Public Works requests authorization to use \$170,000 from the stormwater reserve account for the removal of sediment from the three basins of the City Hall ponds. The total cost of this project is estimated to be \$320,000. The balance of \$150,000 from the FY12 stormwater operating budget will be set aside for this project.

The goals of this project include: restoring the hydraulic capacity, mitigating storm drainage impacts, and improving the recreational aesthetics of the historic City Hall Ponds. These improvements are intended to be accomplished by performing maintenance sediment removal from the pond, as well as portions of the Hammond Brook and Cold Springs Brook culverts, which convey flow to the ponds. A total of about 3,800 CY of sediment is estimated to be removed from the City Hall Ponds and upgradient culverts. Extensive testing of the sediment material was completed to fully characterize the material and to evaluate the most cost-effective means for disposal of the material. Although this material is not free of contaminants, it is suitable for re-use as daily cover or grading material at MA DEP approved landfills.

Approximately 1,700 acres of land drain to the City Hall Ponds including the land occupied by the main library parking lot and a portion of Homer Street. These areas are subject to occasional flooding and are mapped as such by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The consequences of not dredging the City Hall Ponds could exacerbate flooding in the immediate vicinity, increase sediment loading downstream and allow for the proliferation of invasive plant species. Accordingly, the maintenance of City Hall Ponds is a priority initiative for the Department of Public Works.

Project: Sediment Removal and Maintenance of City Hall Ponds

<u>Purpose and Need:</u> The Department of Public Works is proposing to restore the hydraulic capacity, mitigate storm drainage impacts and improve the recreational aesthetics of the historic City Hall Ponds. These improvements are intended to be accomplished by performing maintenance sediment removal from City Hall Ponds including the removal of accumulated sediment from a portion of the upgradient culverts. The pond sediments are principally sands and silts derived from road runoff. The two main inlets to the pond are culverts located at the south end of the pond, known as the Hammond Brook and Cold Springs Brook culverts. These culverts discharge stormwater to the upper lobe of the pond and currently have reduced hydraulic capacity due to sedimentation. The pond discharges to the north via a culvert under Commonwealth Avenue into Bullough's Pond.

The pond has been maintenance dredged multiple times in the past using standard dewatering and excavation methods to remove accumulated sediment infill and maintain open water areas. Recent maintenance sediment removals occurred in 1992 and in 1980.

<u>Description:</u> Dewatering will be executed to allow for control of water quality and quantity throughout project construction. The four phases include an initial drawdown for construction of cofferdams; construction of the cofferdams and creation of a temporary bypass system for incoming flows from the Hammond Brook and Cold Springs Brook culverts; dewatering of the work area within the pond; and construction and implementation of dewatering sumps for low-level dewatering of work area. The project plans illustrate the dewatering process. The normal flow into the pond is proposed to be pumped around the work area and directly to downstream areas at the outlet culvert to City Hall Ponds.

Excavation will take place up to the mean annual high water line, which is roughly coincident with existing shoreline boulders which edge the pond. In total, approximately 3,800 cubic yards of material will be removed from City Hall Ponds and the lower portion of the two upgradient culverts. The total pond area to be dredged is $0.9\pm$ acres. Dredging of the pond lobes will proceed from upstream to downstream after the culvert cleaning is completed to minimize the potential for sediment mobilization downstream of City Hall Ponds. The dredging of the pond will be accomplished by conventional excavation, utilizing standard earth-moving equipment such as excavators, front-end loaders, backhoes, and/or bulldozers to excavate the accumulated sediments and load them directly onto dump trucks or stockpile for further dewatering and subsequent loading. Dewatering of sediments will occur primarily within each pond lobe.

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

Proposed Amendment to Section 5-35 of the City Ordinances

Designer Selection Committee

Dear Mayor Warren and Honorable Board of Aldermen:

I am requesting amendment to the City's designer selection procedure to clarify when the designer selection committee should be involved in the procurement of designer services with regard to the construction, alteration, or repair of a public building. The proposed amendment would also allow an alternative procedure to be followed in any instance where state or federal law or regulations requires that a specific procedure that is incompatible with the City's own designer selection procedure be followed. The red-line draft of proposed amendment to sec. 5-35 is attached this letter.

In practice, the Designer Selection Committee has handed the selection of designers as required both by the City's Charter, as well as by state law, specifically G.L. c. 7, sec. 38A ½. The proposed amendment would make clear that the Designer Selection Committee has jurisdiction over both procedures.

In addition, the proposed amendment allows the City to use an alternative procurement process when required by state or federal law or regulation. This amendment is required in order to satisfy the designer selection requirements for projects funded by the Massachusetts School Building Authority ("MSBA"). The need for this amendment became clear in the Angier Elementary School Project. The City's current ordinance regarding designer selection and the MSBA's regulations for selection of designers on MSBA-funded school projects conflict with one another, pointing up the need to change sec. 5-35 to permit the procurement process required by the MSBA.

