1. Introductions (6:00-6:05)



The meeting started at 6PM and there were 8 COD members present. Matt and Barbara joined after the next agenda item, Anne Marie, Nyree, and Lakshmi were absent.

#### 2. Approval of the November 14, 2022 Meeting Minutes (6:05-6:10)

Eileen asked if there were any changes to the draft minutes for the November meeting. Hearing none, Sandra made a motion to accept the minutes as distributed and Ima seconded the motion. The motion passed by a vote of 6-0-2( Nancy and Darby abstained as they were absent last month).

#### 3. CDBG Report (6:10-6:15)

Nika gave a brief CDBG report, which can be found on page 5. Nika indicated that there were 2 updates on these access projects, and she invited Luis to describe the 2 proposed paths (interior and perimeter) at McGrath Park, so that the COD can decide which they recommend. These potential designs and presentation for McGrath Park can be found on page 6 & 7.

Luis and Commissioner Banks described that the perimeter path, chosen and recommended by the COD back in January 2021, had some disadvantages as to the safety zone between the field and the proposed path around the fields, and that a Lacrosse practice wall my interfere with clearances. A more interior pathway is the second pathway being proposed, by the Parks, Recreation, and Culture Department, which is a much shorter loop and accesses the fields for spectators, with a shorter distance from accessible parking than the perimeter. One member favored this one, but the majority of the members recommend the perimeter around the outside of the fields by the edge of the woods, both for spectating and for walking exercise and enjoyment of the entire park. A lengthy discussion ensued and at the end of about an hour, the COD Co-chair asked PRC to come back with a new design which includes a perimeter pathway around the park, since both pathways cannot be chosen, that a compromise perhaps with the high school athletics, and no vote was taken. Luis mentioned that an update will be given to the Parks & Rec Commission on December 19.

#### 4. Accessible Fines Reports (6:15-6:20)

Sgt. Wade gave the 2 Fines reports, which can be viewed on pages 8 & 9.

#### **5.** Review of Top 3 FY24 CDBG Access Projects (6:20-6:50)

Before the review of the top 3 potential FY24 CDBG funded access projects, Alfredo gave an update to the final design of the improvements at Langley/Warren/chase intersection. The cost estimate increased from 118,000 to 155,000. This design can be viewed on page 10. The increase is due to escalation of construction costs and the scope of the project. This project will be put out to bid in January and construction will begin in the spring. Sandra wanted to know the breakdown of this new cost estimate, which includes 100,000 from CDBG funds, 18,000 for COD Fines funds (for the RRFB), and the remaining 37,000 will be from DPW Traffic Calming funds. There were a couple of questions about the accessibility and height of the RRFB buttons and beacons, and Ima commented that this completed design will bring so much needed safety and accessibility crossing Langley and Warren.

Next Nika, Alfredo, and Isaac, presented the 3 proposed potential access projects for FY24 CDBG funding, and can be viewed on pages 11 & 12: RRFB at 1860 Washington St., which has increased to include an overhead RRFB system as well as the standard roadside beacons, to 100,000; City Hall Drive crossing, which includes 2 curb ramps, improvements of road within the crosswalk, and closing up a curb ramp on the park side of the circle. This cost estimate is 42,000; intersection of Watertown and Chapel Streets, constructing 6 curb ramps to replace 3 apex curb ramps on 3 corners and the 4th corner apex curb ramp cannot be replaced due to above ground utilities. The cost estimate is a range from 120,000 to 150,000, due to the possibility of moving or adding signal poles to accommodate accessible placement of the APS buttons. There was a question about if the City Hall Drive project was chosen, should another project be considered for the balance of the CDBG allocation. Amanda said that the balance from that project could be held for FY25 CDBG funded projects, but it is too late to introduce a 4<sup>th</sup> project at this time. There were questions about the first project, and as proposed with the overhead and the roadside pole on the golf club side, there is only 30" if the RRFB pole is mounted at the fence, a possible cutout of the fence at the bottom may be necessary. Or perhaps the RRFB could be at the curbside. Transportation feel the overhead RRFB is necessary for safety here, as there are 4 lanes of traffic and cars seem to be moving quite fast in this stretch, and strongly discourages installing the lower cost option of just the roadside RRFB system.

