

Fred Guzzi and Martina Jackson were present to request that the Newton ordinances Sec.17-11(2) specifically Common Victualler License fee in the city of Newton be increased from \$50.00 to \$100.00 beginning immediately upon any establishment that is seeking a Common Victualler license in the city.

According to Fred Guzzi there are about two thousand Common Victualler licenses from sandwich shops to supermarkets to golf course dining areas. These licenses are renewable on an annual basis. Attached to the Finance Committee Agenda was a list of other communities and the various charges for Common Victualler licenses in these cities and towns. The Committee had some concern because there were two communities that had over a \$100.00 charge and we were told that the state law had a limit of \$100.00. In passing, the item there was a request that Fred Guzzi check into the other communities and find out on how they were able to exceed the \$100.00 cap.

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NOTE:

The sum of \$8,800 in order to fund some additional work associated with the audit function, which was completed by Sullivan, Rogers & Company, LLC this year. Unfortunately, there was a requirement that the city auditors who audited two additional federal grant programs in 2007 had a change order to be executed with the contract with the auditors and there was a single audit fee of \$4,400 for each of these additional grants.

There was as many as seven of these types of grants that will have to funded in the next audit and the committee briefly reviewed the fact that some of these federal programs are also programs where other communities participate. In the school department in three of them there are actual the grant recipient. It is the recommendation thru the Finance Committee, through the Chair that the home subsidy program and the special grant funds that are received by the school department reimburse the city through the audit requirements in order for them to receive those grants.

Finance Committee and Finance Audit Subcommittee proposed contract extensions with Sullivan, Rogers & Company, LLC. The Finance Committee voted to approve the transfer of funds to pay for these two additional audits.



NOTE:

Tom Daley and Dave Turocy were present this evening to present this docket item request. An assessment dated March 7, 2008 was attached to the report which was a summary given to the committee by Mr. Turocy.

The money in addition to the original appropriation of \$920,740.00 and \$1.2 million in supplemental requests has been spent in the Public Works Department. The Public Works Department submitted a spreadsheet, which shows amounts





expended, encumbered, and processed as of March 6, 2008 totaling \$2,929,65.00 this expense includes contract plowing for nine events. The Department of Public Works made the cost for all snow and ice activity and expenses including sand and salt.

According to Mr. Turocy, the cost of the snow removal for this year has exceeded the current appropriation by \$835,000.00 the additional \$675,000.00 request will be used against those expenses. There may be a request for an additional appropriation if there are any additional snow events before the end of the year.

Ald. Coletti asked Mr. Turocy that this year we did not have a significant inch total relative to the snow, which would justify what typically, is our average expenditure, which is \$3 million in the year when snow totals usually exceed seventy inches. Ald. Coletti requested that Mr. Turocy look at two to three previous years where the city spent \$3 million and attempt to compare the number of inches in snowfall that we had that year. Mr. Turocy stated the city has spent over \$1 million dollars this year in salt and sand. He believes there is an excessive need this year for funding salt and sand that is exacerbated by a 25% increase in the cost of salt. The committee had concerns that \$3 million dollars was an excessive amount to spend on snow and ice control.

Dave Turocy and Tom Daley presented a list of six items they wish to purchase this year. One sweeper, one front-end loader, one paver, one trailer that will tow the paver and two large construction trucks. They assume that the cost of the new paver would be \$100,000.00 and they are only requesting \$50,000.00 from this appropriation. They will supplement \$50,000.00 more from Chapter 90 funding for road improvements when we receive the money from the state.

The Committee reviewed the life cycle of this equipment. The trucks actually are a 1983 vintage with over 200,000 miles and the sweeper is ten years old, which is typically the life cycle you get from a sweeper. Ron Mahan was also present and indicated the sweeper and front-end loader would be turned in, and the two large construction trucks would be surplus. The committee reviewed and had no further questions.

Nick Parnell and Ron Mahan were present. Together with Ald. Coletti and their

experience on this item in a working subcommittee in both the Public Works Department and Building Department on how best to deal with the underground

tank problem.

The current tanks are in excess of twenty years old. One tank has been compromised in the area between the double walls and is leaking. Although no liquid is getting in or out of the tank, the tank can no longer be used. The additional tank, which is a diesel tank, is fully functional but highly questionable as the use of it because the diesel tank is sitting in a very high water table and is susceptible to rot.

Due to the underground conditions at Elliot Street DPW Yard and also the appropriateness the Biodiesel tanks that are sweating underground it seems appropriate to purchase two new above tanks with a canopy cover and pump island. These tanks will be installed in an appropriate location above ground on the site. These tanks are readily available with a containment vessel that surrounds each tank with rain gear, which is a protective covering. The tanks are also painted in high quality epoxy at the factory extremely advantageous because they are visible. The above tanks are also easy to inspect because they have man heads that can be entered and cleaned. They are state of the art and obviously, the route we should choose.

One reason the above tanks were selected over in-ground tanks is that during this winter both tanks were compromised in water. Water leaked in and contaminated the fuel and department trucks could not use the fuel. To resolve this problem is to have an above ground system designed with the agreement made to approve this request this evening. Nick Parnell, Ron Mahan and Ald. Coletti will work out the appropriate design and placement of these tanks before bids go out.

These boilers are original, one was broken, and the other was at the end of his life cycle. Nick Parnell was able to get a contract in place to replace both of the boilers. The committee has agreed and the motion was made from Capital Stabilization Fund without further debate the committee voted in favor to purchase this additional boiler.

This would place a preservation restriction on the house and then put the house back on the market to sell, when the house sold the proceeds would be returned to the Community Preservation fund. During the time, the city was in control of this property there would be a caretaker living in the house in order to protect and reserve the property.

The understanding of the Executive Department is if the house could not be sold in a reasonable period, the house would be torn down and the property in total would be retained by the city. This component of the item proposed a problem for the Finance Committee because this is not an appropriate expenditure of funds due to the bathhouse and the newly acquired 20 Rogers Street site. This is as far as the Finance Committee is prepared to go in preserving and enhancing the character of city owned property around Crystal Lake.

This item has potential of second call and be subject to a committee report on the floor of the board.



NOTE:

Finance Committee has been recommending this item to the Mayors office either through regular legislation, which has not been able to get through the House of Senate or through what our bond council advised us to approach the municipal finance oversight board. A letter dated 2-12-08 was submitted to the Finance Committee indicating that was the city's request at this time.

Under legislation, the Finance Committee must recommend to the Full Board and the Full Board must then recommend that the Mayor be allowed to approach this municipal finance oversight board in order to secure the thirty-year funding.

Dave Wilkinson and the committee checked with the bond council the fact that going to thirty year bonds on a building which has a useful life fifty years that there would be no a adverse effect on the city's AAA bond rating. This is critically important in order for the city to be able to finance the difference between the original \$149 million cost and the now estimated \$196 million cost for the Newton North High School.