Finally, the proposed amendment would allow the Public Buildings Commissioner to consult with the Designer Selection Committee in instances where the procurement of a designer is not otherwise within that Committee's jurisdiction.

The Law Department has drafted the proposed amendment and will prepare a brief memorandum outlining the procurement requirements of both our Charter and state law with regard to the selection of designers. The proposed amendment has also been reviewed by the Chairman of the Designer Selection Committee.

Public Buildings Commissioner requesting amendment of the designer selection process, sec. 5-35, to clarify the role of the designer selection committee and to permit alternative methods to secure design services when required to use such methods by state or federal law or regulations.

Article III. Designer selection Committee

Sec. 5-35. Established; purpose.

A designer selection committee is hereby established to make recommendations to the mayor whenever an architect is to be engaged by the city for any purpose involving construction, alteration, repair or maintenance of a public building, and the mayor shall consult with this committee and shall select said architect from these recommendations. At least three (3) recommendations shall be offered and the mayor may request three (3) additional recommendations from which he shall make his selection. The designer selection committee shall also oversee the selection process for design services contracts subject to the provisions of section 38K of chapter 7 of the General Laws. The designer selection committee shall not oversee the selection process for design services contracts in any instance where an alternative procurement process inconsistent with this section is prescribed by state or federal laws or regulations.

The public buildings commissioner may consult with the designer selection committee regarding procurement of any design services contract not otherwise required to be overseen by the committee pursuant to the provisions of this section. (Rev. Ords. 1973, §2-346)

The Public Buildings Commissioner is requesting that Section 5-35 which sets out the jurisdiction of the Designer Selection Committee ("DSC") be amended to clarify the role the DSC plays pursuant to the City Charter and state statutes dealing with the procurement of design services. The proposed amendment will also allow the City to use an alternative designer selection process in any case where a state or federal statute or regulation requires procurement of design services in a manner inconsistent with Section 5-35. The City is facing that specific situation with regard to the City's efforts to secure funding for the Angier Elementary School renovation from the Massachusetts School Building Authority ("MSBA"). A copy of the proposed amendment is attached to this memorandum.

As this committee understands, section 11-8 of the City Charter requires that the City establish a designer selection committee by ordinance and that such ordinance provide "... that the designer selection committee shall be consulted and directed to make recommendations whenever an architect is to be engaged by the City for any purpose."

¹ One would not seriously expect to involve the Designer Selection Committee if an architect was hired to drive a snow plow.

Architects are not, however, the only design professionals involved in the construction or maintenance of public buildings. In addition to the requirements of the Charter, the City must also follow state law when procuring design services. Specifically, Chapter 579 of the Acts of 1980 required municipalities to procure design services in connection with any public building project estimated to cost more than \$100,000 through a qualification based selection process. See G.L. c. 7, sec. 38K.

The term "design services" is defined in G.L. c. 7, sec. 38A ½ to include services provided by designers (architects or engineers), programmers, and construction managers in connection with numerous public building activities ranging from the preparation of master plans, soil tests, and cost estimates, to the development of plans and specifications, and finally, to the administration of a construction contract or construction management.

In practice, the DSC has also overseen the procurement process for design contracts as required by G.L. c. 7, sec. 38K, which includes the selection of architects as required by the City Charter. The proposed amendment would clearly give the DSC jurisdiction over the procurement of design services as required by G.L. c. 7, sec. 38K.

The most important proposed amendment, however, concerns instances in which the City's designer selection procedure would conflict with a state or federal requirement pertaining to the procurement of design services. When the MSBA was established to handle state funding for school construction, the state's designer selection process for municipalities was amended to exempt MSBA projects from the provisions of G.L. c. 7, sec. 38K. Instead, the MSBA selects a local municipality's school designer, with input from the community.

Accordingly, to eliminate the conflict between our City procedures for the selection of architects, and the MSBA requirements, the Law Department has drafted a revision to sec. 5-35 that would authorize the City to follow an alternate selection process if required to do so by state or federal law. As noted above, the need for this change is being driven by the Angier Elementary School renovation project.

Finally, the proposed amendment would also expressly authorize the Public Buildings Commissioner to consult with the DSC with regard to the selection of design services not subject to the DSC's jurisdiction, i.e., selection of a mechanical engineer for a project expected to cost less than \$100,000.

Article III. Designer selection Committee

Sec. 5-35. Established; purpose.

A designer selection committee is hereby established to make recommendations to the mayor whenever an architect is to be engaged by the city for any purpose involving construction, alteration, repair or maintenance of a public building, and the mayor shall consult with this committee and shall select said architect from these recommendations. The designer selection committee shall also oversee the selection process for design services contracts subject to the provisions of section 38K of chapter 7 of the General Laws. The designer selection committee shall not oversee the selection process for design services contracts in any instance where an alternative procurement process inconsistent with this section is prescribed by state or federal laws or regulations.

The public buildings commissioner may consult with the designer selection committee regarding procurement of any design services contract not otherwise required to be overseen by the committee pursuant to the provisions of this section. (Rev. Ords. 1973, §2-346)


