

# Final Report on the Restoration of the WPA Mural, Citizenship, by Maurice Compris, at Newton North High School

### excerpts from documents establishing the Lieutenant Stafford Leighton Brown Trust Fund

This INDENTURE OF TRUST made this 17th day of January, A. D., 1936, by and between EUGENIE STAFFORD BROWN of Newton, Middlesex County and Common-wealth of Massachusetts, hereinafter called the "SETTLOR", and the NEWTON TRUST COMPANY, a Banking Corporation duly established under the Laws of the said Commonwealth and having its usual place of business in said Newton, hereinafter called the "TRUSTEE".

### WITNESSETH:

That the SETTLOR has this day transferred, assigned and set over unto the said NEWTON TRUST COMPANY, securities as per the attached schedules marked "Exhibit A".

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the same and any other securities and property of any kind which may be added by the SETTLOR with the consent of the TRUSTEE hereunder, to the trust herein created, as evidenced by the receipt of said TRUSTEE, but IN TRUST NEVERTHELESS for the uses and purposes and subject to the powers and duties hereinafter set forth. All property so accepted and held shall be designeted as - "The Lieutenant Stafford Leighton Brown Fund" - in memory of Stafford Leighton Brown, deceased, son of the SETTLOR.

SECOND: The TRUSTEE shall set aside from the principal of the fund the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) and shall apply said sum to the purchase of the materials required for the completion of a Memorial Mural in the Newton High School Library. The aforesaid sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) shall be applied for thepurposes set forth above as, if and when \$\square\$ the Works Progress Administration undertakes the execution of said Mural in accordance with plans submitted by Maurice Compris. In the event said Mural be not undertaken within five (5) years from the date of this instrument, then my TRUSTEE is empowered to expend said sum for a suitable memorial to the said Lieutenant Stafford Leighton Brown to be selected by the said TRUSTEE.

THIRD: After the setting aside of the said Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), the net income of the balance of the Fund shall each year forever be applied by the Committee hereinafter provided for, to assist needy and deserving boys of said Newton who are graduates of the Newton High School, in obtaining a college education. The Committee, in its own uncontrolled discretion, shall

### Parents' Evening

Wednesday evening, Dec. 2. Newton High School held a special parents' evening, from 7 to 9:30. This gave parents, especially the fathers, an opportunity to meet and confer with the teachers. Special school exhibits were shown in the English laboratory, in the Art and the clothing departments. At nine o'clock, the mural to the memory of Lt. Stafford, Leighton Brown was dedicated. His mother, Mrs. Eugenie Stafford Brown, has donated a \$50,000 scholarship fund to Newton High School.

The program of dedication was opened by Acting Principal Raymond A. Green. The speakers were Principal Paul E. Elicker, Superintendent of School Julius E. Warren, and Mr. George E. Fernald, Chairman of Newton School Committee. Mrs. Brown was the guest of honor. Other guests were the artist, Maurice Compris, who painted the mural, and Margarita W. Ells, chairman of the Art Committee. Music was furnished by the Newton High School ensemble.

### **DEDICATION PROGRAM**

LIEUTENANT STAFFORD LEIGHTON BROWN, in whose memory this mural is dedicated, ,will be remembered throughout the years by boys of the Newton High School. In his name a \$50,000 scholarship fund has been set aside by his mother, Mrs. Eugenie Stafford Brown, to be awarded on the basis of character, leadership, and need to boys who are graduates of Newton High School.

Lieutenant Brown was a prominent member of the Class of 1915, and among other activities in the school had an outstanding record as captain of the Tennis Team. He entered Dartmouth College, leaving in 1917 during his sophomore year to join the American Ambulance Field Service Unit in France.

