WITNESSETH:

Whereas, Bridge #N-4-3/N-12-1 (the "Bridge") is located over the Charles River at the Town/City line between Needham and Newton; and

Whereas, the Bridge links the City at Nahanton Street, to the Town at Kendrick Street; and

Whereas, ownership and maintenance of the Bridge is shared equally between the City and the Town; and

Whereas, the Bridge is in need of rehabilitation; and

Whereas, the Town contracted with the BETA Group, Inc. for consulting engineering services for the investigation and design of repairs and rehabilitation of the Bridge, which work has been completed and paid for by the Town; and

Whereas, the City contracted with the BETA Group, Inc. for consulting engineering services for the investigation and design of repairs and rehabilitation of the Bridge, which work has been completed and paid for by the City; and

Whereas the City and the Town wish to provide for the repairs to the Bridge with the City being the lead community to award and supervise the contract for said repair;

Now therefore, for and in consideration of the promises, the mutual covenants herein recited and other good, valuable, and sufficient considerations, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. The City shall prepare and put out invitations for bids for the repairs to the bridge in accordance with the plans and designs of Beta Group, Inc., receive and review said bids and award the Contract for the repairs to the bridge to a Contractor, all in accordance with G. L. Ch 30, sec. 39M and all other applicable provisions of law.
- 2. The City shall make progress payments for material and services to the Contractor awarded the contract, pursuant to the terms of the Contract.
- 3. The City shall invoice the Town for fifty (50%) percent of the amount approved for payment to the Contractor by the City.
- 4. Payment by the Town to the City shall be made within thirty (30) days of receipt of invoices from the City. With any request for payment, the City shall provide a copy of the invoice(s) from Contractor showing the total amount(s) billed to the City.
- 5. Within seven (7) days of receipt of invoices from the City, the Town shall have the opportunity to inspect the work and object to payments for work not completed according to the contract documents, whereupon the City and Town shall confer to agree as to what should be paid. If they do not agree, Beta Group, Inc. will determine what portion of the disputed amount will be paid and the Town shall pay the City fifty (50%) percent of that amount and the City shall pay the Contractor one hundred (100%) percent of that amount. With respect to an unpaid portion of a disputed amount which is subsequently determined to be owed to the Contractor in accordance with the Contract, the Town shall pay the City fifty (50%) percent of such amount and the City shall pay the Contractor one hundred (100%) percent of such amount.
- 6. Any undisputed amounts unpaid by the Town after thirty (30) days of receipt of invoices from the City are subject to interest at the same rate the City is required to pay for funds in order to make payments to the Contractor. The Town hereby agrees to pay any interest incurred by the City due to such late payment by the Town.
- 7. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, the Town's total obligation to pay the City hereunder shall not exceed the lesser of fifty (50%) percent of the total amount invoiced to the City pursuant to the Contract, or \$750,000.00.
- 8. This Agreement shall be effective upon the action of the Board of Selectmen of the Town, and action by the Mayor of the City as authorized by the Board of Aldermen.

9. It is mutually agreed and understood that this Agreement shall remain in full force as until completion of the services to be performed by the Contractor pursuant to the Contract or until such time as it may be amended or replaced by a new agreement, but in any event, not to exceed a total of three (3) years.

The two parties have caused their legal corporate signatures and seals to be hereunto affixed by their proper officers, thereunto duly organized on the day of the year first above written.

Attached is a Program Description of the City's Private Inflow Removal Program, as well as a sample letter to residents where an illegal inflow connection has been identified.

Illegal inflow connections contribute millions of gallons of clean water to the City's sewer system which, in turn, harms the environment and significantly increases the MWRA assessment that all residents must pay in their sewer bill. In conjunction with the on-going water meter replacement program, the Department of Public Works has been inspecting all residences in Newton to identify any illegal inflow connections to the City's sewer system. To date, out of 11,004 homes inspected, we have identified 450 sump pumps and 159 clean outs that must be disconnected from our sewer system.

