Mayor's Newton Update

Introducing GoGo Newton

After six years of operating Newton in Motion (NewMo), we are transitioning to a new transportation system for people living here who need the most support - our older adults, our lower income individuals, and people with disabilities.

We are partnering with an experienced, national, "customer service centric" company, GoGo Technologies. Started in 2016, GoGo now works with over 500 municipal and non-profit organizations (including Brookline) to provide convenient, safe and reliable transportation at affordable prices seven days a week and 24 hours a day.

Wth superior customer service,

GoGo links riders with carefully vetted, highly rated Uber and Lyft drivers who can meet (and who's vehicles can meet) the individual needs of our residents, 24/7.

GoGo Newton also supports people requiring a wheelchair-accessible vehicle by booking 48 hours in advance.

GoGo Newton launches on Monday, July 1, 2024, to provide rides for Newton residents who are 65 years and older as well as Newtonians 18 years and older who are low-income or have disabilities.

GoGo Newton will provide both on-demand and prescheduled rides. All rides have to originate or end in Newton. We can expect average wait times of less than 20 minutes. Riders will be able to book rides using the phone with an automated phone system or with GoGo customer service representatives, or on a computer or smartphone using the GoGo website.

GoGo Newton has a lot of great features. It provides around the clock and 365 days a year service, predictable and reliable vehicle arrival times, the option of sending text notifications to family members detailing the exact location of their family member throughout their trips, an expansive service area that includes 6 of our neighboring municipalities (Brookline, Needham, Waltham, Watertown, Wellesley, and Weston), and select medical facilities in Boston, including:

GoGo Newton Service Area

The City of Newton is helping pay for GoGo Newton rides.

The amount a rider pays and the number of trips that are subsidized by the City depends on the income of the rider.

GoGo Newton Rates

- Very Low Income Riders Available to Individuals 18 and over who are on Qualified Forms of Public Assistance:
 - Riders are entitled to 12 subsidized one-way trips each month
 - Rider pays the first \$4 of a trip, the City of Newton pays the next \$10, and the rider pays the remainder for the first 12 trips each month.
 After the 12 subsidized trips, the rider can continue to use GoGo Newton by paying the full fare of additional trips in that month.
 - For example: if the cost of the ride is \$15, then:
 - Rider will pay the base price of \$4
 - The City will pay a subsidy of \$10
 - Rider will pay the remaining \$1 overage
 - Total cost to the rider is \$5.
- Low Income Older Adults and People Living with Disabilities -Available to Individuals 65+ and People 18 and over with Disabilities with Gross Household Incomes \$78,600 or Less:
 - Riders are entitled to 8 subsidized one-way rides per month.
 - Rider pays the first \$6 of a trip, the City of Newton pays the next \$8, and the rider pays the remainder for the first 8 trips each month. After the 8 subsidized trips, the rider can continue to use GoGo Newton by paying the full fare of additional trips in that month.
 - For example: if the cost of the ride is \$15, then:
 - Rider will pay the base price of \$6
 - The City will pay a subsidy of \$8
 - Rider will pay the remaining \$1 overage
 - Total cost to the rider is \$7.

 Older Adults and People with Disabilities - Available to Individuals 65+ and People 18 and over with a Disability and Gross Household Incomes above \$78,600:

- Riders are entitled to 4 subsidized one-way trips per month.
- Rider pays the first \$8 of a trip, the City of Newton pays the next \$6, and the rider pays the remainder for the first 4 trips each month. After the 4 subsidized trips, the rider can continue to use GoGo Newton by paying the full fare of additional trips in that month.
- For example: if the cost of the ride is \$15, then:
 - Rider will pay the base price of \$8
 - The City will pay a subsidy of \$6
 - Rider will pay the remaining \$1 overage
 - Total cost to the rider is \$9.

Like Uber and Lyft, the cost of a trip depends on where the rider is going and other factors such as time of day and traffic. In other words, the price may be different each time you make the same trip. GoGo Newton will let a rider know the cost of the ride when they book it so there are no surprises.