#### **6.** Review of Updated Gath Pool Design Plans (6:50-7:25)

Luis presented the updated design for the renovation of the Gath Pool facility, which can be viewed on pages 13 &14. This updated design now includes 2 separate pools rather than a combined recreation and lap/competition pool. The 2 pools have accessible ramps and lifts providing 2 accessible forms of entrance/egress for each pool. The pool deck has expanded a little and the Splash Pad has been decreased a little. Several members commented that having only one accessible, gender neutral, family bathroom doesn't seem to be enough, as caregivers who are the opposite sex as their person with a disability will need this type of privacy and accessibility and many other family groups use this same bathroom/changing room, even if they don't need the accessibility. When asked if there is any way even one more of these private accessible gender neutral bath/changing rooms being considered, Luis said no, that would require complete renovation of the existing building/bathhouse, and this project focuses on the pool renovation and some modifications to the interior of the bathhouse. Matt asked about the deck space where Luis said was flexible for strollers or storage, or café seating, as a potential to create one or more private bath/changing rooms. Commissioner Banks and Luis said they will bring these comments and suggestions back to their architects/designers. Other members asked about a water wheelchair to get into the pool, which are quite wide, that perhaps a shower chair on wheels my work better, especially with the ramps. Luis said they haven't flushed all those details out yet, and encourage members to recommend equipment like that for the pools going forward. including the parents, teachers, and OT/PT professionals of the Newton Early Childhood Program next door to this facility. Overall there was much praise for this new design, and in particular, having both accessible lifts and ramps into both pools.

### 7. Treasurer's Report (7:25-7:30) Jane, Treasurer of the COD, gave the Treasurer's report which can be viewed on page 15.

#### 8. ADA Coordinator's Report (7:30-7:35)

Jini briefly gave her report on ADA activities for the month of November, which can be viewed on page 16. Jini announced that the Planning and Development Board adopted the 2022 ADA/504 Transition Plan at their November 7, 2022 meeting.

#### 9. Current COD Member Intros (7:35-8:05)

Eileen said that this agenda item will need to be postponed to the January meeting due to the late hour. She also suggested that the members may want to consider a separate meeting/retreat as the COD did in 2020. She also mentioned that COD officer elections are coming up in January and suggested everyone consider taking on a leadership role, and she might not be able to consider Co-Chair in 2023.

#### 10. 2023 COD Meeting Dates & Hybrid Discussion (8:05-8:30)

Jini distributed the dates of the 2023 COD meetings, in advance, to all. These dates can be viewed on page 17. Due to the late hour, a discussion as to Hybrid meetings and all Zoom did not take place, but will be considered at the February meeting. Speaking of dates, Eileen confirmed that the Me2 Concert will be held at the Newton North Auditorium in the afternoon of May 7 as the COD's Mental Awareness event.

#### **11. Adjournment (8:30)**

The meeting adjourned at 8:40PM.

FY22 McGrath Park Perimeter Path Installation – (CD22-03A; Budget: \$91,300.00; Expended: \$0; Balance: \$91,300.00) Constructing an accessible perimeter path around Richard McGrath Park. Project has been presented to the Parks Commission. Design plan will be presented

to the COD at the December meeting, to be concluded with a vote on which design to go forth with.

FY23 Langley/Warren/Chase Crossing – (CD23-03A; Budget: \$100,000.00; Expended: \$0; Balance: \$100,000.00)

Installation of accessible crossings at Langley Rd. and Warren St. This includes a bump out on the northeast corner of the intersection to create the space

needed to install a curb cut to cross Warren St. DPW has updated the scope of work and concept design for this project. Project will be presented at the

December meeting.

FY24 Potential Projects -

Planning staff will meet with DPW to discuss future scoping plans for these potential projects.

1. Chapel St. / Watertown St. Reconstruction of existing curb cuts at three of the four corners of this intersection to give them the correct orientation.

The curb cut at the northeast corner (Bridal Alterations) would remain as is due to the presence of an existing utility pole, traffic signal, traffic signal

cabinet, and potentially a protruding basement underneath the sidewalk at the back of sidewalk that make it too complex to change the configuration of

this corner. Scope of work and concept design has been updated.