This program describes the process that residents are expected to follow to remove these connections. All costs are to be borne by the residents, although the City will provide guidance, standard construction details and final inspection. The City's coordinator for this program will be Fred Russell, the Utilities Director. Residents are expected to contact Mr. Russell within 30 days of notification to begin this process, although they will have 12 months to complete the work.

I believe this is a critical component in improving control of our water and sewer costs and look forward to discussing this program with you.

CITY OF NEWTON PRIVATE INFLOW REMOVAL PROGRAM

Program Description

The intent of the Private Inflow Removal Program (the "PROGRAM") is to provide a detailed procedure for the removal of inflow sources that are connected to the sanitary sewer system and are located on private property. The PROGRAM provides instruction for the removal of the source, a timeline to complete the work, and enforcement actions for failure to comply.

Inflow sources are locations where rainfall runoff can enter the sanitary sewer system. Typical inflow sources include driveway drains, roof gutter downspouts, and basement sump pumps. Inflow sources contribute large quantities of clean water to the sewer system. The cost to treat this extra flow is paid by the City. In addition, the surge in flows created by these sources during wet weather uses valuable pipe capacity and can result in sewer surcharging and sewer overflows.

The City of Newton's goal is to remove all private inflow sources from the sanitary sewer system. This goal is consistent with Chapter 29 of the City's Sewer Use Ordinance, the State Plumbing Code (248 CMR) and the MWRA's Sewer Use Ordinance (360 CMR 10).


The PROGRAM is described in chronological order as follows.

- 1. **Notification.** Owners of illegal inflow sources shall receive written notification (see Attachment #1). The notification informs the owner that an illegal source exists, cites the regulations that make it illegal, and details the steps required to bring the sources into compliance.
- 2. Waiver Period. A waiver period of twelve (12) months shall be granted to the owner of each illegal inflow source. The waiver period will begin on the date affixed to the 'Notification'. If the source is removed within twelve (12) months, no enforcement actions will be issued. If the source is not removed a daily fine will be imposed in accordance with Newton Ordinance Section 1-6 (see Attachment #2). Fines will continue to accrue until the illegal source has been certified as removed. The city may extend the waiver period if certain physical, weather, or monetary constraints prolong the removal of the source.

3. Removal Procedure.

a. The owner of the illegal connection will be provided with the name and contact information of the City's Inflow Source Removal Coordinator (the "Coordinator"). The Coordinator will assist the property owner during the inflow source removal process.

- b. The Coordinator will provide the property owner with general inflow source removal construction details and specifications along with detailed instructions related to the required inspection and documentation procedures. (Procedures proposed to be similar to the process for new water or sewer services.)
- c. The property owner will select a contractor of their choice to perform the inflow source removal. It is important that the removal be conducted in accordance with construction details and specifications provided by the city. Removal projects that are not constructed in accordance with City's standard details and specifications must be designed by a Massachusetts Professional Engineer and approved by the City prior to construction.
- d. Removal of inflow sources that require plumbing or electric permits must comply with City Inspectional Services requirements and procedures.
- e. The property owner will pay the contractor for the project.
- f. The property owner will contact the Coordinator to inspect and document the completed project.
- g. The Coordinator will complete a "Certification of Removal" form, including a photograph of the completed project, and record pertinent details in the City's Inflow Source Removal Database. A copy of the Certification will be given to the homeowner.
- h. The City will retain copies of all appropriate documentation for its records.
- 4. **Payment.** Property owners will be responsible for the full cost of inflow source removal including any plumbing or electric permit fees.
- 5. **Project Tracking.** Tracking the details related to each inflow source removal will be done in the City's Infrastructure Management database. Details will include: name of owner; owner's address and telephone number; name and contact information of the contractor who preformed the work; a record of all correspondence, including dates of all phone calls and letters; source removal photographs; an estimate of inflow removal (gpd); construction completion date; and Certification of Removal date. An executed copy of the Certification of Removal for each removal shall be scanned and included in the Program Database.

During recent investigation of Newton's sewer system, we determined that your home has a connection that allows clean storm water to be discharged into the City's sanitary sewer system. This connection is a violation of state law and local ordinances. (See M.G.L. c.83 § 5, 360 CMR 10.023, and City of Newton Ordinances Sec. 29-65 attached.) This letter serves as notification that the illegal connection must be removed. Please contact me within 30 days at: 617-796-1640 or by email: frussell@newtonma.gov to initiate this removal process.

