#### ARTICLE VI.

#### **YOUTH COMMISSION**

Sec. 12-60. Created; membership; terms; removal; chairperson; officers.

There is hereby established within the City a Youth Commission, consisting of nine (9) members to be appointed by the Mayor with the approval of the City Council, who will serve without compensation. Such members must be residents of the city or enrolled in a secondary or middle school within the City and will serve for terms not exceeding three (3) years, or until such members are rendered ineligible to serve. All new members will be appointed for a term of a maximum of three (3) years, but no member may serve for more than two (2) consecutive terms. Each member will continue to serve after the expiration of the term until a successor has been appointed and has qualified, unless such member has been rendered ineligible to serve. Vacancies will be filled for the period of the unexpired term in the same manner as original appointments. Any member of the Commission may, after a public hearing, if requested, be removed for cause by the appointing authority. Appointments to unexpired terms will not be counted as a term for the person appointed. The Commission will annually elect one of its members as chairperson and may elect other officers as it deems necessary. Executive or administrative officers of the city government are not eligible to serve on the commission, but may advise it upon request of the Commission. (Rev. Ords. 1973, § 2-315; Rev. Ords. 2001, § 14-57; Ord. No. 81, 7-28-75; Ord. No. X-175, 05-26-05)

#### Sec. 12-61. Purposes.

The purpose of this Commission is to implement programs and policies to meet the opportunities, challenges and issues of Newton youth, pursuant to chapter 40, section 8E, of the Massachusetts General Laws. In addition, the purpose of this Commission is to:

- (a) encourage youth to take leadership roles in the community;
- (b) facilitate opportunities for and access to resources on local, state and federal levels;
- (c) coordinate programs and activities carried on by both public and private agencies;
- (d) create and implement policies for the prevention of youth problems in a cooperative and professional effort;
- (e) create a sense of permanency of action and continuity of purpose for all youth activities.

To accomplish all of the foregoing, the Commission will coordinate with the Department of Health and Human Services. (Rev. Ords. 1973, § 2-316; Rev. Ords. 2001, § 14-58; Ord. No. 81, 7-28-75; Ord. No. X-175, 05-26-05)

Sec. 12-62. Authority to establish rules and regulations.

The Commission may, with the approval of the Mayor and the knowledge of the Commissioner of Health and Human Services, or designee, establish its own rules and regulations to carry out its goals. (Rev. Ords. 1973, § 2-317; Rev. Ords. 2001, § 14-59; Ord. No. 81, 7-28-75; Ord. No. X-175, 05-25-05)

Sec. 12-63. Meetings; reports.

The Commission will meet at least once each month, except for during July and August. The Commission will keep accurate records as required by the Open Meeting Law. The Commission will submit an annual report to the City Council. In addition to the annual report, the Mayor may request written reports of the activities of the Commission at any time. Five (5) members of the Commission will constitute a quorum and a majority of Commissioners present will be sufficient for the Commission to take any action. (Rev. Ords. 1973, § 2-318; Rev. Ords. 2001, § 14-60; Ord. No. 81, 7-28-75; Ord. No. X-175, 05-26-05)

Sec. 12-64. Gifts, grants.

The Youth Commission may receive gifts of property, both real and personal, in the name of the City, subject to the approval of the City Council. Such gifts, if any, may be managed and controlled by the Commission for the purpose of carrying out any program or policy for which

the Commission was established. The Commission will keep informed and remain cognizant of all state and federal legislation concerning funding and program planning for Youth Commissions or related activities which may inure to the benefit of the community as a whole. Any federal or state grants and private gifts or donations received for these purposes will be included in its annual budget to be approved by the Mayor and City Council. The Commission may expend, with the approval of the Mayor, such funds as are appropriated for the purposes stated in section 12-61 of this article. The Commission will prepare an annual operating budget, to be included in the overall department of Health and Human Services budget. (Rev. Ords. 1973, § 2-319; Rev. Ords. 2001, § 14-61; Ord. #### Sec. 12-65. Advisory board to youth commission.

