Storm Update



Dear Residents.

Another week, and, unfortunately, another storm

As our Director of Streets Shane Mark just said, "conditions are gnarly."

I'm writing to you from the City's Emergency Operations Center, a place I've become all too familiar with over the past 12 days. And I hear more snow is in next Wednesday's forecast.

Today's storm is expected to last at least until

about 9 p.m. tonight, and drop up to 18 inches of snow on us.

- We're keeping the Snow Emergency in place until 7 a.m. tomorrow morning. So, no cars on the street or in the municipal lots until the morning. That allows us to plow.
- The trash and recycling schedule is on for Wednesday, but remember everyone except the Monday route is on a one-day delay.
- The Newton Public Schools and the Senior Center will be closed on Wednesday.
- City Hall and the Library will be open at the usual time.
- For updates, check our website at www.newtonma.gov, or sign-up for the emergency alert Code Red robocalls to receive a call. To sign-up to receive robocalls, go to the City website at www.newtonma.gov and look for the "Sign Up For Emergency Alerts" icon. I promise that we don't use robocalls often. (We realize that the Code Red system just sent out an OLD robocall from March 13th last year. We're figuring out right now why that happened.)

Today's storm comes on the heels of 23 weather events this winter, including 54 inches of snow. The ice and wind damage over the past two weeks has downed more than 91 entire trees, and damaged at least 1,000 more.

All this snow, ice and wind comes with a price, one I'm all too aware of as we sit down with our department heads to determine the budget for the coming fiscal year.

Each inch of snow costs roughly \$100,000 to clear. As I think about the budget, and translating our priorities into projects, I'm keenly aware that each inch of snow is one less thing we can include as a one-time initiative in next year's plan.

Most distressing is the two-alarm fire that just happened on Stratford Road. The occupants are safe, thank goodness, but I'm still concerned for the safety of the firefighters, especially in these weather conditions. We know one firefighter went to Newton Wellesley Hospital but is in good condition.

There is plenty going on in our City that doesn't have anything to do with the weather:

Student Walk-Out

I'm so proud of the high school students here in Newton who took the initiative to join the national walk-out to end gun violence. The event had been scheduled for tomorrow morning, but with school cancelled, it has been rescheduled for Thursday.

I'm joining the students at NSHS while Superintendent Fleishman will be at NNHS.




