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



RE: Summary of the Demolition of the Garage and site restoration at 525 Winchester Street, Newton Highlands

The Public Buildings Department requests the sum of \$115,500.00 to fund the Demolition of the Garage and site restoration at 525 Winchester Street, Newton Highlands.

This project was a result of the negotiations with the Recreation Commission to allow the Fire Department to place the firefighters and equipment from the old Fire Station #10 to a temporary site during the construction of the new fire station. As part of the negotiations, Recreation Commission requested the garage building on this site would either be fully renovated for Recreation Department activities use or torn down and the site returned to green Recreational Space. At the time of the creation of the Fire Station #10 construction budget, no determination was made as to the final dispensation of the garage, therefore, no funds were placed in the budget for this garage. It was hoped that through tight fiscal management of the project budget, potential funds would become available for this purpose.

However, through an oversight, no mention of work to be done at this site was included in the Bond Sale Request, preventing the Public Buildings Department from using funds that are currently available in the construction budget as the project is now in the closeout stage.

The building is currently housing a carpenter shop as well as providing a storage site of building materials for the Public Buildings Department. Due to the building being demolished the Public Buildings Department will have to move the Carpentry Shop and some of items stored to our facility located at 52 Elliot Street. Minor modifications to the Public Buildings Department Garage area will be required.

It is the intent of the Public Buildings Department to turn back the above total of \$115,500.00 from the Fire Station #10 construction project contingency to the Budget Reserve Fund and request additional funds to cover the following:

Demolition of Existing Building and Site Restoration:	\$ 53,400.00
Disposal of materials stored that are no longer required, obsolete or hazardous:	43,775.00
Moving of Carpentry Shop and required stored materials from Winchester Street:	7,825.00
Modifications to existing Public Buildings Department Garage:	5,000.00
Contingency:	5,500.00
Total	\$115 500 00

## **REVISED** DRAFT FOR DISCUSSION – STAND ALONE STORMWATER FEE

1. ADD a new section to Division 1 of Article IV DRAINS of Chapter 20 as follows:

Section 29-120 Stormwater use charge

- (a) Every owner of property in the city shall pay a charge for use of public main drains and stormwater facilities which shall be based on the following annual rates. Such charge shall be billed quarterly:
  - 1. 1-4 family dwellings

- (b) Property owners that are certified as eligible for the water discount program described in section 29-36(b) shall also be eligible for a discount of thirty percent (30%) off the stormwater use charge.
- (c) The provisions of sections 20-80 (d) through (f) pertaining to billing and liens shall apply to stormwater use charges.
- (d) The commissioner of public works may establish a stormwater use charge credit policy and may grant credits of up to 25% to be applied against the stormwater use charge for properties that have on-site functioning stormwater management systems or other measures to reduce or mitigate that property's use of public main drains and stormwater facilities.
- (e) The commissioner of public works may establish policies and may promulgate rules and regulations necessary to implement this section.

2. Delete all references to "stormwater" contained in Sec. 20-80 as follows:

## Sec. 29-80. Sewer use charge.

(a) Estates whose building sewers discharge directly or indirectly into public sewers of the city, shall pay a charge for the use of sewage works in proportion to water consumption except that a charge for the use sewage works shall not be made for water consumption registered on or attributable to outdoor meters installed at residential properties in accordance with section 29-24 of this chapter.

## 1) Sewer rates

A charge for the use of sewer, which charge shall be made in proportion to water consumption, based on the water meter reading, or estimated water meter reading, excluding outdoor meters for the same property, for the prior quarterly billing period shall be made at the following schedule of rates or prices (effective July 1, 2015). Such sewer bill shall be issued on a quarterly basis:

Nine dollars and twenty-five cents (\$9.25) per hundred cubic feet for consumption from 0 to 10 hundred cubic feet;

Nine dollars and seventy-five cents (\$9.75) per hundred cubic feet for consumption from 11 to 25 hundred cubic feet;

Eleven dollars and 50 cents (\$11.50) per hundred cubic feet for consumption from 26 to 60 hundred cubic feet;

Thirteen dollars and twenty-five cents (\$13.25) per hundred cubic feet for consumption above 60 hundred cubic feet."

