All of the cities in the benchmark group have **preliminary elections** for more than 2X the number of candidates for a seat, **non-partisan elections**, and **November elections**.

Marilyn Contreas provided the following information concerning the day elections are held:

Currently, several cities – one mayor-council and several council-manager – hold municipal elections in June (those elected take office in July) – at least one has three-year staggered terms and elections are held yearly – June is chosen so that it will not interfere in those years where a presidential primary is held, and provides sufficient time for voter registration post the presidential primary in such years (towns, however, given their centuries of spring "annual meeting" voting, do work around this – although neither the legislature nor the Secretary of State has historically shown any interest in accommodating a city to make such a change) June also does not violate the window for the Sept. primary for state offices.
