Subject: Public Way Layout of a Portion of Christina Street

Christina Street, from Needham Street to the property line at #90 Christina Street, approximately 1,020 linear feet long, is currently not laid out as a public way. Christina Street from #90 to Wallace Street is a public way. Public Works has received a petition from the abutting property owners for the City to take this private portion of Christina Street as a public way.

The Christina Street roadway configuration was never laid out as a private way and, according to our research, is currently owned by the abutters. The City currently has a 20 foot wide right of way easement, approximately in the center of the roadway, formally used for access to water works facilities along the Charles River. The proposed roadway plan has a layout width of 40 feet, and is approximately 1.020 feet long. This would make Christina Street a public way in its entirety.

The reconstruction of Needham Street project proposes modifications to the Needham Street/ Christina Street intersection. These modifications are proposed to make this intersection, along with the Oak Street intersection, safer for vehicles, bicycles and pedestrians. The Needham Street project requires work within Christina Street. The project may also require traffic detours onto Christina Street. The project is simplified if Christina Street is taken by the City as a public way prior to project construction.

The roadway, as it now exists, meets the engineering design and construction standards of the city. No additional roadway construction is required nor is any additional funding requested. All modifications to the Needham Street/Christina Street intersection will be funded by the Needham Street project.

Should this proposed roadway layout be accepted by the Board of Aldermen, the layout plan will be filed with the Middlesex Registry of Deeds.

Thank you for your consideration and please docket this request with the Board of Aldermen.

WHEREAS, in the opinion of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Newton, the public necessity and convenience require that the following way should be laid out, graded and accepted:

CHRISTINA STREET, from Needham Street easterly a distance of approximately one thousand twenty (1,020) feet to the boundary of the existing public way portion of Christina Street shown as "CHRISTINA STREET 1931 LAYOUT" on a plan entitled "CITY OF NEWTON MASSACHUSETTS, CHRISTINA STREET LAYOUT AND ACCEPTANCE PLAN" dated February 13, 2012, by Louis M. Taverna, P.E., City Engineer, as Plan No. T44-38907; and

WHEREAS, said Board has appointed a time for a public hearing and has caused a notice thereof and of its intention in the matter to be given and said hearing has been held, it is therefore

ORDERED, that a portion of Christina Street is hereby laid out and accepted as a public street or way of the City of Newton, as shown on said plan; and it is further

ORDERED, that an easement for all public way purposes in the following described parcel of land with right to slope or bank on land adjoining for support of street, be and the same are hereby taken.

### **DESCRIPTION OF LAND TAKEN**

1. Said easement parcel is shown as "PARCEL A" on the plan described above, which plan is to be recorded at the Middlesex South Registry of Deeds with a copy of this order.



### **Community Preservation Committee FUNDING RECOMMENDATION**

### **PROJECT GOALS & ELIGIBILITY**

This project will restore the City-owned monument in Newton Cemetery, erected in 1864 to commemorate the sacrifice of Newton soldiers' lives in the Civil War. The monument's condition has deteriorated markedly since the original 2005-06 assessment supported with CPA funds. The Community Preservation Committee accepted this funding proposal off-cycle based on the sponsoring departments' presentation of strong evidence that another winter might cause additional serious damage, which could significantly increase the cost of restoring the monument.

This recommendation relies on the findings made for the CPC's March 2005 funding recommendation that the monument is eligible for funding under the Community Preservation Act, and that its restoration is consistent with priorities identified in Newton's Community Preservation Plan and Comprehensive Plan.

### RECOMMENDED FUNDING

On 24 April 2011 by a unanimous vote of 7-0 (members Wally Bernheimer and Dan Green absent), the Community Preservation Committee recommended that total funding of \$134,000 be appropriated to the control of the Commissioner of Public Works for this project. All funds should be drawn from the Community Preservation Fund's fund balance designated for historic resources and should be counted 100% in that category.

Funds may be used for all eligible purposes included implicitly or explicitly in the following summary budget:



### SPECIAL ISSUES CONSIDERED BY THE CPC

Ordinarily, the Committee prefers to base its construction funding recommendations on estimates informed by a final design or specifications. However, in this case it is recommending funding for design and construction simultaneously, with the intention of allowing all restoration work to be completed before the monument must weather another winter.