- 2. City Hall Campus Two curb cuts should be added to connect folks to the accessible elevator entrance near the Department Head parking lot. Site visit has been completed.
- 3. An RRFB system crossing Washington Street at 1860 Washington Street at Temple Reyim. Site visit has been completed.

Scope of work: The project consists of implementing pedestrian access improvements at City Hall Drive near the accessible entrance to City Hall by the

department heads parking lot. The work includes milling and overlaying the road within the crosswalk, restriping the existing continental crosswalk, reconstructing

two existing curb ramps to bring them into compliance, adding pedestrian crossing signs, and closing one existing curb ramp across City Hall on the east

side of the circle. The construction cost estimate based on the concept plan is \$42K.

Scope of work: The project consists of implementing pedestrian access improvements at the intersection of Watertown Street and California Street. The work

includes reconstructing three existing apex curb ramps at three corners of the intersection to split them up into two perpendicular curb ramps per corner,

reconfiguring the existing traffic signals so the pedestrian push buttons are adequately positioned near the level landings, and restriping the existing

crosswalks and stop lines. There is a fourth existing apex curb ramp at the northeast corner of the intersection that will be left as an apex curb ramp

due the presence of existing above ground utilities at this corner that are too complex to move to make room and make splitting this curb ramp into two

perpendicular curb ramps not practical.

The construction cost estimate based on the concept plan is \$120K; however, the cost could potentially increase to up to \$150K if the curb ramps cannot

be combined as shown on the concept plan and additional traffic signal work is required.

Citizen Participation Plan

The Citizen Participation Plan outlines the City's responsibility to solicit active citizen participation. The Plan was developed to provide citizens and

other interested parties with opportunities to participate in an advisory role in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of CDBG programs which primarily



benefit Newton's low and moderate-income residents.

Dear City Councilors,

The goal of the Gath Pool project has been to best meet the needs and interests of the recreational, league, lap swimmers and walkers, while creating a

wonderful, inclusive, welcoming, and universally accessible asset for all residents. In some cases, the needs and interests of one group intersected, requiring

careful review of how best to achieve a most favorable design for all.

While we knew there were opportunities and challenges associated with a two-pool versus one-pool approach, we initially felt that the best approach for

the project included a single contiguous pool design. We listened carefully throughout the community outreach process, small stakeholder group listening

sessions, and the normal review process with the various boards and commissions. We heard from these groups that there was an openness for more compromise,

that everyone truly wanted to see the best possible design outcome. With this support and encouragement, we went back to the drawing board to test various

design approaches to see if we could achieve an improved design without sacrificing our project goals and objectives. Through this public process, and

informed by ample community input, our design has evolved.

Working with our design team from BH+A, we have found a way to address our goals and objectives, while also creating a two-pool

design that will work better for all stakeholders. While this approach is slightly more expensive to construct and operate, it will yield a

finished product that simply checks more boxes for everyone. We have taken this new design back to key stakeholders for preliminary

feedback and are heartened by their initial assessment. As with the previous one-pool design, the new "Gath Pool 4.0" two-pool

design has elements that require some compromise between different stakeholders. All of the compromises have been empathically

embraced to allow for this optimal design. The new pool design and all previous project materials can be viewed at www.newtonma.gov/gathpoolproject.

Great community projects are a product of solid communication, collaboration, openness to compromise, and evolution of thought. Being responsive to the

community is good governance, and we are blessed to have such a passionate and dedicated city. We appreciate the dedicated groups and individuals who have

been working tirelessly to help improve the design for our community. In this spirit of openness, we will be presenting the new design to the Commission

on Disability this week and back to the Parks and Recreation Commission later this month for a public hearing. With their support we will bring the project

back to the Community Preservation Committee to request their support to fund the project. In addition to CPA funds, we have \$1M in ARPA funds and \$400K

in state funds (thanks to Sen. Kay Khan) that will help make this project possible. Ultimately, this project will come before the City Council for final

funding approval.

We will be moving quickly to advance this design so that we may start construction immediately after the 2023 swim season concludes, with our goal of opening

the new pool for the start of the 2024 swim season.
