NOTE: Ald. Baker said they were pleased to file this item as they felt Mr. Olson was doing a wonderful job. Ald. Johnson added her thanks to Mr. Olson for a job well done. Ald. Coletti asked if Mr. Olson was pleased with his new position and with working with the Board of Aldermen. Mr. Olson said it was the right move for him and he has found it rewarding and endlessly fascinating. He also said it was a wonderful way in which to learn about the City of Newton and the Aldermen who were leading the community. He said he looked forward to serving for another 2 years. Ald. Coletti said that he found it very satisfying to have Mr. Olson at the Board meetings and was glad Mr. Olson has restored that tradition. Ald. Coletti stated that the new Board will ultimately make the decision, but they were happy to recommend that they do so.

Introduction

Ald. Linsky presented this item. He noted that it had been discussed and approved in Committee previously subject to an amended draft ordinance reviewed by the Law Department. That amended draft was presented to the Committee. The amended ordinance takes the original ordinance that was passed for the Boys and Girls Club and incorporates into it the provisions for Newton North. There is a fine structure and they have put a provision into the fine structure that a smoking cessation class may be taken in lieu of a fine.

Student Participation

Ald. Johnson said that the Boys and Girls club launched the idea for this ordinance as part of a program around government with the help of Ald. Gentile. It was their way of seeing something go through the legislative process so she felt it was great to see this coming through again as part of a student initiative.

Konstantin Dimov of 37 Cook Street Newton, was representing students at Newton North who were in favor of this ordinance. He said he initiated this idea through his community service group and when Ms. Price became the Principal it gained some momentum. He felt this would provide the greatest benefit, not necessarily to the students that already smoke, but to the incoming freshmen at Newton North. He said they might see Smokers Alley as a way to fit in and if the school provided that group as an opportunity, many new students would take it. Smokers Alley was a self sustaining culture and he didn't think it belonged in a school.

School Perspective

Alison Malkin, Prevention and Intervention Counselor at Newton North, presented 3 letters of support that are attached to this report. She said she worked with students at risk and having an "alley" where smokers congregated sent a message that the school condoned smoking. Many of the students knew her concerns and although they would like to continue smoking there, understood why she would like to have a smoke free zone. She said if they reduced accessibility, fewer students would be exposed to smoking, there would be less smoking. And younger students would be less likely to start smoking. She recognized that some students have an addiction and they hoped to help them with their cessation program. She said they wanted to teach students how to engage in healthy and positive ways to handle stress other than smoking. She believed it sent a strong message that they care enough to want to do this for the students.

Jennifer Price, Principal, Newton North High School, said she believed in health and sending the right message to teenagers. She felt that the students stepping one foot of

school property and smoking and the staff not being able to do anything about it was sending the wrong message. She said they all knew the negative effects of cigarette smoking. She pointed out that Smokers Alley was a place that some students would not walk through. She was concerned that they may lose students who feel too intimidated and may decide not to come to school because of it. She said that Ally Malkin knew the kids that were in Smokers Alley and talked to them on a consistent basis. She asked them what she needed to do to help them and she worked very closely with them on a daily basis. The staff wanted to support the students in making healthy choices. They spend a lot of money to educate these students and allowing them to smoke everyday knowing it was bad for them was not the right thing to do. Ms. Price said she has seen this work very successfully in a previous school. She agreed with Konstantin Dimov that it was an opportunity to change the culture of a school and it may take a few years but they felt they had to start somewhere.

Rozanne Milner, the school nurse at Newton North, said that children that go out to smoke often come into the health room dizzy, nauseous, and with headaches. They've very often missed class because they've gone out to smoke.

Limiting Ordinance

Ald. Parker asked about adults who might be smoking walking down the street. He asked if the ordinance would still be effective if it were limited to students, persons under 18 years of age, and City employees and faculty of the school. Ms. Price said she didn't know the legal ramifications of limiting the ordinance. She wanted them to remember that the campus aides and house masters would be the one's enforcing this. They were not out to "get" people walking down the street, they were in the business of getting students to make smarter choices. Ald. Parker said that a homeowner could call the police if they saw someone smoking at the bus stop or outside their home, and the police would be compelled to respond. Marie Lawlor said that ordinances can not be targeted towards any particular age group.

Ald. Johnson and Ald. Linsky both commented that they have not received any calls of concern from neighbors about the possibility of smokers spilling onto their property.

