Recycling 101

Our waste hauler is fining us because their data shows that 18 percent of the City of Newton's recycling carts contain contamination, a high rate.

Thanks to a grant, inspectors looked in 1,408 recycling carts during our first week of the focused initiative to educate residents and to lower the contamination rate. They found an even higher rate of contamination, 28 percent.

The main culprit? Plastic bags. Of the 391 households that received warnings, 245, or 63 percent, were because plastic bags were found in the carts. And unfortunately, four carts were left on the curbside this morning and not picked up because the same issue was found two weeks in a row.

Newton has already spent \$65,611 so far this year on penalties because our recycling is not as clean as required in our contract.

We need your help to do better. This week I popped up in City Hall staffer Dana Hanson's kitchen in Auburndale and found "mistakes." Watch the video above.

Solar Panels Net Savings of \$452,000

The Rumford Landfill Solar Farm saved the City of Newton \$452,000 during its first year of operation and generated more than 2.7 million kilowatt hours of clean electricity.

The solar farm, built with Framingham-based Ameresco, produced the equivalent of about 13 percent of the power used to run Newton's municipal government including all our schools, City Hall, public buildings and street lights.

This has been more successful than we thought, and I'm excited to move forward with the next stage of the solar program in Newton to place more panels around the City to help green our energy.
