- #354-03(3) <u>HIS HONOR THE MAYOR</u> requesting that the sum of \$31,400 be transferred from the Inspectional Services Department personal services accounts to the Planning Department personal services accounts in order to provide ample funding for the changes between these two Departments that came about as a result of the reorganization plan approved in November, 2003.

The current contract with WMLP expires on February 16, 2004.

YATES</u> proposing that the City of Newton exercise the new option offered by Ch.184 and Ch.51 of the Acts of 2002 to adjust the age, income and asset requirements seniors must meet to qualify for tax exemption under Ch.59 and Ch.51 (41C) and the amount of the exemption granted to eligible seniors.