After spending some months near Paris he served for a time in the vicinity of Verdun where there was much desperate fighting. During this period he passed through many thrilling experiences and had many narrow escapes from death. Later Lieutenant Brown was transferred to the famous Lafayette Escadrille, receiving his training at Tours and Issoudun. He obtained many important photographs of enemy territory for the French government. His war record is that of a daring and resourceful pilot. He was killed in a fall from a Spad monoplane on September 28, 1918.

Boys of Newton may well take him has an example of character and leadership.

THE MURAL is a painting forty-five feet wide rendered in the conservative modern style by Maurice Compris.

The theme of the painting, which is "Citizenship", is developed in three panels. The main and central panel symbolizes "Education" and the two smaller ones on either side represent the workers in "Industry" and "Commerce".

In the center panel, against a background of New England hills, on which appear the farm and early church, modern youth is symbolized in the various studies and activities of school life, such as Science, History, Art, Drama, Music, and Athletics. Here the school colors, orange and black, are skilfully woven into the scheme. Not of least importance is the central group, an everyday father with an everyday family standing on a foundation of rock in which is graven the seal of the City of Newton.

Just behind this group rise the inspiring upright lines of buildings of the "City of the Future".

The quotation, inscribed in gold under the entire width of the decoration, is from the Athenian Oath and well expresses the ideal which the mural should inspire: "We will strive unceasingly to quicken the public sense of civic duty that we may transmit our city not less, but greater, better, and more beautiful than it was transmitted to us".

MAURICE COMPRIS, the artist, was born in Holland in 1885. He obtained his training at the Quellinns and the Royal Academy in Amsterdam, Holland. He has studied under Professors Alabee, Drake, Vanderwoay, and Jan Dunselman, and in England and Belgium.

Mr. Compris is an excellent draftsman and is versatile in both academic and modern manners. He has shown his work in the major exhibitions of the country. In addition to murals and decorative panels for public buildings, he is notably successful as a portrait painter.











# CITIZENSHIP

Maurice Compris, 1936

These panels, Commerce and Industry, are the sides of a three-part mural entitled Citizenship, painted by Maurice Compris in 1936 through the Works Progress Administration's Federal Art Project.

The center panel, Education, is now on display on Main Street. The complete mural was originally hung in the library of Newton High School (1936-1973), and the center panel was moved to the cafeteria of the first Newton North High School (1973-2010). In 2000, the school commissioned the Millennial Mural by Ellie Crocker, also exhibited on Main Street, as a companion piece to show how the city and school had changed over the course of the 20th century.

All three panels were restored in 2016 with support from the citizens of Newton through the Community Preservation Act. They were rededicated in 2017 to Lieutenant Brown and all the other men of Newton who gave their lives in World War I (1917-1918).

### Lt. Stafford Leighton Brown

(NHS Class of 1915), who died in France on September 28th, 1918. The mural was funded in part by his mother, Mrs. Eugenia Brown, who also endowed the Brown Scholarship, awarded annually to a Newton North graduating senior.

Originally dedicated in memory of Lieutenant Stafford Leighton Brown

Lieutenant Brown, a graduate of Newton High School (1915), volunteered for service in France, in March 1917. He died there in 1918. Today we gather to honor the memory of all the citizens of Newton who gave their lives or who served in the Great War, and to rededicate this mural, painted in 1936 by Maurice Compris. This mural was funded in part by Lt. Brown's mother, Mrs. Eugenia Brown, who also endowed the Brown Scholarship, which is awarded annually to a Newton North graduating senior.

### ABOUT THE MURAL

From the original dedication, December 2, 1936

The mural is a painting forty-five feet wide rendered in conservative modern style by Maurice Compris (1885 – 1939). The theme of the painting, which is *Citizenship*, was developed in three panels. The main central panel symbolizes *Education*, and the two smaller ones on either side represent the workers in *Industry* and *Commerce*.

In the center panel, against a background of New England hills, on which appear a farm and an early church, modern youth is symbolized in the various studies and activities of school life, such as Science, History, Art, Drama, Music and Athletics. 
