
Mayor's Update

Current Cases

There are now 541 Newton residents who have tested positive for COVID-19 through Sunday, April 26. Twentyfive (25) of those are newly reported cases since my last email to you on Friday evening which included data through Thursday, April 23. We'll know more as the week progresses if the decrease in newly reported cases continues.

Restaurants Can Sell Groceries Too

During COVID-19, we need to both improve access to food and essential items (think toilet paper!) for Newtonians and support our wonderful restaurants. I am pleased to announce that in Newton restaurants may now sell grocery items to cook at home and may include dry goods like toilet paper, paper towels, napkins, etc. in their sales. I worked with our Health and Human Services, Inspectional Services and Planning Departments to make sure we do this safely. Restaurants must continue to

comply with all food handling requirements, including temperature and storage, proper labeling and ingredients, and observe the stated guidelines for operating during this pandemic.

The sale of non-prepared and non-food items should be a minor portion of restaurants' operations and will be just temporary for the duration of the emergency; the principal use should remain a restaurant, operating only through takeout and/or delivery during the state of emergency.

This is a positive way to come together as a community—restaurants obtaining through their supply chains hard to come by commodities and customers supporting them with purchases of not just their prepared foods but also other enjoyed and necessary items.

Please Hang in There

I can understand why I'm beginning to get emails suggesting we loosen up our stayat-home advisory and get people back to work. So many people are hurting financially. All of us are feeling housebound. Please hang in there. We have not yet had sufficient flattening of the curve or sufficient decreases in the transmission of COVID-19 yet to pivot to re-opening. (For example, the number of patients who are intubated in Greater Boston has not yet decreased.)

Continue to stay at home whenever possible. Practice physical distancing. Wash your hands, especially before and after being in public. Wear face coverings when outside and can't physically distance. Clean and disinfect high touch surfaces. Be safe. Save lives.
