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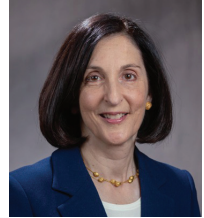

The Foundation for Racial, Ethnic and Religious Harmony was founded in 1988 at the initiative of the Mayor of Newton, Theodore D. Mann. It is a private foundation dedicated to promoting understanding of the similarities and respect for the differences among the citizens of Newton within its diversity of races, creeds, cultures and ethnicities. The Foundation seeks to assist the Newton community on its progress toward a society where this diversity is understood as a continuing and ever increasing source of community strength.

In carrying out this mission, the Foundation seeks to make grants to community groups, K-12 educational institutions and all other related local organizations carrying out programs that facilitate learning, interaction, understanding, respect and unity among the citizens of Newton and surrounding areas across the divides of racial, ethnic and religious differences.

The Foundation's charter (May, 1990) assigns to it the responsibility to ensure that two community events are perpetuated:

- The annual City of Newton Mayor's Community Breakfast, begun in 1975;
- The annual City of Newton observance of the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

The Foundation will also pursue its mission through sponsoring and participating in such other community events as it deems may best serve the community in promoting and sustaining racial, ethnic and religious harmony.

In addition to the organization and hosting of the annual MLK Day observance and the annual Newton Mayor's Community Breakfast, the Harmony Foundation has over the past three years made grants to community organizations and events totaling more than \$63,000; 40 individual grants to 21 different organizations. While the Community Breakfast had historically been our principal fundraiser, the rising cost of the event in recent years has not been covered by ticket and program book ad income.

Keynote Speaker



Joshua S. Levy

Acting United States Attorney

Joshua S. Levy is the Acting United States Attorney for the District of Massachusetts. On May 19, 2023, Mr. Levy assumed the role as Acting U.S. Attorney after serving as First Assistant U.S. Attorney since his appointment in January 2022. As First Assistant, Mr. Levy supervised approximately 125 federal prosecutors in the office's Criminal and Civil Divisions as well as the office's administrative functions. Mr. Levy has over 30 years of legal experience. Prior to his appointment as First Assistant U.S. Attorney, Mr. Levy was a partner at the global law firm Ropes & Gray for 17 years. For several years he was the co-chair of the firm's 325-lawyer Litigation and Enforcement practice group and then served as the co-Managing Partner of their Boston office. Mr. Levy was also co-chair of the firm's Diversity, Equity and Inclu-

sion Committee. In his legal practice, Mr. Levy handled white-collar criminal matters and complex civil litigation. In 2022, Mr. Levy was inducted into the prestigious American College of Trial Lawyers for his courtroom advocacy. He was also named as one of the Lawyers of the Year by Massachusetts Lawyers Weekly in 2017 for his work as a criminal defense lawyer. Earlier in his career, Mr. Levy spent seven years as an Assistant U.S. Attorney for the District of Massachusetts prosecuting a wide range of white-collar crimes. Mr. Levy attended Brown University and then graduated magna cum laude from Georgetown University Law Center in 1992. After law school, Mr. Levy clerked for the Honorable Harold H. Greene with the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia.

Hibaq Ali

Newton North High School

Hibaq is described by her guidance counselor as an independent, honest, and passionate student. She has worked hard to maintain strong academics throughout her high school career, with a particular passion for the sciences. Despite a very full schedule outside of school, Hibaq prioritizes her academics and has maintained a strong transcript all four years of high school, enrolling in advanced and honors courses throughout her time at NNHS.

As only one of a small group of Muslim students at Newton North, Hibaq set a personal goal to educate the school community about her culture. She joined the Muslim Advocates group and has spoken with teachers and peers about Muslim traditions, holidays, and costumes. Establishing herself as a true leader amongst her peers, Hibaq created the first prayer room at Newton North, a major accomplishment for Muslim students.

Hibaq has become involved with many other communities in Newton. She is a member of the Black Leadership Advisory Council, as well as a participant in the METCO program. She is a Muslim Advo-

cate, and participated in the One to One mentoring program, partnering with an elementary school student to provide support and guidance throughout the academic year. She has volunteered at Brigham & Women's Hospital, and as a youth worker and camp administrator at Roxbury YMCA. At Brigham & Women's Hospital, Hibaq supported staff by bringing food to patients. She recalls one powerful moment where, while delivering food to a patient's room, she realized that the nurses were struggling to communicate with that patient due to a language barrier. Hibaq recognized that she spoke the same language as the patient and was able to help communicate her needs to the hospital staff, and help the nurses communicate information about the patient's medical procedure. This experience reinforced Hibaq's belief that a connection to her culture as well as her local community was an incredibly important and fulfilling part of her life.

An extraordinary student with endless potential, Hibaq will continue her studies at Northeastern University this fall.

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Jamen Goldberg

Newton North High School

From the very beginning of his high school journey, Jamen displayed an unwavering commitment to academic excellence. Described as a gentleman, a good listener and thinker, an intelligent and hard worker, and an athletic and caring leader, Fabricio not only excels in his own work but also notices the efforts of others and expresses appreciation often. He is a skilled soccer player and a collaborative team player on Newton South's soccer team.

Fabricio has provided strong and consistent support to the school's Spanish program by serving as a teaching assistant during his sophomore and junior years. Fabricio's dedication to others is exemplified by his annual soccer gear donation project. He will continue his studies next year at Babson College where he will study business.

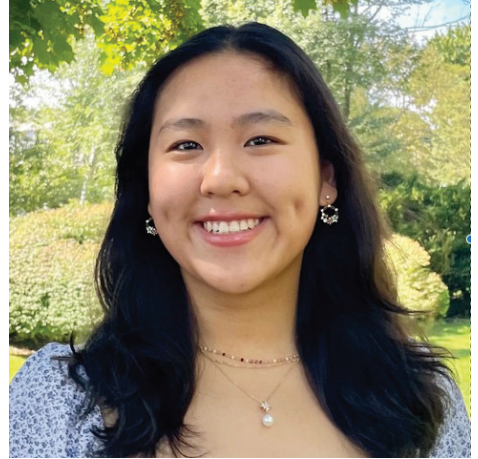
Student Speakers

All parking areas are within walking distance from the Tent on the field facing Shaw Hall.

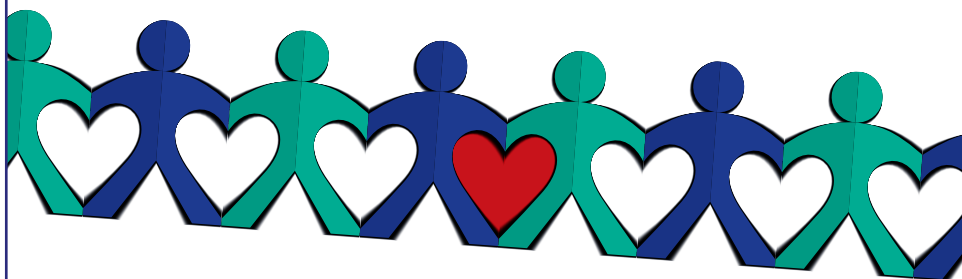
Handicapped parking spaces are located in front of Shaw Hall