Fines

Marie Lawlor pointed out that the fines were listed in the section of the ordinances that lists fines. A reference is made to that section in this ordinance. Ald. Coletti thought the fines should be listed within the ordinance. Ald. Johnson said that placing fines in one section makes it more efficient when updates occur. The fines for a first offense would be a warning, then \$50, \$100, and \$200 subsequently. The offender would have the choice of enrolling in a smoking cessation program in lieu of the fine. Ald. Baker said that when the ordinance is posted, they can include a sheet that explains the fine structure

Private Ways

Ald. Coletti pointed out that there were some private ways that fell within the non smoking zone. The private ways would not be subject to this ordinance and could make

it difficult to enforce as the ordinance extends only to public property. Ald. Coletti was concerned that the private ways could become the new Smokers Alley. A sign would have to go up that there was no smoking on the private way but those residents would have to agree to that. Ald. Johnson said they would have to reach out to those who live on private ways that may be within the non smoking zone.

Enforcement

Ald. Hess-Mahan wanted to be sure they it was known that the school officials would be the ones deputized by Commissioner Naparstek to enforce this ordinance. The police can not be left out of the ordinance enforcement, but he wanted it known that the school staff would be the first line of defense. The campus aides and counselors knew the students who smoked. They would not be inclined to go running after some random person that might be smoking while walking down the street. Commissioner Naparstek said they were not interested in collecting fines from students who were smoking, they were interested in providing ways to help the students stop smoking and deter them from smoking.

Public Comment

Cindy Carter, 36 Amherst Rd., Newton, said her fourth son was currently at Newton North. She was not in favor of smoking, nobody in her family smoked and she had a relative that died of cancer due to smoking. She felt that children needed to be in school and if the goal was the health of the students, they needed to realize that not graduating from high school was extremely unhealthy. She was concerned that removing Smokers Alley might prevent students from staying in school and graduating. She said removing Smokers Alley may prevent some students from smoking, others may smoke in the bathroom, some others may walk out of the non smoking zone and come back, and others may walk the 300 yards away and not come back. She wondered if the administration was doing this because seeing kids smoke made them uncomfortable. She wanted them to think about the possibility of losing some students from the school if this were to go into effect.

Other Health Issues

Ald. Coletti wanted to point out that diabetes II has become a huge health issue for children as well. He felt that if Newton North were concerned about health, they should keep that in mind as well. Commissioner Naparstek said he and his staff were looking into ways to provide some healthy alternatives for children.

Newton South

Newton South was not interested in pursuing a similar ordinance at this time, but they fully supported Newton North in their initiative.

Ald. Parker moved approval of this item and was approved by a vote of 8-0.

Introduction

Ald. Johnson reminded the members that the Committee had discussed this several times in the recent past. At the last meeting, the Chairman asked the committee members to reach out to their community to find out if the issue of having different restrictions on Saturdays and Sundays was indeed a problem. The Department of Public Works was consulted and it was learned that there was quite a bit of construction work that occurred on Saturdays by DPW and its vendors. Not allowing this construction work to happen on Saturday's would result in work taking much longer to complete. Ald. Hess-Mahan said there were issues that needed further discussion and he would not want to hold up this ordinance with amendments. He suggested created a parens (2) to deal with the amendments.

Discussion of Saturday/Sunday Issue

Marie Lawlor said she spoke to David Turocy and he believed that City work would be severely impacted if they were not allowed to work on Saturdays. Commissioner Lojek said that he spent 20 years as a contractor and spent 6 days a week every week working. It's just the way it was in the construction business. He felt that if that if it was limited on Saturday, then it needed to be allowed on Sunday, or vice versa. He said he felt this was raising a religious issue that he did not want to touch. He was also concerned about the private homeowner wanting to do work on their home over the weekend. He felt it would be detrimental to contractors and unworkable for the private homeowner and they would be inundated with complaints. He also said it would drive up the cost of construction in the City.

Ald. Parker said he agreed with Commissioner Lojek in that there needed to be some hours that construction could take place over the weekend. Ald. Parker clarified that he felt Saturday and Sunday were days of rest for different groups of people and the City should have the same noise level regulations on both days. He was not suggesting that construction could not be done, but that if it was done, it should be within the noise level regulations. If louder work was being done it should be restricted to later in the day and the quieter work earlier in the day. He wanted both days to have the exact same restrictions and allowances. He also said that the ordinance raised an issue that goes back many years based on religion and he would like to remedy that and make it equal. He thought it was possible to craft a standard for each weekend day and weekdays, and they didn't need to be the same for weekends and weekdays.

