#### CURBSIDE ORGANICS\* PILOT PROGRAM

On March 12th, Newton's first-ever curbside organics collection pilot program was launched. This effort includes an emphasis on food waste reduction, with an overall goal of getting food waste out of the trash. During the 4-month pilot, organics are being collected from 200 households in the Auburndale/West Newton area. This location was chosen based on an interest survey administered last fall.

The City of Newton selected pilot participants via a virtual lottery drawing held at City Hall in February with Mayor Ruthanne Fuller.

Participants were asked to commit to complete 3 surveys throughout the pilot, attend an orientation session, and focus on food waste reduction. Initial feedback from participants has been overwhelmingly positive.

The City of Newton is developing a plan to run a larger, longer pilot in 2019. Want to get your name on our waitlist for potential future pilots? Sign up for our wait list.

Other communities that are piloting organics collection include Natick and Beverly. Cambridge and Hamilton-Wenham both offer city-wide curbside organics collection.

\*"Organics" is the term used to describe compostable materials which primarily consist of food waste, but also include compostable paper (napkins, paper towels, coffee filters), tea bags, laundry lint, compostable food service ware, and small amounts of yard clippings or flowers.

#### **ACCEPTED**

- Grass clippings
- Tree leaves
- Tree and shrub pruning
- Wood chips
- Small vegetable and flower plants

Branches must not protrude from the barrel. Tie branches and limbs (6" or less in diameter) in bundles that are less than 4ft long and 3ft in diameter with rope or twine.

#### **NOT ACCEPTED**

- Plastic bags
- Tree stumps or branches greater than 6" in diameter
- Dirt
- Sand
- Rocks
- Asphalt

Bag or barrel must not exceed 50 gallons or 50 pounds.



Consider **composting** yard waste in your backyard.

## YARD WASTE

Many folks in Newton manage all or some portion of their yard waste by composting in their back yard. The City encourages backyard composting and sells compost bins at a discounted rate. See our website for compost bin information and the City's bill pay webpage to purchase a compost bin online.

For those that are not able to or do not wish to compost, curbside yard waste collection resumed the week of March 26, 2018. Weather permitting, it will end the week of December 10, 2018.

Collection occurs weekly on your assigned collection day. Place yard waste in your own barrel(s) or use paper yard waste bags. Yard waste (along with trash and recycling carts) must be at the curb no later than 7AM on your collection day or as early as 4PM the day before.

#### DID YOU KNOW?

Leaves and other yard waste have been banned from disposal at landfills and combustion facilities in Massachusetts since 1992. Placing yard waste in your blue or green cart may result in reject.

This is because yard waste has a higher use than disposal. After it is picked up, yard waste is composted into a soil amendment.



# HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION EVENTS


Household hazardous waste (HHW) should not be disposed of in the trash, flushed down the drain, or poured into storm drains or onto the ground.

Bring any hazardous products you want to get rid of to any household hazardous waste collection event held at the Resource Recovery Center at 115 Rumford Ave. Check out our HHW brochure.

Events are held the first Saturday of each month from 7:30am-1:30pm and the third Thursday of each month from 7:30am-10:30am.

Latex paint is NOT a hazardous waste. To manage unwanted latex paint, let it dry and place it with your household trash.

Used oil, batteries, and light bulbs are accepted 6 days per week at Resource Recovery Center at 115 Rumford Ave.



During 2017, Newton served 837 cars during 16 HHW collection events. That is an average of over 52 cars per event! Help us properly dispose of more HHW during 2018 by informing your neighbors of these events.

# ACCEPTED MATERIALS:

- Adhesives, glues, solvents
- Household cleaners
- Insecticides & pesticides
- Floor & furniture polishes
- Pool chemicals
- Unused fuel (gasoline, kerosene)
- Photo chemicals & chemistry sets
- Oil-based paints, stains & varnishes

#### **REGULATIONS:**

- Limit: 12 gallons of HHW per household per event;
   5 gallons of any one material
- Last car admitted 15 minutes before event ending
- HHW events are weather dependent; see website for cancellations
- Proof of Newton residency <u>required</u>

### CHINA BANS

## RECYCLING IMPORTS

You may have seen recent headlines about the chaos in current recycling markets. Prior to September 2017, China imported and processed roughly 50% of the world's recycling. Last summer China announced tighter restrictions on recycling imports to minimize trash that had been contaminating single stream recycling. Modern sorting equipment is unable to meet the specifications China set, so these restrictions act as an import ban.

As a result, sorting facilities in the US, Europe, Canada, and other nations are stockpiling materials as they scramble to find a market. New markets, including India, Indonesia, and Vietnam, are accepting some materials, but supply is higher than demand, thus the value of recyclable materials has plummeted.

Locally, the City of Newton has faced increased fees for the processing of its recyclables due to high contamination. To fight the contamination, we will be launching a robust education campaign this summer (see page 5).

#### **HOW CAN YOU HELP?**

Newton's recycling is not as clean as it should be. Plastic bags continue to be the number one problem.

# RECYCLING TIPS: INCLUDE ONLY THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR GREEN CART



Kitchen, Laundry, Bath: Bottles and Containers empty and replace cap



Aluminum and Steel Cans empty and rinse



Bottles and Jars

Mixed Paper, Newspaper, and Magazines Bottles and Jars empty and rinse



Plastic bags are the #1 source of contamination in Newton's recycling.

# BOOSTING NEWTON'S RECYCLING IQ

Contamination of single stream recycling has snowballed into a big problem. In order to investigate and reduce recycling contamination in Newton, the City applied for and was awarded the **Recycling IQ Kit** Grant from the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP). This grant provides technical assistance and funding to communities to reduce recycling contamination (IQ = improved quality).

This grant will fund a city-wide education campaign this fall including printed and paid digital advertising. Additionally, starting in October 2018, a team will set out to address curbside contamination by lifting lids to carts and providing specific feedback to residents to recycle right and rejecting carts that repeatedly contain contaminants, such as plastic bags.

According to MassDEP, other communities have been successful in following this program:



Overall contamination trended downward.

Plastic bag contamination, which was specifically targeted, trended **downward**.

The number of contaminated carts notably **decreased** within 8 weeks of starting the program.

### Upcoming Changes

Effective July 1, 2018, the Environmental Affairs Division will be renamed the Sustainable Materials Management Division. Sustainable materials management is the contemporary term used by professionals in the waste field to encompass waste reduction and diversion efforts combined with operations and logistics used to collect and process materials. This simple change in nomenclature serves to shift the culture internally within the City government to better describe what the current Environmental Affairs Division does. The change will also, over time, contribute to shift the culture of the whole community.
