MEETING MINUTES May 5, 2022

• Farm Operations and Q1 Financial Review

- CSA sold out all 80 shares.
- New hires: Asst. Grower, High School Intern Supervisor, and Farm Stand/Field Crew we are fully staffed
- We have 10 high school interns and we have committed to 7 of them so far
- The pick-up truck was a total loss in a black ice accident it did not have collision insurance due to its age and mileage
- Field planting carrots, beans, leeks, broccoli, onions, chard and harvesting chard.
 Changed the variety of broccoli to a more resilient one that harvests earlier
- Board has grown by three new members.
- Participating in Newton Art in Bloom in the Fall
- Commercial refrigerator broke. Repair was the same as replace so we replaced.
 Replacement cost was approximately \$4,000. This was done in April, so it is not on the Q1 reporting
- Staff participated in Uprooting Racism Training. We are working on our equity statement and short- & long-term goals.
- The Q1 numbers don't mean much yet because it's the slowest time of year

Fundraising

 Awarded a grant from MDAR – most equipment has been purchased. It will be finalized by June

- Grant from State Department of Agriculture & Energy Office of \$22k to for HVAC in both greenhouses and installing gas. We have until next summer to complete
- Corporate Volunteering Program Wegmans has done 1 of 3 volunteer visits. Cost is \$500 for up to six people to do farm work
- Spring appeal not a large response yet, but our goal of 1 new major donor was met -- \$5k.
 We will be reaching out to our other donors

• Education Operations & Other Activities (Seedling Sale)

- Seedling sale May 14 & 15 12:00-5:00. A record 27,000 seedlings. Volunteers needed
- Doing a menu of options to choose from for organizations/schools that want to work with us
- Matt, Director of Education, has visited the JCC, Solomon Schechter Day School, Newton Housing Authority and Newton Neighbors Helping Neighbors to start pollinator gardens and work with seniors that need help
- Seed has been planted with different pre-schools to do some pre-school programs
- Countryside Elementary possible field trip in the fall
- o Burr School school garden
- o Roslindale Farmers Market education for kids this summer
- Beethoven School in Boston to have possible program there
- We have reached out to several private schools
- o Readying the Learning Garden new composting system, pollinator garden, etc.
- Hired and Assistant Garden Educator for the summer Tomako Deeney she is also docent at the Arnold Arboretum
- Cancellation of spring break classes due to instructor COVID illness refunds made to all 12 students
- Education displays around town library and bank
- Earth Day Festival drew a large crowd
- YMCA Healthy Kids Fair May 6 & 7
- Adult Programming mushroom growing class and cooking classes
- Summer enrollment is down, but looking at different marketing strategies to increase enrollment
- Produce Donation Program Donated \$12k worth of produce LY. This year we have had a commitment of \$3k. Hoping to receive more funds to underwrite the program. \$2500 from Brookline Bank. Don't normally have excess produce, but restaurant purchasing demand has been down the last two years and we are using that surplus for donation
- Newton Food Pantry received a list from them to grow needed, culturally relevant crops for donation

New Greenhouse Installation

 Attempted to hire an outside company, but none were available until the end of the year so we will be doing it ourselves. Installing the exterior plastic May 6th and the utilities will be put in place to heat and ventilate.

• CPA Grant & Update

- o City Council still needs to vote on it
- Setting up meeting with facilities to start the project
- \$88k used for basement water issue, replace HVAC, electrical replacement, kitchen ceiling replacement
- May need to set aside a bit to house the family if needed
- Roof replacement has already been completed because it was an emergency

Solar Installation Update

- Solar Grant received extension for another year due to supply chain issues for the battery
- o NHC approved it. Finance accepted the grant plus \$20k form city's Energy Stabilization Fund. City Council approved
- Resonant Energy will be the project manager
- There is a bid out for a contractor

Meeting Minutes from February 3, 2022

A motion was made to approve of minutes by Beth Wilkinson. This motion was duly seconded by Jim Harper. This motion passed 6-0.

Traffic Issues

- Nahanton Street traffic more large trucks since the redo of the I-95 exchange by Muzi Ford. Issues include – noise from jake brakes, increased beeping/honking, accidents, running of red lights, construction/Brookline dump runs. It is often the same trucks. Police details have been ticketing but can't be here all of the time.
- Inquiries regarding MA & Newton jake brake laws for signage, MA & Newton noise ordinances, limiting size/weight of trucks, re-routing trucks
- o Reach out to Traffic Council to see if traffic study can be done
- Reach out to ISD to see if construction is staying within permitted noise allowance
