WHEREAS, the ingredients in pesticide products, alone and in combination, have long-term toxic effects on the brain and nervous system, the endocrine system, and the immune system; and

WHEREAS, exposure to pesticides is particularly harmful to children and their development; and

WHEREAS, there are safer more cost-effective and ecologically-sound ways to control pests in our landscapes and buildings; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the City of Newton and its residents to protect the quality of our buildings and landscapes while reducing threats to our health and the contamination of the environment; and

WHEREAS, the City of Newton recognizes that public agencies should be a model of environmentally safe practices and that an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) policy for our public buildings and grounds enables the city to accrue the financial benefits of planning, prevention, and responsible management.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

That His Honor the Mayor and Members of the Honorable Board of Aldermen of the <u>City of Newton</u> do hereby endorse March 2008 as ALTERNATIVES TO PESTICIDES MONTH.

AND FURTHERMORE BE IT RESOLVED:

We urge citizens to follow the City's leadership, to adopt the environmental practices that eliminate pests and avoid pesticides in their homes, gardens, lawns, businesses, workplaces, places of worship, and schools throughout our community.
