Mayor's Newton Update



Route 9 Apartments Approved

Newton's Zoning Board of Appeals approved last week the Toll Brothers 40B project to build 184 apartments at 528 Boylston Street on the eastbound side of Route 9 between Olde Field and Dudley Roads and behind Hagen Road. The 6-acre site is currently used by Sam White & Sons, a landscaping company and includes a laydown area for mulch and other materials.

Of the 184 apartments, 25% or 46 units are affordable. These deed restricted affordable apartments include 37 which will be affordable to households earning up to 80%

of the Area Median Income (AMI), and 9 which will be affordable to households earning up to 50% AMI. (Click here for information on Area Median Income levels.)

The Zoning Board of Appeals heard over the course of a year of public hearings from a lot of neighbors with concerns.

In addition to taking into consideration the concerns of neighbors, the ZBA operates under the State's Chapter 40B Affordable Housing law enacted in 1969. Developers who choose to proceed through the Chapter 40B process apply for "comprehensive permits" directly through a local Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) (which Toll Brothers chose to do). This law allows developers in Massachusetts to bypass local zoning if their plans include a particular amount of affordable housing in their proposal and are determined to be eligible by Mass Housing or another subsidizing agency. In other words, developers can choose to bypass the Newton City Council's special permit process and instead apply for a 40B comprehensive permit with Newton's Zoning Board of Appeals.

Under the State law, in considering an application, the ZBA must balance the regional need for housing against Newton's health, safety, open space, site and building design concerns.

Over the course of the year of public hearings and the extensive input from the community, City staff and the City's external peer reviewers, the ZBA reviewed and considered the complexities of this site. This included access to and from Route 9, stormwater and groundwater concerns, safe pedestrian access through the site and along Route 9, the amount and location of open space, and the proximity of the building to nearby single-family homes.

In the process, Toll Brothers made modifications to their original plan. The number of apartments was reduced from 244 to 184 and the overall building size was reduced from 493,000-square feet to 361,000-square feet. The building was moved further away from the neighbors along Hagen Road. City stormwater requirements were considered, and the project will meet or exceed all of them.

The ZBA members included in their decision specific conditions to provide both mitigations and protections for the neighborhood, including:

- Installing a new 5-foot-wide sidewalk and a 10-foot landscape edge to provide a buffer along the property's Route 9 frontage.
- Extending the current Route 9 island on the Parker Street ramp to eliminate the dangerous maneuver of vehicles sharply turning from Route 9 onto Sheldon Road.
- Striping a new acceleration/deceleration lane from the Parker Street ramp to allow for a more gradual entry on to and exiting from Route 9.
- Installing two speed feedback signs on Dudley Road to make drivers aware of the speed at which they are travelling to help reduce speeding.
- Extending the future Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Multi-Use Path along Route 9 from Olde Field Road to the apartment building to improve safety for all pedestrians along Route 9.
- Providing a north-south footpath through the site with landscape screening to provide a pedestrian connection to Hagen Road from Boylston Street.
- Contributing \$500,000 in mitigation funding to the City for off-site improvements in transportation, pedestrian, bicycling, safety, open space, or recreation; additionally, the developer must pay \$582,183 to the City for sewer and stormwater infrastructure improvements to decrease inflow and infiltration (I&I).
- Committing to an all electric and Passive House certified building; additionally, the developer will conduct an embodied carbon analysis, and 20% of the parking stalls will be equipped with electric vehicle charging stations, and an additional 30% of the parking stalls will be EV ready.

At the time the 528 Boylston project was filed by Toll Brothers with the ZBA, the City had not yet reached the 40B safe harbor threshold (i.e., 10% of year-round housing being eligible for the state's subsidized housing inventory). Now that this threshold has been met, the ZBA has more discretion over the approval of future 40B projects. Read Newton's current 40B Safe Harbor status calculations here.

The project still needs review by the City's Conservation Commission; it will be subject to an Order of Conditions under the Wetland Protection Act to ensure the construction of the project does not have an adverse impact on the adjacent

wetlands. The Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) also needs to approve the changes and access to Route 9.

School Committee Votes No on School Choice

The Newton School Committee last week voted against a plan (6 against, 1 for, 1 abstention, 1 absent) that would have allowed students from outside Newton to attend the Newton Public Schools under the state's Inter-District School Choice program.

I want to commend Superintendent Dr. Anna Nolin for bringing School Choice forward for the School Committee to consider as a way to supplement the \$282.6 million FY2025 NPS budget.

I came into the discussions with an open mind. However, after considering the information provided, I can not support School Choice for Newton. As a member of the School Committee, I voted no.

State-of-the-Art Lighting at Forte Park

Our Parks, Recreation & Culture team recently installed a state-of-the-art LED lighting system at Forte Park in Nonantum. Players on the softball field, the multipurpose field, the basketball court and bocce courts now have optimum lighting conditions with excellent, direct lighting on the playing areas.

Simultaneously, the light pollution and excessive glare experienced from the old lights have been eliminated. (The previous lights produced glare onto neighboring properties in Newton and also went across the Charles River into Watertown.)


The new LED lighting is highly efficient, saving energy. Plus, the new lights are electronically programmed, usable until 10 p.m. The lights also are push-button activated, staying on for one hour at a time with a blinking light notification when the lights



are about to go off so the button can be pressed again.

The new, neighboring Riverdale housing apartments (now known as "Allee on the Charles") paid for the light systems as part of their approval and mitigation funding.


