Mayor's Update

Current Cases and Losses

Newton's COVID-19 data indicators continue to present an improving public health picture. We are experiencing fewer newly reported infections and deaths each of the last few weeks.


Please, please continue to abide by the<u>"safer at</u> <u>home</u>" advisory and minimize exposure to people outside




your household as much as possible. That's how these declining rates will be maintained.

Today, we can report the cumulative total of confirmed COVID-19 cases among Newton residents stands at 741 people, according to preliminary data through Tuesday, May 26. Of the 741 cases, approximately 43 percent are residents of Newton nursing homes and assisted living facilities. One week ago, there were 710 confirmed cases (data through May 19). A graphic representation of our positive cases based on the date of our notification shows a reassuring decline with some major spikes when the results from group tests from long-term care facilities come in.





The symptom onset graph is an even better way of looking at Newton's positive cases. It is also updated and shows Newton's 741 cases by symptom onset date (or by test date if symptom onset date is unavailable). The bell curve continues to be reassuring.



The percentage of people in Newton "post-isolation," meaning they have met the criteria to discontinue isolation after a COVID-19 diagnosis and are considered "recovered," remains relatively consistent. Seventy-one (71) percent of people in Newton diagnosed with COVID-19 (outside nursing homes and assisted living facilities) are post-isolation.

This past week, we learned of two Newton residents who had a COVID-19 positive diagnosis and died. The preliminary cumulative total for Newton is now 107 people. As this infectious disease has moved so quickly through our City, our Commonwealth and our Country, we are still trying to find ways to grieve, to comfort those in mourning, and to remember those we have lost; we are trying but, speaking for myself, I still feel like I have much more to do given the scale and significance of our losses.

You may have noticed on the front page of the Boston Globe this morning that Middlesex County (which includes Newton as well as Cambridge, Somerville, Framingham, Lowell and 32 other communities) has the 11th highest absolute number of deaths of any county in the United States. What's going on? Middlesex County, with 1.5 million people, is by far the most populous county in Massachusetts. The next biggest in Massachusetts is Worcester County with approximately 798,000, followed by Essex (which includes Salem and Lawrence) with approximately 743,000, and Suffolk (which includes Boston) with approximately 722,000.

Switching from the absolute number of deaths to looking instead at the per capita rate of deaths, Middlesex County drops down to the 5th highest county in Massachusetts with 94 deaths per 100,000 people.

Still, the data shows that Massachusetts and Middlesex County are experiencing

higher levels of COVID-19 positive cases and deaths compared to other areas of the country. Middlesex County, which ranks 11th in terms of total deaths, is approximately the 22nd most populous county in the United States.

Farmers' Markets Will Open at New Location

To make sure they are safe and allow for sufficient physical distancing, we're moving both the Farmers' Markets from Cold Spring Park/Newton Centre (Tuesdays) and Elm Street/West Newton (Saturdays) to Newton South High School.

The times are a bit different this summer. Our Saturday market will open on June 20 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and the Tuesday market will open on June 30 from 2:00 to 6:00 p.m. So far there are more vendors lined up for the Tuesday market.

Not familiar with Newton South High School? Put 140 Brandeis Road, Newton Centre into your GPS. The market will be easy to find in the parking areas along the solar panel arrays. We have rigorous screening and cleaning protocols in place for our vendors and safe shopping guidance for customers.

We ask everyone to wear a mask for the duration of their stay at the market (unless you have a medical condition that precludes wearing one). Credit cards and SNAP cards will be accepted.

This year we are suggesting that children do not attend the market and please leave your dogs at home this summer as well.

June 3 Deadline for Housing Relief Fund Applications

Interested in the Newton Emergency Housing Relief Program and emergency help with your rent (or mortgage in specific types of housing)?

Last night, our partner, Metro West Collaborative Development, held a Drive-Up Application Workshop for residents to apply. Another Drive-Up Workshop will be held next Tuesday, June 2 from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. in front of their office at 79 Chapel Street in Newton. Bring your applications, documents and all your questions.

Newton's program assists income-eligible households who are facing a loss of income due to COVID-19 and are now struggling to pay their housing costs. Metro West is administering the program on behalf of the City and is now working with more than 400 households to complete applications.

Metro West staff will help you get started with your application, whether from the safety of your car or over the phone or via email.