(a) The Mayor shall appoint, with the advice of the Youth Commission, an unpaid Advisory Board to the Youth Commission consisting of not more than thirty (30) members, fifteen (15) of whom shall be secondary or middle school age. Membership of the Advisory Board, except the secondary and middle school members, shall include, so far as practicable, persons representative of existing youth agencies, social agencies, clergy, health, education, law and law enforcement, medical, school, recreation and other public or private organizations concerned with youth. The duty of the Advisory Board shall be to advise the Youth Commission and offer recommendations in respect to matters concerning Newton youth. This Board shall meet at least six (6) times each year. It shall meet with the Youth Commission at least twice a year for the purpose of communicating to it the results of its deliberations and to present any recommendations.

(b) All members of the Advisory Board will be appointed for a term of two (2) years. The Advisory Board will annually elect one of its members as the chairperson and may elect other officers as it deems necessary. Members of the Board will serve for not more than three (3) consecutive terms. (Rev. Ords. 1973, §2-320, Rev. Ords. 2001, § 14-62; Ord. No. 81, 7-28-75; Ord. No. X-175, 05-26-05)

Editor's note—As amended in 1970, this section provided that the original members who were not high school youth were to be appointed for staggered terms of one (1) or two (2) years.

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#### ARTICLE VI.

#### YOUTH COMMISSION

Sec. 12-60. Created; membership; terms; removal; chairperson; officers.

There is hereby established within the Ceity a Yyouth eCommission, consisting of seven-nine (79) members to be appointed by the Mmayor with the approval of the board of aldermenCity Council, who shall-will serve without compensation. Such members shall-must be residents of the city enrolled in a secondary or middle school within the City and shallwill serve for terms not exceeding three (3) years, or until such members are rendered ineligible to serve. All new members shall will be appointed for a term of a maximum of three (3) years, but no member may serve for more than two (2) consecutive terms. Each member shall-will continue to serve after the expiration of his the term until his a successor has been appointed and has qualified, unless such member has been rendered ineligible to serve. Vacancies shall will be filled for the period of the unexpired term in the same manner as original appointments. Any member of the Ceommission so appointed may, after a public hearing, if requested, be removed for cause by the appointing authority. The chairperson of the youth commission shall be designated by the mayor, and may be reappointed for three (3) consecutive terms. Appointments to unexpired terms shall will not be counted as a term for the person appointed. The Ceommission shall-will annually elect one of its members as chairperson and may elect other officers as it deems necessary, with the approval of the mayor. Executive or administrative officers of the city government shall-are not be eligible to serve on the commission, but may advise it upon request of the Commission at

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the request of the mayor. (Rev. Ords. 1973, § 2-315; Rev. Ords. 2001, § 14-57; Ord. No. 81, 7-28-75; Ord. No. X-175, 05-26-05)

#### Sec. 12-61. Purposes.

<u>The shall be</u> the purpose of this <u>Ceommission is</u> to implement programs <u>and policies</u> which may be designed or established to meet the opportunities, challenges and <u>problems issues</u> of Newton youth, <u>pursuant to</u> and in conjunction with any similar or related programs of any agency of the <u>Commonwealth or any agency of the federal government, and consonant with the enabling legislation contained in chapter 40, section 8E, of the Massachusetts General Laws. Without <u>limiting the foregoing, In addition, it shall also be</u> the purpose of this <u>Ceommission is to</u>:</u>

(a) encourage youth to take leadership roles in the community;

(b) facilitate opportunities for and access to resources on local, state and federal levels;

(<u>ca</u>) To coordinate existing programs and activities carried on by both public and private agencies to a greater extent and to interpret common objectives;

(db) To promulgate create and implement policies for the prevention of youth problems in a cooperative and professional effort, to avoid duplications and uncover troublesome areas not now covered, as well as to explore the adequacy of facilities and feasibility of extension thereof;

(ee) To-create a sense of permanency of action and continuity of purpose for all youth activities.

