SUBJECT: 100% Schematic Design and Site Plan Review

Honorable Council:

On Wednesday, 28 September 2016 the Design Review Committee met and reviewed the 100% Schematic Design and proposed site plans dated 28 September 2016 as presented by DiNisco Design Partnership on behalf of the Public Buildings Department and Newton Public Schools for the above referenced project.

The City of Newton working in collaboration with the Massachusetts School Building Authority is proposing the renovation and addition of the existing Cabot School. The existing building is to be renovated and new Library, Gymnasium and Classroom additions will be constructed resulting in an 84,500 S.F. school. The Project has undergone several reviews with the Newton Historic Commission which unanimously voted on 28 August 2016 its support for the proposed site plan and building massing.

The proposed project site includes the existing school site, the abutting property to the north at 23 Parkview Avenue (which was recently acquired by the City for the Cabot project), and the portion of Parkview Avenue abutting the school site to the east. The proposed site design features a new entry gathering plaza which directly connects the school and existing Cabot Park and includes shared parking, shared emergency access and egress, and new play structures located on the adjacent park. Final site planning has further reduced the impacts to the park which were previously approved by the Parks and Recreation Commission on 30 September 2015. The proposed site plan includes a new bus pull-off and loading space, new van loading and parking area, a new student drop-off / pickup lane, and additional new on-site parking. Site work also includes new utilities and landscaping.

The Design Review Committee determined that the schematic design and site plans are appropriate. Through the design review process several alternatives were studied. The DRC concurs that the proposed site plan organization and building massing provide the following significant benefits:

- Provides the best solution to the educational program requirements and functional needs of the school. Distributing the program around the existing structure reduces internal congestion and noise by separating the high use spaces; gymnasium, library, art, music and cafetorium, while the original building remains an integral part of the facility and hub of the school.
- Balances the needs of a modern elementary school with the integrity of the existing historic structure and continues its use as a public school. The proposed project will maintain and repair the exterior of the original 1929 building including masonry, stone work and cupola repairs, and replace the existing non-original windows with windows that are commensurate with the original building.
- Strengthens the relationship between the adjacent Cabot Park and the school by creating a physical continuous connection resulting in an enhanced public realm which provides greater student, pedestrian and public safety.
- Separates vehicular access and flow by providing three drop-off and pick-up zones. Buses are located in a pull-off directly adjacent to
 Cabot Street. Van loading and unloading is located in the front lot accessed from Bridges Street. Parent drop-off and pick-up is
 accommodated along the drive located at the north side of the site. Further, by directly connecting the school and park property,
 additional access is available on East Side Parkway on the opposite side of the park. Onsite parking as well as parking on adjacent
 Bridges Street, Parkview Avenue, and East Side Parkway is also provided.

- Is contextually appropriate to the surrounding residential neighborhood. Program spaces have been situated such that the smaller library mass is located along Bridges Street, the larger gymnasium has been located to front on the large open space afforded by Cabot Park while set back from Cabot Street. The cafeteria and classroom wing mass is located to the north of the original structure. By distributing the program the resulting mass to the north is therefore less dominant. In addition the original school entry is now both visible and accessible directly from Cabot Street.
- Mitigates the loss of views. At locations where additions meet the existing building lighter transparent corners utilizing glass allow the original building mass to be more visible. The existing masonry and stone facades at the new gymnasium connector and new entry between the existing building and north addition are left exposed and featured on the interior to further strengthen the view of the original building. Exterior fenestration at the new additions has been designed to create simple, unified elevations distinguishable from the existing building. Proportions, locations and modulation of new windows have been developed to be responsive to the original punched openings in the existing structure.

The Committee voted unanimously to recommend that the project be presented for site plan approval. In accordance with Section 5-58 of the Revised Ordinances, this letter is to petition the City Council on behalf of the School Department for Site Plan Approval. The DRC identified the following areas of design which will continue to be evaluated and refined by the design team and City through the Design Development Phase.

- Continue to develop opportunities for and refine pedestrian crossings, sidewalks, and walkways at Cabot Park. Particular attention should be given to locations of crosswalks around the school and surrounding streets.
- Coordinate with Parks & Recreation on final locations, widths, materials, and lighting for new pedestrian paths through Cabot Park to ensure maintainability and ease of snow removal.
- Provide enhanced or expanded bike rack facilities to promote bicycle use.
- Continue to develop opportunities for additional drop off and parking along Eastside Parkway. Continue to develop opportunities for shared parking on Bridges Ave., with Cabot Village, and on adjoining streets if needed to create a Parking Management Plan.
- Review the width of Cabot Street bus drop off and configure so as to discourage use by unauthorized vehicles.
- Coordinate proposed tree locations, sizes and species so as not to interfere with access of emergency vehicles. Trees should also be set back such that root zones do not interfere with paved areas.
- Continue to look for opportunities within the building, site and plaza to accommodate educational program enhancements, while continuing to improve the efficiency of the building and site. Particular attention should be given to plaza steps to provide additional railings and material changes to make steps highly visible. Lighting for plaza, walks, access and egress, and site to be further refined.
- Coordinate design and location of storm drainage infiltration systems, pervious pavement and potential waterproofing to protect existing basement from flooding.
- Continue with integrated design approach to the building's design through its mechanical systems, envelope, floor to floor heights, ceiling heights and the height and extent of glass and glazing, methods of sun control, day lighting, electrical lighting, sound control, and solar PV all to promote efficient performance of the building and reduce its overall energy consumption, consistent with both its purpose and context.
- The aesthetic of the exterior building elevations will continue to be developed, with a focus on window sizes and patterning as well as material choices, such as masonry sizes, coursing, and patterning. Attention will be given to the base, body, and cornice of the building. Exterior materials and colors to create both a harmonious and distinctive addition to the existing school.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I write to request that your Honorable Council docket for consideration a request to authorize the appropriation of \$46,590,000 and authorize a general obligation borrowing of an equal amount for the purpose of funding the replacement of the Cabot Elementary School.

