


RE: historical background on 230 Lake Avenue

Newton's Historic Property Survey does not include this house,* but city directories (below) suggest that the 1921 date of construction shown in the Assessors' Database is about a decade too early. City water and building permit records could narrow the date down further.

Although not among the city's oldest homes, this house does appear to mark the final transition of Crystal Lake from a simultaneously industrial and recreational landscape to a recreational and residential one. As with many New England ponds, commercial ice harvesting and public ice skating shared Crystal Lake – not always peacefully – from the mid-19th to the early 20th century. (The ice house is visible on some of the attached maps, in the area bounded by the Lake, Norwood and Centre streets, and the rail line). The fire that destroyed the ice house in 1915 probably made the southern shore of the Lake more desirable for private residences than it had been before.

Biennial city directory shows 3 rd owner/occupant Owners/occupants: Mr. Benjamin J. Goralnick and his wife, Morlene Goralnick Mr. Goralnick's business is listed as "meat packer." The Goralnicks are listed as residing at 230 Lake Avenue from 1957 through 1959.	1957
Biennial city directory shows 4th owner/occupant Owners/occupants: Mr. Jamusz Sciegenny and his wife, Lorraine Sciegenny Mr. Sciegenny's occupation is is listed as "research, MIT"	1961