To <u>effectuate accomplish</u> all of the foregoing, the <u>Ceommission shall-will</u> coordinate with the <u>Design of hHealth</u> and <u>Hhuman sServices</u>. (Rev. Ords. 1973, § 2-316; Rev. Ords. 2001, § 14-58; Ord. No. 81, 7-28-75; Ord. No. X-175, 05-26-05)

Sec. 12-62. Authority to establish rules and regulations.

The Ceommission may, with the approval of the Mmayor and the knowledge of the Ceommissioner of Hhealth and hHuman Services, or designee, establish its own rules and regulations to assure the greatest effectiveness in its organization and functions consistent with the purpose of this article and the provisions of the aforesaid legislative aetcarry out its goals.

Sec. 12-63. Meetings; reports.

The commission shall meet as such not less often than once in every month, excepting July or August. The Commission will meet at least once each month, except for during July and August.

The commission shall keep accurate records of its meetings and actions; shall submit a written report of its plans and actions to the mayor with such frequency and at such times as may be requested, but not less often than annually. The Commission will keep accurate records as required by the Open Meeting Law. The Commission will submit an annual report to the City Council. In addition to the annual report, the Mayor may request written reports of the activities of the Commission at any time. A copy of such annual report shall also be transmitted to the board of aldermen and to such state government agency as may by statute be entitled to receive the same. The director of the department of health and human services shall be given notice of said meetings and he or his designee have the right to be present. Four Five (45) members of the Ceommission will shall constitute a quorum and a majority of those Commissioners present shall will be sufficient for for the Commission to take any action taken by the commission. #### Sec. 12-64. Gifts, grants.

The <u>Y</u>youth e<u>C</u>ommission is legally empowered tomay receive gifts of property, both real and personal, in the name of the <u>C</u>eity, subject to the approval of the <u>board of aldermenCity Council</u>. Such gifts, if any, may be managed and controlled by the <u>C</u>eommission for the purpose of <u>carrying out any program or policy for which the Commission was established. the</u> <u>aforementioned chapter 391 of the Acts of 1969 only.</u> The <u>C</u>eommission <u>shall-will</u> keep informed and remain cognizant of all state and federal legislation concerning funding and program planning for <u>yY</u>outh <u>e</u>Commissions or related activities which may inure to the benefit

of the community as a whole. Any federal or state grants and private gifts or donations received for these purposes shall be reflected by the commission will be included in its annual budget to be approved by the mMayor and board of aldermenCity Council. #### Sec. 12-65. Advisory board to youth commission.

(a) The mMayor shall appoint, with the advice of the Yyouth eCommission, an unpaid Andvisory bBoard to the Yyouth eCommission consisting of not more than twenty thirty (230) members, five-fifteen (15) of whom shall be secondary or middle school age, and five (5) others of whom shall be under the age of thirty-five (35) years. Membership of those members of the Andvisory Bboard, except the high-secondary and middle school membersyouth, shall include, so far as practicable, persons representative of existing youth agencies, social agencies, clergy, health, education, law and law enforcement, medical, school, recreation and other public or private organizations concerned with youth. The duty of the Andvisory bBoard shall be to advise the Yyouth eCommission and offer recommendations in respect to matters concerning Newton youth. This Bboard shall meet at least six (6) times each year. It shall meet with the yYouth eCommission at least twice a year for the purpose of communicating to it the results of its deliberations and to present any recommendations.

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(b) The five (5)All members of the Advisory bBoard who are high school youth shall be appointed for a one year term. The remainder of the board membership shall will be appointed for a term of two (2) years. The Aadvisory bBoard shall will annually elect one of its members as the chairperson and may elect other officers as it deems necessary with the approval of the mayor. Members of the Bboard may will serve for not more than three (3) consecutive terms.



