Protect the Jackson Homestead/Newton History Museum's collections, historic building and visitors by expanding and upgrading spaces for the storage and use of two-dimensional collections (printed materials, manuscripts and photographs), while also providing handicap accessibility and fire suppression systems that meet current standards.



PROJECT GOAL AND START UP:

The project goal was to expand storage and research space for the Jackson Homestead's archival collections (printed materials, manuscripts and photographs) while also providing welcoming reception space, handicapped accessibility, new climate control (HVAC) and fire suppression to protect the museum's historic building, its collections and visitors. The funds for this project came from the CPC.

The project started in 2008 by hiring the architectural firm Durkee Brown Veveros Werenfels Architects who worked over the years with the museum personnel during the design process, obtained all the city and state approvals and completed the construction documents and then we went to bid in the winter of 2015. The low bidder, Classic Construction & Development Corp. was awarded the contract in May, 2015. Since the Newton Fire Department (NFD) had several concerns and question about the fire suppression system, the contractor got a demolition permit only on August 6, 2015 and began the demo work in the ELL section of the building. Once the demo was underway the contractor uncovered serious structural damage to the existing wood framing, including missing carrying beams, rotted roof rafters and floor joists. They also found a 15 feet deep abandoned well and boulders around the foundation walls in some areas of the building. On the outside, a manhole was buried under the dirt in the location planned for the new handicap ramp. The structural engineer's detailed design for the repairs was approved by Inspectional Services Department (ISD).

After the NFD was satisfied with the corrections they requested for the fire suppression system, they approved the plans and a full building permit was issued in September 2015. The contractor continued his work and the project went very well during the winter season. All the exterior work including the brick walkway, the deck, ramps landscaping and finished site work was completed, including the work by NSTAR to bring a new electrical service and meter to the building. The project received its certificate of substantial completion in May, 2016.

DELAYS TO THE SCHEDULE

The contractor's discovery of severe deterioration to the wood structural members at the ELL building added time to the project schedule for the engineer to design the repair and get it approved by ISD. The installation of the new water line for the sprinkler system was delayed because of the wrong

demarcation of the utilities location in the street. The site contractor was unable to re-dig the street on time before the cold weather, so the Department of Public Works (DPW) installed the line.

GENERAL CONSTRUCTIONS COMMENTS:

- New archival storage space comprising the eastern half of the wing. This new space includes a work area for an archivist as well as compact storage shelving for archival materials.
- A new heating and cooling system for the east wing. The existing system was removed as part of the expansion of the archives.
- Reconfiguration of the existing unisex restroom and kitchenette to bring them into compliance with Massachusetts Architectural Access Board (MAAB) requirements.
- The addition of a new exterior door to permit access directly into the reception area.
- Modifications to the reception area to bring it into compliance with MAAB and to become a more welcoming area with a gift shop..
- A new accessible ramp on the east elevation of the main building. The ramp has been designed to be compatible with the historic character of the building as well as to have minimal impact on the house and on the site.
- A new fire alarm control panel and new devices throughout the building.

CERTIFICATE Of USE & OCCUPANCY

The project finally was finished and a CERTIFICATE of USE & OCCPANCY issued on 5/5/2016. The museum at that time was already in use by the staff and visitors.