Ald. Johnson said that she spoke to many people about the Saturday/Sunday issue and she was not made aware of any concerns. There was a public hearing in the fall and not one person brought it up as a concern. She did not want to hold up the ordinance for this

one part and agreed with Ald. Hess-Mahan that they deal with issue with a parents. Ald. Parker said he spoke to dozens of people about this issue. He heard from them that they felt here has been discrimination written into the State law and it was offensive to them. They were concerned there would be backlash if they mentioned it so they don't speak at public meetings but they felt the pain of it in a very real way. Every time their Saturday was interrupted by loud noises, they were just as distressed as someone whose Sunday was interrupted by loud noises. Ald. Parker said they were out there and hurting.

Ald. Hess-Mahan said he had a similar experience to Ald. Parker's. He heard from many more people than he would have expected that this was a sore point. He agreed that they should have the same standard for both days but would need some time to determine what that might be.

Ald. Parker said he was suggesting coming up with a reasonable standard for the weekend. He felt that if a parents was formed it would sit there and not be dealt with for a long time to come. He felt it was the time, now, when the ordinance was before them to take the discrimination out of it. Ald. Coletti said he wanted to spend a little time in Committee to get this worked out so that the Full Board meetings didn't get bogged down with motions and amendments being made on the floor.

Ald. Lipof felt that this was ineffective and it wouldn't be enforced. He said he has lived in the most Jewish section of Newton and has never had a single complaint about this.

Referral

Ald. Johnson said she would like to move that this item be referred to next year's Board and that a public meeting be called in January to find out the depth of concern on this issue.

#422-06 ALD. HESS-MAHAN requesting creation of an ordinance prohibiting the use of portable gasoline-powered leaf blowers within the City limits.

Seasonal Ban

Ald. Hess-Mahan said he met with the Parks and Recreation Commission for their advice. The Commissioner said that the landscapers that the City used for their larger projects, even with the seasonal ban, quoted their rates \$60,000 higher to use rakes instead of leafblowers. There was also a concern about the length of the ban which was proposed at April 15 through October 15. Several members of Parks and Rec. said they needed until May 1 to reasonably get their work done. This would be the clean up of parks, ball fields, playgrounds etc.

City Exemption

The Commissioner said there had been any complaints about noise from City machines. Perhaps that was because parks, etc., are more removed from the houses. Ald. Hess-

Mahan said he has received many complaints about City equipment that was on the street and closer to people's homes. Other communities have dealt with this issue by either exempting the city from the noise and/or leaf blower ordinance or creating a buffer zone of 150-200 feet. This would require the noise source to be no closer 150-200 feet from a residential property line. This did not address the emissions problems, however. Half of the Commission felt that it wasn't fair to restrict residents and exempt the City.

Additional Amendment

Ald. Hess-Mahan pointed out that the other important point was to make people aware that they can't blow leaves onto other people's properties or into the street. If the leaves will be picked up right away, it would be alright to blow them into the street for a very short period of time. Ald. Hess-Mahan added a section that prohibited blowing the debris near open windows, doors and air ducts. He noted that he wanted to get the Committee's advice and did not have an amended ordinance.

Golf Courses

Ald. Baker said that Newton was responsible for the Newton Commonwealth Golf Course. He spoke to the groundskeeper there and he reported that he has occasionally gotten some complaints from people in Boston that are right next to the road. Other than that, only one neighbor had ever called with a complaint and they adjusted what they were doing and that took care of the problem. Cleaning and clearing the open spaces was an ongoing task. Ald. Baker said they needed to be aware of that as they cut the grass quite frequently and clear the area on a very regular basis all summer long. Ald. Hess-Mahan reiterated the two options of either exempting the City from the ordinance or enacting a buffer zone around residences.

Rakes vs. Leaf blowers

Ald. Parker asked if leaf vacuums were covered by this ordinance and Ald. Hess-Mahan said that they were. Ald. Parker said he did some research on the claim that using rakes instead of leaf blowers added significant time commitments and cost versus using a leaf blower. He found studies in two communities that abolished leaf blowers to maintain city properties and there was no net increase in hours to get the work done. He also found news of a carefully supervised contest pitting leaf blowers against rakes and the leaf blowers did not win. Ald. Hess-Mahan said that Central Park in NY decided to forego using leaf blowers. They get city employees as well as volunteers to come and rake the park.

Referral

Ald. Baker said that if the noise ordinance were being referred to the new Board, he suggested they do the same with this item as there were complimentary elements. They would then have the opportunity to clarify all the finer points. Ald. Hess-Mahan made a motion to refer to the next Board. The Committee approved this referral by a vote of 8-0.