The payment for the ride happens through GoGo Newton; you do not pay the driver directly. More specifically, the rider provides a credit card number to GoGo Newton for their portion of the cost. If you do not have a credit card, you may also use a debit card, a gift card in the amount of \$60, or send a check for \$60 to Gogo Newton as a payment method; checks and gift cards must be replenished in increments of \$60.

Signing Up for GoGo Newton

Step 1:

To use the GoGo Newton service, all riders must register and complete Newton's verification process online or in person in Newton by appointment. All registrants must provide documentation demonstrating their age, Newton residency, disability status (if applicable), and income or public assistance status (if applicable). Step 2:

Once you are approved by GoGo Newton, GoGo Newton will help you get started using the service. They will need to keep a credit card on file.

Getting Support:

As we transition to GoGo Newton, we anticipate there will be questions and people may need some help. City of Newton and GoGo staff will be available to assist with the sign-up process. Email gogo@newtonma.gov or call 617-796-GOGO (617-796-4646) for assistance.

Why did we end Newton in Motion (NewMo) and switch to GoGo Newton?

NewMo was terrific for six years, providing an affordable and, in many cases, critical transportation service for many Newtonians with our partner Via.

As significant federal and state grants ended, we had to reimagine our goals with a more targeted transportation system that was also financially sustainable. We also decided to prioritize service all day every day, a broader service area, and even more rider-friendly customer service. After a Request for Proposal process, we think GoGo Newton meets these goals well. We are looking forward to GoGo Newton's first service day on Monday, July 1.

Swim Season Starting

The official opening of the two new Gath Pools for the summer of 2024 is Monday, June 24.

Enjoy a new 8-lane lap pool and a family friendly recreation pool, plus diving boards, a water slide, shaded areas, gender neutral restrooms, a fully accessible bathhouse, a splash pad and more.

While both pools will be open on June 24, the splash pad surfacing needs a few more weeks to "cure" so we're looking at mid-July.

City Seal - Draft Designs

The City Seal Working Group (which consists of Lisa Dady, Councilor Bill Humphrey, Hattie Kerwin Derrick, Jim Murphy, Ryan Naragon and Shubee Sikka) has been working with graphic designer Sebastian Ebarb on draft designs for a new City of Newton seal that capture the values, identity, and spirit of Newton.

Join them on Tuesday, June 18 at 6:30 p.m. in the War Memorial at City Hall,1000 Commonwealth Avenue, to see and learn more about three draft designs and provide your feedback. You may also watch the meeting via Zoom or on NewTV. Ebarb will describe why certain design choices were made. These early drafts will be presented in black and white, with the next drafts incorporating choices about color.

The draft designs and survey are now at <u>newtonma.gov/cityseal</u> to view and to provide feedback starting this Friday, June 14 prior to the formal presentation next Tuesday. You can also see them in-person starting on Friday at:

- Newton Free Library <u>Anteroom (space to the left when you enter from the Parking Lot Entrance)</u>
- City Hall (on the television inside the front door main entrance)

At both locations, you will be able to scan a QR code or pick up a feedback form to let us know your preferences. The survey will remain open for feedback until Tuesday, August 21.

These drafts come after years of discussion and community input. In the fall of 2020, I convened an Ad Hoc City Seal Working Group to look at our City Seal. I asked them to make recommendations about whether the image depicted is still relevant and meaningful 155 years after its creation, and whether there were graphics and/or words that would better portray Newton.

In November 2021, the Group submitted its final report with several recommendations. These included that the scene of John Eliot evangelizing Indigenous people be replaced with a more suitable image and that the overall design be simplified to allow for accurate reproduction in many formats (on vehicles, documents, trash cans, etc.). Last spring, the City Council unanimously approved proceeding with the process of updating the City Seal and submitting a Request for Proposal for a graphic design professional. Sebastian Ellington Ebarb Design (SEED) was hired in December 2023.

By the way, if the City Council chooses a new City Seal, we do not expect to change the Seal on everything immediately. Rather, we expect generally to replace the current one as new items are ordered.

Opioids

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health released data today showing some good news in the fight against opioid use disorder. Massachusetts

experienced a 10% decline in opioid-related overdose deaths in 2023, the largest single-year decline since 2010.