## (2) Multi-dwelling properties

- a) For purposes of this subsection, the term Single Meter/Multi-Residence shall have the following meaning: A building, buildings, or part of a building which i) is used for residential use only, ii) contains more than one dwelling unit, and iii) receives water delivered through a single service pipe and meter. The term dwelling unit shall have the meaning set out in the definition that appears in section 30-1.
- b) For a Single Meter/Multi-Residence property, the applicable price or rate for use of sewer shall be determined by dividing the consumption by the number of dwelling units within such property.
- (3) Where water is supplied by the city through a meter that is not in good working order, the commissioner shall use any reasonable, fair, and appropriate method to determine the quantity of water consumed and shall issue the sewer use bill on that basis.

- (b) Such charges shall be reduced by a discount of thirty percent (30%) for those dwellings which are owned and inhabited by any person who is certified as eligible for the water discount program described in section 29-36(b). Whenever the board of assessors determines that a person is eligible for such water discount program, such board shall also determine said person to be eligible for a discount from the sewer use charges pursuant to this section, which certification shall continue for the same term as such person's certification for the water discount program; and said board shall forthwith so notify the Water and Sewer Division. Upon receipt of such notice, the Water and Sewer Division shall take the steps necessary to so reduce the bills issued for the seweruse.
- (c) All bills issued under this section, properly numbered for identification, shall be made out in the office of the commissioner. Such bills, together with a warrant for their collection, shall be delivered to the comptroller of accounts for forwarding to the city collector-treasurer as soon as made out, and the city collector-treasurer shall thereupon assume responsibility for such collection. Bills shall be due and payable thirty (30) days from their issuance.
- (d) All charges shall constitute a lien upon the land connected with the public sewer from the time of assessment and shall continue for the same period and under the same conditions as a lien established under General Laws, Chapter 80.
- (e) If a bill for sewer use becomes a lien, it shall bear interest at the rate provided by law from thirty (30) days after the date of billing until it is committed as part of a tax.
- (f) The occupant of any building shall be liable for the payment of the sewer use charge for such building, and the owner shall also be liable.
- (g) Except where the properties served are owned, occupied and operated by one owner and not sublet to various tenants, the rates for each meter shall be figured independently of all other meters. In multiple tenant properties served by one meter, the rates shall be based upon water usage recorded from said meter billed to the owner accordingly.
- (h) The commissioner is authorized to make abatements and rebates of charges when disproportionate to the service rendered. The commissioner shall certify to the comptroller of accounts the amounts of abatements and rebates for forwarding to the city collector-treasurer. (Rev. Ords. 1973, § 18-18; Rev. As per your request (#131-13) for periodic updates and discussion pertaining to the condition functioning, operations and management of all the city sewer, water and storm water systems including the following:

## **WATER METERS**

26,139 meters are reporting into the AMR system.

107 meters remaining that were not change out during meter R&R program.

## PRIVATE INFLOW REMOVAL PROGRAM

A total of 462 locations were identified under the Area C building inspections and during the Meter Replacement program, to date 352 have been removed from the sewer collection system. Homeowners are sent certified mail explaining the program and are assisted by Maria Rose (City of Newton Environmental Engineer) the needed course of action needed to remove the illicit connection.

## **RATES ANALYSES?**

As per your request (#313-15) for an update on the second water meter program pertaining to the inspection and programing of approximately 900 outdoor irrigation meters and the process going forward for the issuance, inspection and programming.

Since the start of the second water meter program 2880 residents requested second meters, of those to date 1313 second meter accounts have been generated. Currently 708 residents have received a water meter transponder from the Utilities Division but have not scheduled an appointment for Utilities personnel to inspect and activate the transponder which is needed to set up a second meter account within the billing office.

The Utilities Division in partnership with the Inspectional Services Department (ISD) evaluated the list containing the 704 transponders distributed by the Utilities Division with a list from ISD containing the plumbing permits issued for second meters to determine what residents have installed second meters without an inspection and activation of the transponder from the Utilities Division. This has been completed and resulted in 150 residents that installed a second meter without the Utilities Division performing an inspection.

The Utilities Billing office started sending letters to these residents two weeks ago and all 150 residents will be notified by December 11, 2015. To date 70 residents have responded and have been inspected or have scheduled an appointment.

The Utilities Division in conjunction with ISD is revising the program going forward in order to eliminate this issue. Some of those revisions will include but not limited to:

- Transponders will be issued and tracked at the time the plumbing permit is issued.
- Inspections for the plumbing permit and the activation of the transponder will take place at the same time.
- Construct web site to provide a cleared direction as to the process, web site to include pictures for the types of meters and plumbing configuration.
- All Final Reads will be manually read by Utilities Personnel