I will provide you with the specific information on your property when you contact me. Most illegal connections are related to sump pumps, roof drains and driveway drains. Illegal connections to the sewer system in Newton harm water quality in Newton, the Charles River, and the Boston Harbor; exacerbate sewage back-ups in residential homes; and increase sewer bills for all Newton residents.

By allowing clean rain water and/or groundwater to enter the City's sewer system, the illegal connection at your home contributes to sewer overflows which discharge millions of gallons of untreated sewage into our waterways each year during wet weather. Furthermore, the City of Newton pays over \$10 million dollars per year to treat relatively clean water coming from situations such as yours. By eliminating this practice we can reduce the sewer rates for all Newton residents. The attached brochure explains the impact of illegal sources on the sewer system and the community.

Newton's Utilities Division is prepared to handle questions and concerns you may have about this requirement to disconnect from the sewer system Whether to start the permitting process or to inquire about the next steps, it is imperative that you contact me at your earliest convenience. I will provide you with documentation on the permitting process and sample construction details and specifications which may be used to hire a removal contractor.

If you do not initiate a permit within a reasonable period of time, (you don't have to start construction or removal right away) you may be subject to financial penalties under City Ordinances and State law. We do expect you to remove the illegal connection within the next 12 months.







Deer Island Wastewater Treatment Plant



Inside of Sewer Pipe




I respectfully request you docket for transfer the amount of \$620,000 from the Water Fund to the Sewer Fund. This action will restore the full transfer from the Water Fund to the Sewer Fund for administrative costs related to managing both funds. Line items such as postage (for water and sewer bills), small tools and uniforms are paid out of the Sewer budget. Since these administrative-type items are utilized among both Funds, the Water Fund is customarily charged each fiscal year for half of the costs within this budget category.

On November 15, 2010, the Board of Aldermen voted for a number of adjustments to Water and Sewer Fund budgets in response to the first quarter review of revenue by the City Comptroller. One of the changes reduced the budgeted \$922,778 transfer from the Water to Sewer Fund by \$620,000 in response to the first quarter shortfall projected in the Water Fund. Year-end revenue projections have been run again for both Funds through the third quarter of FY11 (March 2011). I am accordingly requesting the originally budgeted transfer from the Water to Sewer Fund for administrative costs be restored:

Increase Water Fund Expense 'Transfer to Sewer Fund' (28A10499-5927) - \$620,000 Increase Sewer Fund Revenue 'Transfer from Water Fund' (27-4970128) - \$620,000

There is currently no fund balances available for appropriation in the Sewer Fund while the Water Fund has an available balance of \$1,779,339. The proposed transfer is predicated upon separate third-quarter reviews of actual and projected revenue within the respective Water and Sewer Funds by the City Comptroller and DPW staff. This change, in partnership with other spending restrictions in both Funds, is being undertaken to avoid any negative impact on the City's free cash position.

Sewer Extensions and Sewer Construction

In 2010, sewer debt was extended for sewer design, repair and extension projects, including Oakdale Rd and Farina Rd sewer repairs, Francis St sewer extension, and the design of the Old Farm Rd sewer repairs. Total debt was \$500,000 (Board Order 399-09, 399-09(2)). A total of \$338,482 was spent, leaving \$161,518 in unused funds. Public Works requests that you docket with the Board of Aldermen a request for consideration of the use of these remaining funds for the proposed sewer extensions and sewer construction projects. These would include the upcoming Woodland Road sewer extension to Studio Road, the Old Farm Road sewer construction and construction management project, and other sewer projects as applicable.