The data for Newton also shows a meaningful decline in opioid-related overdose deaths of Newton residents from 10 in 2022 to 4 in 2023. See the data by City and Town here.

Yet, we know that even a single death is too many.

One way to decrease the number of deaths related to opioid overdose is to make Naloxone (also known as Narcan) readily available. Naloxone is a nasal spray that rapidly reverses the effects of an opioid overdose.

In Newton, we will be using opioid abatement funds to purchase and pilot placing naloxboxes (i.e., opioid rescue kits) in public buildings around the City.

The naloxboxes are wall mounted boxes that contain Naloxone, a rescue breathing barrier, and instructions sheets for recognizing and responding to a suspected opioid overdose.

We're starting with the Newton Free Library, City Hall and Newton Public Schools this summer.

Training will be provided for any staff wanting to learn more and any member of the public can access this lifesaving medication if needed.

Two Mass Pike Ramps Into Boston Closed at Night Through June 27

Two ramps onto the Mass Pike (I-90) eastbound from I-95 and from Commonwealth Ave./Route 30 in Newton and Weston will be closed during the overnight hours Sunday through Thursday from 11:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m. the following morning through June 27.

The closure is to allow crews to conduct safely the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) construction operations related to the Newton/Weston bridge rehabilitation project at the I-90/I-95 interchange.

The overnight closure went into effect yesterday, Monday, June 10, and is likely to impact travel in both directions on I-95 and Commonwealth Ave./Route 30.

Drivers seeking to access the Mass Pike eastbound from I-95 and Commonwealth Ave./Route 30 will be detoured onto I-90 westbound for approximately 2.6 miles. Drivers will then be directed to a U-turn at the

Massachusetts State Police barracks in Weston to rejoin I-90 in the eastbound direction.

MassDOT will have signage, law enforcement details, and advanced message boards to guide drivers through the work area.

All scheduled work is weather dependent and/or may be impacted due to an emergency.

... and Sumner Tunnel Closing Again This Summer

The Sumner Tunnel will close for two weekends - this weekend of June 14 and next weekend of June 21 - and then completely close for five weeks from Friday, July 5 through Friday, Aug. 31.

The second summer of the Sumner Tunnel closure is to allow MassDOT to address the 100-plus year old tunnel's safety, ceiling, lighting & security systems, and cell phone, GPS and radio service within the tunnel.

For Newtonians driving home from Logan Airport, the closure is expected to make the drive longer and more challenging. For everyone, officials say to expect and to plan for tie-ups and traffic getting *in* and *out* of Boston while the tunnel is closed. (They expect backups in both directions.)

Recycling Right

All of us need reminders on how to recycle right. A few key "don'ts" are:

- No plastic bags, plastic films, or plastic wraps
- No plastic utensils
- No food or beverage cartons
- No black plastic take out trays
- No small plastic bottles (e.g., prescription medicine bottles)(they are too small)

To help us remember, the City of Newton is continuing to put large educational cart-top decals on our green recycling carts.

Since we're going to be at the curb, we'll also be gathering some data. Data collection on what's in our trash and recycling carts throughout the city helps us understand how these services are functioning and how they can be improved. We're emphasizing waste reduction efforts which is important for the environment, and helps financially as disposal costs are expected to increase significantly in the next decade. We are seeking volunteers to assist with these efforts and we are also hiring a few, paid part-time project leaders. Here is the job posting.

Details about the project:

- Volunteers will walk neighborhood routes, adhere stickers to recycling carts and lift cart lids and leave messaging about contamination, if needed. It's important to note that this is not an enforcement project.
- The effort will start in late June/early July and will run through mid-October.
 We are looking for as many volunteers as we can to commit to walking a minimum of one route per week from 7:00 a.m. 9:30 a.m. Monday through Friday Our goal is to apply decals to every recycling cart in Newton.
- This is a fair-weather project. If it is raining, the routes that day are cancelled.

The benefits of volunteering for this project include:

Assisting in recycling education to reduce recycling contamination

- Getting exercise and spending time outside by walking neighborhood routes
- Hours worked in this campaign count toward Newton's Senior Property Tax Work-Off Program
