#303-10 NATIONAL GRID petitioning for a grant of location to install and maintain 90' ±

of 6" gas main in ROSALIE ROAD from the existing 6" gas main at 135 Rosalie

Road westerly to 124 Rosalie Road. (Ward 8) [10/19/10 @ 1:24 PM]

ACTION: APPROVED AS AMENDED 6-0 (Lennon and Danberg not voting) 160' of

6" gas main

NOTE: The Chairman explained that the gas main extension installation is already underway, as the homeowner at 124 Rosalie Road is without heat. Unfortunately, the contractor removed all of the oil heating equipment before realizing that a gas main extension is necessary to provide gas to the home. If the petition went through the normal grant of location process, the property owner would not have heat until mid-December. Dennis Regan, National Grid Permit Representative, explained that National Grid was not made aware that there was a need for an extension until the equipment was removed. National Grid is working to install the gas main as quickly as possible. Mr. Regan estimated that the work would be complete in one week. The Department of Public Works reviewed the petition and recommended approval of the work before National Grid began the work. The Committee members understood the need to circumvent the process, as it was an emergent situation.

There was some discussion on what might be done to ensure that this type of situation does not occur again. It was suggested that there should be a letter sent to the contractor explaining the necessity of involving the gas company before moving forward on a project. Ald. Lappin moved approval of the item, which carried unanimously.

Ald. Danberg raised a concern regarding whether the Public Works Department checks to make sure that the conditions of a street opening permit are met. She has noticed that granite curbing and permanent patch has not been installed on many seemingly complete National Grid projects. Mr. Regan stated that he would investigate. Public Works Commissioner Tom Daley stated that there is 90-day wait period before permanent patch is undertaken in order to allow the dirt to settle. The Public Works Department requires bonds from National Grid to ensure that if the work is not completed, the City has the funds to complete the project.

NOTE: Arthur Cabral, Budget and Project Specialist, presented the item to the Committee. The funds will be used to fund four ongoing environmental cleanup projects. Three of the projects began in 1998 and one project began in 2001. The Cabot Elementary School site, Elliot Street DPW Yard site, and the Newton South School site should be closed out this year.

Ald. Lappin recalled that the last time there was a request for funds for these projects, Mr. Cabral told the Committee that the three projects would be closed out. Mr. Cabral explained that due to a request for additional testing by the Department of Environmental Protection at the Elliot Street Yard site, a delay in obtaining property description papers for the Newton South High School fields, and the revision of some paper work at Cabot Elementary School the close outs were delayed. Mr. Cabral informed the Committee that the Law Department is working to provide the property description for the Newton South fields. The Committee requested an update regarding the status of the property description.

Committee members expressed concerns about the overall cost of the environmental cleanups. Therefore, Committee members requested documentation from the licensed site professional contractor regarding the delays and a breakdown of the costs of the projects since they began. Mr. Cabral agreed to provide the information before the next Finance Committee meeting. Ald. Salvucci moved approval, which carried by a vote of two in favor and five abstentions. The five members who abstained wished to review the requested information before taking an action on the item.

ACTION: HELD 7-0 (Salvucci not voting)

NOTE: The two items were discussed and held on October 4, 2010 for information on funding mechanisms for traffic calming measures when approved. The Committee also had concerns regarding the draft ordinance language. Traffic Engineer Clint Schuckel stated that traffic calming on streets that were scheduled, as part of the Department of Public Works annual reconstruction plan would be funded as part of the road reconstruction.

The Committee reviewed the draft language that was attached to the agenda. There was discussion surrounding whether the proposed threshold standards for citizen traffic calming petitions were too stringent. Several members felt that the thresholds did not give any leeway if a street were determined to be dangerous but did not meet the thresholds. Mr. Schuckel pointed out that without thresholds it would be difficult to prioritize traffic calming projects. In addition, there was concern that the draft ordinance did not have any language to address projects funded through mitigation or private funds. Ald. Lennon moved hold on the item to work out the details and cleanup the draft ordinance language.

WATER PINE DEVELO

NOTE: Chief Financial Officer Maureen Lemieux stated that the Board of Aldermen need to take an action on this item before the City can submit the tax rates for next year. She

explained that when the Comptroller reviewed material for setting the tax rates he noticed that the actual water/sewer revenues were \$1.4 million less than projected. It is important that when the tax rate information is submitted to the Department of Revenue that the City's water and sewer enterprise accounts reflect balanced budgets. Therefore, the Mayor is requesting authorization to reduce the water and sewer fund revenues collectively by \$1.4 million. The only other options would be to raise the water/sewer rates to address the shortfall or use the water reserve fund. However, the actual figures are based on information from June 30, 2010, and it is expected that water usage over the summer months will boost the actual revenue above the projected revenue.

It is expected that the reductions will be restored once the real numbers are known. Ms. Lemieux and Commissioner of Public Works Tom Daley reviewed the proposed deferrals with the Committee. If the revenues in the funds do not pick up, the reductions would be permanent. Commissioner Daley stated that as long as the funds are restored there would not be a significant impact on the Utilities Division of Public Works. He provided the Committee with the attached graph reflecting actual water consumption for Calendar Year 2008, 2009 and a portion of 2010. The data for 2010 depicts a sharp rise over last year's water consumption over the summer months. The numbers used for the projections for this year were based on the 2009 figures; therefore, the City should exceed the projections. The City should know if it has exceeded the projections in February or March.

One of the proposed reductions would eliminate the sewer reserve. Committee members expressed concern that there would no longer be any funds in the reserve account. Ms. Lemieux stated that she would speak with the Mayor and Comptroller to determine if it were possible to reduce the water fund further and not deplete the sewer reserve. If it is possible, she will provide a letter amending the item before the Finance Committee meeting on November 8, 2010. Most auditors look for a city to have 7 to 15% of the operating budget in reserve and the same holds true for enterprise funds. There is approximately \$1.7 million currently in the water fund reserve and \$276,000 in the sewer fund reserve. Ideally, the city should have \$3 million in enterprise reserves. Ald. Fuller inquired why there was a determination not to increase the water and sewer rates. Commissioner Daley responded that it was felt that it would be premature to adjust the rates as it is expected that the City will exceed its projections.

Ald. Lappin moved approval of the item, which carried by a vote of six in favor and none opposed.
