It's been a tough week for the hundreds of residents of The Towers in Chestnut Hill at 250 Hammond Pond Parkway. Like all of them, I'm grateful we had only three minor injuries during the evacuation from the fire that started early Monday afternoon in a unit on the eighth floor of the South Tower.

The response from our Newton Fire Department was terrific, and they did an admirable job keeping the fire contained. Nonetheless, there has been considerable disruption for the residents of both towers.

The most serious aspect of my job is the safety of our residents. I saw first-hand this week the professionalism, the excellent results of training and investment in

equipment, and the courage of our first responders – Newton Fire, Newton Police and Cataldo Ambulance – and the caring and skilled support from so many others in the City's Health and Human Services, Senior Services, Information Technology and Inspectional Services Departments. I'm both proud and reassured. We will do an afteraction review as we are always looking for ways to improve.

## Newton in Motion, "NewMo," Gets Ready to Launch

Newton's new senior ride share program, Newton in Motion, or NewMo, will start this summer.

I signed a contract with the ride share company Via that will bring to Newton an innovative, affordable, on-demand transportation system for seniors.

I'm so excited about this new ride-share program, the first of its kind in Massachusetts. People 60 years old and older can book a spur of the moment ride online, through an app on their phone or with a phone call, or, just as easily, book a ride for an appointment days in advance.

The name Newton in Motion, or NewMo, was selected after nearly 200 residents

responded to the request for suggestions in one of these updates. After much rather fun deliberation, I settled on a slight variation of resident Stanley Fisher's suggestion of Newton Motion. I want to invite Stanley to be the first passenger when NewMo begins this summer.

Via will have four vehicles in Newton (one wheelchair accessible) that will be painted with a distinct NewMo logo for easy identification.

Newton in Motion will replace the current taxi voucher system. Seniors will be able to access the same specific destinations in Newton and outside the City as are currently available. Rider fees will range from .50 cents to \$3.00 or \$5.00 per ride depending on individual situations.

A sophisticated software program will create routes that may involve picking up multiple passengers along the way, making it more environmentally friendly while providing a social experience for passengers and improving overall service time.

How do I set up a Newton in Motion account? Several information sessions across the City are being planned to explain how the system works, meet the Via staff, upload the app onto your smartphone, set up your account and more. You will also be able to call Via's customer call center to set up an account.

Howwill I be charged? When riders establish an account with Via, they will provide a credit or debit card number. The cost of each ride will then be billed automatically to that account.

What if I don't have a credit card or I don't want to use it? You will be able to set up your account with a prepaid card available through the Senior Center.



# Goodbye to "Foam" Take-Out Containers and Plastic Stirrers

Starting January 1, 2020, polystyrene containers (a.k.a. styrofoam) and plastic drink stirrers are prohibited in Newton.

That means restaurants won't be able to pack your take-out in those white foam containers or serve coffee in foam cups, and the red or green plastic stirrers at some of our favorite coffee shops will be replaced by wooden ones You won't be able to buy them in Newton stores either.

The ban was approved by a unanimous vote of the City Council.

Thank you to Health and Human Services Commissioner Deborah Youngblood for all her work with City Councilors Victoria Danberg and Alison Leary, and others to get this measure passed.

## **Wondering About Measles?**

Measles hasn't hit Newton, but the numbers across the country are rising. The latest Centers for Disease Control figures show 626 individual cases of measles in the

United States between January 1 and April 19 of this year in 22 states (including Massachusetts) – an increase of 71 cases from the previous week.

The good news is that the measles vaccine is very effective – one dose is about 93% effective and a second dose brings you to about 97% immunity. Fully vaccinated people who are unlucky enough to get the virus are much more likely to have a milder case of the illness.

The measles vaccine isn't just for children. If you were born between 1957 and 1965 and/or don't have written proof of vaccination, you should speak with your healthcare provider about getting immunized.

#### Lime Bikes are Back

Lime bikes are back on the street for Season Two. Lime has upgraded Newton's fleet to be 100 percent battery powered, pedal-assist "e-bikes." You still have to pedal, but with a small boost of power, the e-bikes help flatten hills and shrink distances.



When Lime first introduced

e-bikes last September, riders rented the e-bikes twice as often as the manual bikes, prompting Lime to phase out the standard bikes.

While scooters are gaining traction across the country, and a pilot is underway in Brookline, Newton is not considering them.

Remember to wear a helmet, ride safely and follow the rules of the road. When parking, don't block sidewalks, driveways, or crosswalks. If you see a bike parked in the wrong place call Customer Service at City Hall at 617-796-1000, or help us out if you can and reposition the bike yourself.

The Newton Historical Commission has an opening for residents who want to serve as stewards of the City's Demolition Delay and Local Landmark ordinances. Preference will be given to applicants with historic preservation and/or architectural experience, and people with a demonstrated interest in working with property owners to ensure positive outcomes. The Newton Conservation Commission will soon have two openings. The Commission is responsible for protecting the City's wetlands and managing the City's Conservation land. Preference will be given to applicants familiar with wetlands, conservation, or open space issues. Useful skills include: law, engineering, botany, wildlife ecology, and regulation. Interested residents are to attend a Conservation Commission meeting to get a sense of the role of a Commissioner; the next meetings are scheduled for Thursday, May 9, and Thursday, May 30.