This update addresses information on progress on major facilities projects in the district over the past month.

#### I. Zervas Elementary School Project

The construction phase has progressed to the point where exterior and interior framing is underway and has been completed in one section of the building. Masonry work is also underway.

The City Traffic Council and others continue to evaluate Beethoven Road for conversion to a one way road during designated school hours to allow for a parent drop-off with a passing lane. A designated passing lane is expected to be important to avoid vehicular congestion and unsafe conditions going forward.

#### III. Cabot School Project

The Cabot School project has passed several critical milestones in the past month. A site visit was conducted by Massachusetts DEP on October 4, 2016 related to compliance with the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act (MEPA). The site visit was routine with no substantive issues identified. The Massachusetts Historic Commission completed its review of the project submission and issued a positive letter with comments in support of the planned restoration and other project elements that highlight the historic 1929 building. The MSBA project scope and budget conference was held October 17, 2016 to review the budget submission; there were no substantive issues with budgeted costs. This is a normal step in advance of the November 9<sup>th</sup> board meeting where approval is anticipated. The City Council Public Facilities Committee meeting to initiate 5-58 site plan review and approval was held on October 19, 2016; the site plan was approved by the committee and is being

forwarded to Finance Committee for their review on October 24, 2016. The City Council is expected to act on site plan approval on November 21, 2016.

#### IV. NECP/150 Jackson Road

The former Aquinas property has had a new address designated at 150 Jackson Road; the 15 Walnut Park entrance is no longer the address of record. Preschool has continued to settle into the new space and awaits the completion of some limited punch list items and access via a vertical lift to the upper floor and to a new playground. The weather so far has enabled neighborhood walks during outdoor time and they have used their heavily scheduled indoor gross motor/OT/PT space to the extent possible. Both the playground and installation of the lift is taking longer than originally hoped due to lead time for site preparation and ordering and installing equipment. The installation of playground equipment has begun. It is the stairway vertical lift which requires interior demolition and construction that has the longest timeframe; estimates are for completion in December. City and schools are working diligently to ensure no further delays occur and that the aggressive schedule stays on track. The window installation is in its final phase.

#### V. Short-term Space/Modulars/Ed Center

The contract for the modular installation has been awarded to Caruso & McGovern. Both the Brown and Newton South installation sites are on scheduled for preparatory and foundation work starting this week. Both City Public Buildings and the contractor are committed to completing the installations at South and Brown while fall weather remains favorable.

In anticipation of the internal renovations to the Ed Center ground level, city and schools have been working to line up the various on call trades to complete the limited demolition and construction work including plasterboard, electrical, painting, flooring and bathroom renovation work. The district has been reviewing several options for schematic design provided by Raymond Design Associates in late August/early September. The programmatic needs for the ground level of the Ed Center have now been finalized and work will be able to start in earnest.

The south wing of the ground level will be used for Central High School, a specialized high school program to meet the educational and therapeutic needs of students with a range of emotional and learning needs. Central High School has been based in the Ed Center annex building.

The annex space consists of two masonry construction buildings built in 1966. One building will continue to house the Middle School Stabilization Program (MSP) which supports students with short-term placements during times of crisis or transition. The space is suited to students in this program because it is quiet and separate from the typical school environment. The Connections program has a home base at the annex for post-graduate students (18-22 years old) who spend a portion of their days in supported outside placements for developing independent living, vocational skills, and community involvement and life skills. With Central High School's relocation, both programs will be able to expand their space to better meet student needs. The life skills component of the Connections program can now be supported by real-life independent living and vocational training spaces that are being developed in the additional space.

Also on the Ed Center ground level, space is planned for an additional professional development conference space. IT management, with some adjustments, will be returning to their former space adjacent to IT services already located on the basement level. This will ease crowding and allow for some space reorganization on the Ed Center first and second floors. Understanding our Differences and the Newton Schools Foundation will also be accommodated on the lower level.

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
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