Introduction

Ald. Burg presented this item saying that Nancy Sibori and Dan Shaw were present from Dialogues for Peace and Justice. Ald. Burg said she believed in this and felt there were certain issues they should take a stand on and this was one. She and Ald. Linsky docketed this at the request of Dialogues for Peace and Justice who did the work on wording the resolution which they took from about 300 towns across the country.

Dialogues for Peace and Justice

Dan Shaw 116 Church Street, Newton. Mr. Shaw was representing Dialogues for Peace and Justice. He thanked the Committee for taking up this item and said this represented a broad movement that was taking place across the country. This particular resolution was supported by members of the Democratic Committee, Moveon, the DFA and Newton Dialogues and it was signed by many of the people who ran for alderman in the most recent election.

Local Issue

Mr. Shaw said he understood there was some debate over whether or not this should be a local issue, but he felt it was. He said there were financial issues as well as a decimated National Guard who were no longer available to help out in local problems and crises. He said it was also a local issue due to the number of local citizens who return from war and their lives were economically disrupted, and who had physical and psychological disabilities. Some of these people become homeless veterans and may be somewhat invisible. He hoped as with the Biolab resolution and the Patriot Act resolution that the Committee would pass this one as well. Ald. Burg noted that the U.S. was sending \$12 billion a month to Iraq. As long as the U.S. does that, local needs could not be met.

Veteran Care

Ald. Merrill said that there were 27,000 soldiers who have been injured. He would like to see something in this resolution that demanded that they get support and care. Ald. Linsky said he would happy to draft something with Ald. Merrill about the care that the veterans should be getting. It would perhaps be a separate item.

Time Concern and Support for Resolution

Ald. Lipof said that they all agree on what the resolution was saying. He said most people don't like war and want the troops to come home. For the Board of Aldermen to spend their time on work that has, in most cases, already been done at higher levels, didn't make sense to him. When these resolutions come to the floor of the Board, everyone votes in favor because it was such an obvious thing. Ald. Coletti said if this item came to the floor on the Board and was put on second call, he would charter it. He didn't want to spend hours on a resolution that was a gesture of support. Ald. Baker agreed that this was not time sensitive and this was not the right time in the Board schedule. If there were aldermen who wanted to put this on second call, it could take time that they don't have right now. He suggested referring this to the next Board. There was substantial support for this in Committee and would like to recommend that it pass in the next board. Ald. Johnson had wanted this docketed in January as she knew it would not be simple and fast.

Ald. Linsky said he was pleased to co-sponsor this resolution. He said that consistent with what they had in their Biolab resolution, there was a newspaper article recently stating that the studies that were done were insufficient. He felt it was important to add a voice to the national debate even though they were not the body that would be making the final decisions about the war in Iraq

The Committee voted to refer this item to the next Board with a recommendation to pass.

Introduction

Fran Towle, Commissioner of Parks and Recreation Department explained that they noticed more hazardous and dead trees than usual around the City this year. She met with her Director of Urban Forestry, Marc Welch, and his staff did a "windshield" survey of the City. They found that there were in fact more dead trees than usual. They typically take out about 400 dead trees and year, but they found 950 dead and hazardous trees this

year. Ms. Towle said they found it imperative to take these trees down now before they presented a serious problem.

Funding

She said they have tried to consolidate some of their in house money to deal with these trees, but they need this additional \$36,000 and they'll be back for another \$40,000 to complete all 950 trees. They planned on doing the windshield surveys from now on to make sure they were getting all the trees down that should be taken down. They were

taking trees down right now with their current funding. Marc Welch said \$36,000 is enough to take down 145 trees: \$30,000 was tree removal cost and \$6,000 was for the police detail. He said they were allocated \$155,000 out of their current operating budget for tree removal, but this is extra as there were so many more trees identified as in need of removal.

Alternative Uses for Wood

Ald. Lipof asked if the City ever looked into selling the wood from these trees to companies that turn them into wood pellets for energy use. Marc Welch said the wood goes to the dump and they pay to get rid of it. He said some people have asked them for chips that they bring north for electrical plants, but the City did not generate enough to make it cost effective for them. He said that often the wood was very rotten and unusable. Most of it was getting chipped and perhaps used for bark mulch.

Marc Welch said he would provide a list of the trees to the Committee. It is attached to this report.

The Committee voted to approve this item 8-0.