As you know, the citizens of the City of Newton approved a Debt Exclusion Ballot Question on March 12, 2013, by a count of 9,879 "Yes" votes to 7,919 "No" votes, to allow the City of Newton to exempt from the provisions of Proposition 2 ½ the amounts required to pay for the bonds issued in order to renovate or replace the Cabot Elementary School.

The Massachusetts School Building Authority is scheduled to vote on the Project Scope and Budget on November 9, 2016. Per MSBA requirements, the total amount of the project must be authorized. Proposed Sidewalk Clearing Ordinance

Docket #335-16

Materials for Discussion

PROPOSED SNOW ORDINANCE AMENDMENT (9/29/2016):

- Consolidates sidewalk snow removal requirements into one section Sec. 26-8.
- Commercial: adds mixed use and manufacturing districts to the business district requirements, and reduces the time period for compliance from 24 hours to 12 hours. Changes fine structure from graduated (\$100/\$200/\$300) to \$100 flat for each offense. (Each day violation continues constitutes a separate offense under Sec. 1-6 of the ordinances).
- Commercial: includes properties used for institutional purposes with properties used for commercial purposes in other districts to which business district requirements apply.
- Adds a new category to which business district requirements and fines will apply: multi-family buildings containing 4 or more dwelling units, regardless of district.
- Makes the pilot program for residential districts permanent, and reduces the time for compliance from 30 hours to 24 hours. Adds \$25 fine for any offense. (Each day violation continues constitutes a separate offense under Sec. 1.6 of the Ordinances).
- Deletes current snow clearing assistance provisions for compilation by DPW of lists of persons available to provide snow clearing either for a fee or on a volunteer basis, but authorizes mayor or designee to coordinate volunteer or municipal snow clearing assistance for residential district requirements in cases of hardship.
- Authorizes mayor or designee to grant hardship exemptions due to health and financial duress.
- Authorizes Mayor or designee to delay period for compliance depending on severity of storm or other factors.

SNOW ORDINANCE DRAFT FOR DISCUSSION 9/29/2016 REDLINE COPY

Sec. 26-8. Removal of snow and ice from sidewalks in certain districts.

Every owner or occupant of a building or lot of land abutting upon a sidewalk which is within a business district, as defined by chapter 30, and every owner or occupant of a building situated in other than a business district as defined by such chapter and which is used for a purpose permitted in districts zoned for business but not permitted in districts zoned for single, private or general residences, whether or not such use is a nonconforming use under the provisions of such chapter, which building abuts upon a sidewalk, or stands upon a lot of land abutting upon a sidewalk, shall cause any snow to be removed from the sidewalk and any ice on the sidewalk to be removed, sanded or salted within twenty four (24) hours after such snow has ceased to fall or such ice has come to be formed. The preceding provision shall apply to snow and ice which falls from buildings, other structures, trees or bushes as well as to that which falls from clouds.

(a) Business, mixed use, and manufacturing districts. In all business, mixed use and manufacturing districts as defined by chapter 30, and for properties used for commercial or institutional purposes in other districts, the owner, or his/her agent, of any land abutting a paved sidewalk of a street shall cause said sidewalk, including handicap access ramps, to be maintained in a non-slippery condition suitable for pedestrian travel by clearing all snow and ice from a pathway at least thirty-six (36) inches in width along the length of such sidewalk within the first twelve (12) hours after such snow or ice has come upon the sidewalk, and shall maintain the sidewalk in a non-slippery condition by application(s) of sand and/or melting agents as may be necessary for this purpose.

(b) Multi-family dwellings. Tata & Howard is pleased to provide a revised project budget estimate for demolition of the Stanton Avenue and Countryside Road Elevated Water Tanks.

Based upon information provided by the City, each tank contains lead-based paint on the exterior of the tank. This will require lead paint abatement of the exterior coating prior to demolition on the areas of the tanks where torch cutting will take place. At this time, it is unknown if the interior coating of each tank contains lead-based paint. We recommend that the City test the interior coating of each tank for lead content. Determining whether or not the interior coating at each tank contains lead will have a significant impact on the overall project cost. Since this is unknown at this time, we have provided project budgetary estimates for both scenarios (interior coating containing lead-based paint and not containing lead-based paint).

The total estimated probable construction cost for demolition of both tanks, including removal and proper disposal of all scrap materials, lead paint abatement of the tank exterior and interior torch cutting locations, foundation removal, cutting and capping of the existing water main, site restoration, engineering, and contingency is \$520,000.

If it is determined that the interior coating of the tanks does not contain lead-based paint, the total estimated project cost for demolition of both tanks, including removal and proper disposal of all scrap materials, lead paint abatement of the tank exterior torch cutting locations only, foundation removal, cutting and capping of the existing water main, site restoration, engineering, and contingency is \$420,000.

In addition, should the City decide to remediate each tank site to remove lead-contaminated soils, the estimated cost to excavate the top six inches of soil, haul off site, properly dispose of the contaminated material, restore the site and contingency is \$90,000 per tank site.
