically

significant. A number of critical emergency functions are located in the headquarter building including the emergency operations center, the emergency communication center and the alarm transmitting equipment. Much of the equipment is required by building code to be housed in a seismically reinforced building. Therefore, the Administration is looking to preserve the headquarters building but remove those functions from the building.

Current Project Manager Adam Gilmore and Commissioner Morse will provide updates to the Board of Aldermen and will continue to involve the Ward Aldermen in the project plans. The feasibility study portion of the project is expected to take approximately six months and construction should begin at the end of Fiscal Year 2015. Ald. Fuller moved approval, which carried unanimously.

NOTE: Public Buildings Commissioner Josh Morse explained that the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) has voted to invite the Cabot School to participate in the eligibility period of its process for school construction. The Administration would like authorization to bond \$1 million for the feasibility study and schematic design for the Cabot Elementary School. The cost of the study and design is estimated to be the same as the cost for the Zervas School feasibility study and schematic design. The costs of the feasibility studies and schematic for the Zervas and Cabot Schools are in line with what other communities are spending. It is anticipated that the \$1 million will be bonded for five years but the Administration may revisit the funding source.

The Cabot School site has unique challenges such as an aqueduct that runs under the existing modular classrooms. In addition, there was an underground storage tank leak on the site that was reported in 1990. The site was cleaned up and the Department of Environmental Protection has declared the site clean. However, the City should anticipate the need for additional testing during feasibility to ensure that the site is clean and that there are no surprises. The feasibility study will look at all the options for the school including renovation and replacement. Ald. Linsky moved approval, which carried by a vote of four in favor and none opposed.

NOTE: Police Captain Marc Gromada presented the request for authorization to expend a reimbursable grant to purchase software and equipment to develop an analytical graphic interface to enhance traffic accident reporting. The software would enable police officers to enter information on a mobile device about traffic accidents at the scene of the accident, which will improve report accuracy and level of detail entered into the accident database. In addition, the new software would give the police the ability to map out accidents and access accident information from mobile devices. The software is also capable of allowing the Police Department to interface with other departments.

Ald. Fuller moved approval of the grant expenditure, which carried unanimously.

NOTE: The Chairman began the discussion by voicing his support of the increase of the overnight parking fine from \$5 to \$25. The Public Safety & Transportation Committee has not discussed the request for the increase but could hold a special meeting before the next full Board to take the item up and if an action were taken the item could be voted at the next full Board.

The overnight parking permit program to provide relief for residents with a hardship has not been established; however, a \$5 ticket is not enough of a deterrent to stop people from parking overnight. The administrative cost of issuing a \$5 ticket likely exceeds the fine resulting in a cost to the City. By implementing the increase in February, there will be time to advertise the increase and give people an opportunity to find legal overnight parking options.

Ald. Fuller has a number of questions but would like to have the full discussion of the item in the Public Safety and Transportation Committee.; therefore, she will abstain from the vote. Ald. Blazar moved approval of the item, which carried by a vote of three in favor and one abstention.

NOTE: Comptroller David Wilkinson presented the item to the Committee. The Administration committed any additional State Chapter 70 Education Funding received from the State to the School Department. Money (\$106,122) received from the Fiscal Year 2013 homeless transportation funding was applied to the City's General Fund instead of the School Department's budget and the City received \$430,627 in addition, Chapter 70 Cherry Sheet Aid.

Therefore, the Administration is requesting that the \$536,749 be transferred to the School Department.

There was a question about how the School Department would use the additional funds. It was explained that it is up to the School Committee how the funds would be used. With that, Ald. Fuller moved approval, which carried unanimously.

NOTE: The item is a request for a Resolution to the Mayor requesting that he initiate the process to adopt Chapter 59 Section 5C of Massachusetts General Law to provide up to a 20% tax exemption for owner occupied residences. Director of Assessing Elizabeth Dromey reviewed the attached presentation that was provided at the recent Tax Classification Public Hearing. Ms. Dromey explained that if the residential exemption is adopted, the total amount of taxes paid by the residential properties will not change and the residential tax rate will increase. However, the total amount of taxes paid by residential properties is shifted resulting in some residential properties paying fewer taxes and some paying more. If a property is assessed at more than the City's average assessment, the taxes will go up, but if it assessed at less than the average the taxes will go down. In addition, the exemption would apply to all residential properties including day cares, group homes, senior housing and vacant unbuildable land. There is no asset or income limit on who receives the exemption and it would be applied to all owneroccupied residential parcels in the City. Commercial properties would not be impacted by the acceptance of the law. Thirteen of the State's 351 cities and towns have adopted the exemption since its inception in the early 1980s. Ms. Dromey provided the attached list of communities that have accepted the legislation and a breakdown of the different types of residential properties in the City with the impact of the legislation to each type of property.

Ald. Hess-Mahan docketed the item because after the most recent override, a number of constituents expressed interest in acceptance of the local property tax exemption. Ald. Yates and Linsky also voiced their support of the requested Resolution. Ald. Hess-Mahan would like to hear from the Administration whether they intend to request adoption of the law. The Chair stated that he has spoken with the Administration and it is his understanding that at this time they have no intention of filing for the adoption. Ald. Hess-Mahan stated that if the Administration is not interested in pursuing adoption of Chapter 59, Section 5C, he is willing to accept that the item could be voted no action necessary.

A number of Committee members were concerned that the exemption did not include any income or asset test. Although there is not a perfect correlation, it would make the exemption more equitable. In addition, taxes would increase for group homes, senior housing, and day cares, which does not seem equitable. Ald. Fuller moved no action necessary, which carried by a vote of five in favor and one opposed.