In 2010, sewer debt was extended for sewer repair and extension projects, including Oakdale Rd and Farina Rd sewer repairs, and Francis St sewer extension. Design of the Old Farm Rd sewer repairs was also included. Total debt was \$500,000. A total of \$338,482 was spent, leaving \$161,518 in unused funds. Public Works requests the use of these remaining funds for the proposed Woodland Road sewer extension to Studio Road, the Old Farm Road sewer construction and construction management project, and other sewer projects as applicable

The Department Public Works has received petitions from the owners on Studio Road to connect to the City's sewer main. The houses on Studio Road, including one owned by Lasell College, currently are on septic systems, located in the rear yards. The owners recognize that, should they ever wish to sell the houses, the septic systems would probably not pass a Title 5 inspection, and they would be forced to reconstruct the septic system, or connect to the City's sewer system.

The proposed sewer extension on Studio Road must connect to an existing sewer main on Woodland Road. The existing sewer main on Woodland Road needs to be extended to Studio Road, to receive the future Studio Road sewer.

The Studio Road sewer extension design is in the concept stage, along with sewer extensions on other roads in this area, including Aspen Ave and Hawthorne Ave. However, Woodland Road is scheduled for full depth reconstruction this construction season. The sewer extension on Woodland Road to Studio Road needs to be installed as part of the reconstruction of Woodland Road. This will avoid the dig-up of Woodland Road after it is reconstructed. The estimated cost of the sewer extension for Woodland Road is \$50,000. No sewer assessments shall be made as part of this sewer extension, as the properties by which the sewer extension passes are already on City sewer.

Public Works will present the Studio Road, Aspen Ave and Hawthorne Ave sewer extensions to the Board of Aldermen at a later date, since the design is not yet complete. When the design is complete, we would petition the Board of Aldermen to assess sewer betterments on properties on these roads, per ordinance section 29-71 and 29-72.

1) Old Farm Road Sewer Improvements:

Old Farm Rd. Sewer Main Replacement, \$486,000

Old Farm Rd. Sewer Cleaning and Lining, \$186,000

Construction Services, \$115,000

Total = \$787,000

Project Description: The existing 10" diameter sewer main on Old Farm Road will be replaced with a larger 15" diameter sewer main. The existing sewer is undersized, causing sanitary sewer overflows during periods of heavy rain storms. This upsizing will mitigate these overflows. The sewers tributary to the Old Farm Road sewer will be cleaned and lined.

2) Aspen Ave/Hawthorne Ave /Studio Rd Sewer Extensions:

Project Description: The Department Public Works has received petitions from the owners on Aspen Ave, Hawthorne Ave, and Studio Road to connect to the City's sewer main. The houses currently are on septic systems, located in the rear yards. The owners recognizes that, should they ever wish to sell the houses, the septic systems would probably not pass a Title 5 sewer inspection, and they would be forced to reconstruct the septic system, or connect to the City's sewer system. When the design is complete, Public Works would petition the Board of Aldermen to assess sewer betterments on properties on these roads, per ordinance section 29-71 and 29-72.

3) Quinobequin Road Sewer Relocation:

\$200,000

Project Description: The sewer overflow pipe from the Quinobequin Rd sewer headworks discharges into an existing sewer manhole in Quinobequin Rd (in front of #91 Quinobequin Rd). The sewer service from #91 also discharges into the same sewer manhole. During periods of

heavy rain, this overflow pipe fills the sewer manhole, causing sewer back-ups into the house at #91. The sewer overflow pipe will be extended further downstream on Quinobequin Rd, beyond the last house before the I-95 bridge, in order to mitigate sewer surcharges.

4) Gordon Road Sewer Repairs:

\$170,000

Project Description: A portion of the existing sewer main on Gordon Road is crushed and has collapsed. This sewer main will be replaced with a new sewer main, from manhole to manhole, in its place. The existing drain pipe is directly above the sewer main, and will also be removed and replaced.

5) Newtonville Ave Sewer Repairs:

\$160,000

Project Description: A portion of the existing sewer main on Newtonville Ave east of Harvard Street is crushed and has collapsed. This sewer main will be replaced with a new sewer main, from manhole to manhole, in its place.

6) Wood End Rd Sewer Repairs:

\$160,000

Project Description: A portion of the existing sewer main on Wood End Rd is crushed and has collapsed. This sewer main will be replaced with a new sewer main, from manhole to manhole, in its place.
