Mayor's Newton Update

Significant Upgrade to Newton 311

One of the easiest ways to have the City of Newton respond to your needs is to use Newton 311 on your computer or on your smartphone.

Through Newton 311, you can ask for a pothole to be filled, for an overflowing trash bin to be emptied, for a dead animal in a street to be picked up, for a damaged trash/recycling cart to be fixed, for a knocked down sign to be repaired, for a hornet nest in a city tree to be cleared, for a downed tree limb to be removed, for a catch basin to be cleaned, for a noisy manhole cover to be reset, and much more. In addition, Newton 311 is an access point for paying your bills to City of Newton.

We just swapped out our 12-year-old system for a new one from a company called GoGov that is easier to use and more responsive to residents and property owners. Plus, it tracks requests better.

Newton 311 is pretty simple to use.

On your cell phone, to get started download the free Newton 311 app, then set up an account and start using the app today. (Go ahead and delete the old app.)

For example, let's say you see a pothole on your street that you want to report. Open the Newton 311 app and tap START REQUEST. You can either scroll through the list of heavily used topics or just type POTHOLE into the search bar. Next, add a picture if want and use a pin to identify the location or enter the address in the location field. Newton 311 will alert you to other similar requests that have been entered for the address, so you can see if someone else has already reported the issue. If you still want to move forward, type your concern in the description field and then SUBMIT.

Once you've reported an issue, you'll be able to track your request and continue to communicate with the City throughout the resolution process.

Newton 311 also allows users to access other City functions including making a payment online or checking the Events Calendar. The new Newton 311 is much more of a one-stop resource than our previous version.

Unfortunately, requests that were entered into the former 311 system will no longer be able to be viewed under the old user's account in our new Newton 311 system. Don't worry if you still have open requests entered into the former system; all requests will continue to be worked on by our team.

You can access Newton 311 on your computer by going to the City of Newton website at newtonma.gov and clicking on the Newton 311 tab on the opening page.

Bad News from Feds on Funding for the Newtonville Commuter Rail Station

The MBTA did not receive federal funding through the All Station Accessibility Program (ASAP) for construction to make the Newtonville station accessible and to reconfigure the platforms for more frequent train service.

Instead, the MBTA is getting ASAP funds to upgrade and make accessible 14 stations along the Green Line's B and C branches, including Newton's Chestnut Hill stop.

Congressman Jake Auchincloss, State Representative Kay Khan and I remain completely committed to securing the funding.

Congressman Auchincloss and I expect to meet with MBTA General Manager Phillip Eng soon to discuss next steps to secure funding for Newtonville and get this critically important station rebuilt.

In April, the MBTA committed to funding and proceeding with the full design (see the presentation here).

Sec. of Transportation Monica Tibbits-Nutt committed to funding the construction of the upgrades at a recent Charles River Chamber event in May. Responding to a question from City Councilor Susan Albright, Tibbits-Nutt said, "Once the design is finished, we're doing it. ...100 percent, yes," she said. (Watch a video of the event here. Sec. Green Light for Washington Street Pilot

We're moving forward with a redesign of Washington Street between West Newton Square and Newtonville.

We're piloting a redesign to address a bunch of issues: speeding, poor visibility turning into/out of side streets, stretches of missing sidewalks, too few safe

pedestrian crosswalks, an inhospitable environment next to the MassPike, and limited bicycle paths.

The City Council approved the redesign between Chestnut Street in West Newton Square and Lowell Avenue in Newtonville for a pilot that will:

- Create a two-lane roadway (with left turn pockets at most intersections) to reduce speeds and conflicts along the roadway, therefore reducing the likelihood of fatal and serious injuries.
- Improve pedestrian and bicycle connectivity and comfort through a protected shared-use path along the south side of Washington Street.
- Retain a lot of the parking.
- Limit parking right by intersections to make it easier to turn onto Washington Street.
- Increase greenery and landscaping.

While the pilot is in place, we will be collecting data regularly on the traffic volumes, number of bicyclists and pedestrians, intersection queuing, diversion of traffic to other streets, bus ridership, and parking utilization. We will provide updates to the City Council and make tweaks as needed.

The pilot also lets us test the redesign along this portion of Washington street first before investing the resources into permanent improvements along the entire corridor.