### ADDITIONAL RECOMMENDATIONS

- **1.** Funds should be appropriated to the control of the Engineering Division in the Department of Public Works, with the project engineer designated as the project manager.
- **2.** The historic preservation staff of the Planning and Development Department will provide additional advice or assistance as requested by the project manager.
- **3.** The project manager will provide in-person reports to the Community Preservation Committee on (a) the results of the project's design phase and (b) construction bidding, prior to the start of work at the site, and will provide the Committee with both in-person and written reports on the project's final results within 1month of project completion.
- **4.** Both City departments above will collaborate with the CPC, the Newton Veterans Department, Newton Cemetery, and other appropriate Newton organizations or agencies to publicize the project and to rededicate the restored monument in 2014, on or prior to the 150th anniversary of its original dedication.
- **5.** Any portion of the Community Preservation Fund grant not used for the purposes stated herein will be returned to the Newton Community Preservation Fund.

### **KEY OUTCOMES**

The Community Preservation Committee will evaluate this project based on the completion of all planned work:

- 1. prior to May 2014
- 2. for no more than the total funding recommended, and if possible, for less








## Monument Preservation Concerns



- Erosion and freeze/thaw have pushed the entablature away from the hillside and broken and cracked sections of stone, pushing different sections into or away from each other
- The iron pins holding sections together are rusting and may have expanded to the point where they crack the stone
- The Newton Cemetery removed the canon and top of the entablature to prevent their falling, but the monument still leans substantially
- The Newton Cemetery has also temporarily braced the structure, but as time goes on more and more pressure is exerted on it
- If not restored, the monument will continue to degrade and presents a safety hazard to anyone who visits it

FY 2013 Capital Improvement Plan

Public Works requests authorization to borrow \$4,239,878 to continue our long range plans to remove infiltration/inflow from the City's sewer system in the Newtonville and West Newton areas. This is known as Project Area 1 of the proposed 11 year Underground Infrastructure Strategic Improvement Plan prepared by the Utilities Division.

This borrowing authorization will benefit the City in the following ways:

- a. Newton has approximately 300 miles of public sewer pipeline, and much of the sewer pipe is approaching 100 years old. Due to the age of the pipes, a substantial amount of infiltration (from groundwater) into the system has been documented through engineering studies and surveys. In addition, a substantial amount of inflow into the system from sump pumps, roof leaders, and driveway drains (from storm events) has also been documented. The MWRA meters the City's sewer flows, and charges us for total flow, including this infiltration/inflow. Removal of this extraneous water will help reduce our annual sewer assessments by the MWRA.
- b. During significant storm events, the amount of stormwater entering the sewer system overwhelms the sewer system capacity to transport the wastewater. Surcharging and overflows occur, allowing raw sewage, which is heavily diluted, to contaminate the public way or alternatively, residential basements. This infiltration/inflow does not belong in the City's sewer system, and must be removed.

I formally request that this be docketed with the Honorable Board of Aldermen for authorization. Please contact me if you have any questions or need additional information.







The Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) assesses member communities for the distribution and treatment of water and sewer. The annual water charges are based upon metered water use for the immediately preceding calendar year. The preliminary Fiscal Year (FY) 2012 water and sewer assessments were provided to member communities on February 17, 2011 reflecting a water assessment to Newton of \$8,872,649. These preliminary MWRA water and sewer assessment figures were included within the Newton Proposed FY12 water and sewer budgets. In June 2011, MWRA finalized their FY12 Current Expense Budget and subsequently distributed final revised water and sewer assessments to communities. Final community assessments have traditionally been lower than the preliminary assessment figures. In FY12, however, water charges to all communities increased from the preliminary to the final creating a \$67,136 shortfall in Newton's water budget. The sewer assessment notably decreased by \$176,566 from the preliminary to the final assessment.

Newton's representative to the MWRA Advisory Board, City Engineer Lou Taverna along with other member communities, relayed strong objections to MWRA regarding increasing community assessments from the preliminary to the final assessments. MWRA staff relayed that the increase in the Water assessments in FY12 was due to some late additions to the budget and future final assessments would be no higher than the preliminary charges. This issue was identified as a concern in July but the decision was made to wait until the final quarter of FY12 to identify areas within the water budget where funds could be reallocated to address this anticipated shortfall. DPW is accordingly requesting that the transfers in the table below be executed:
