WHAT WORKS FOR YOU?

APPLYING FOR A JOB DURING A PANDEMIC

We know that things are different right now, but there are still some jobs you may be able to be hired for, whether it is for in-person work or remote work:

- Some places that may hire teens for in-person work are grocery stores, restaurants, pharmacies, landscaping companies, garden centers, and coffee shops.
- You may also find volunteer work at food pantries, local political campaigns, or even school groups like PTSOs who may need help with projects.
- There are numerous opportunities for enterprising students who like working with kids you can work remotely as a tutor (put all of that knowledge and studying to good use and advertise yourself online as a tutor to families in your neighborhood!), or in-person as a babysitter or tutor.

HOW DO I DECIDE?

Ask Yourself: What do I like?







- What matters most to you what do you care about?
- Consider jobs that match your interests
- Do you like to read? Consider a job at the library, a bookstore, or a comic shop (if open and available)
- Do you like food or serving people? Consider a job at one of Newton's MANY restaurants: Rancatore's, Johnny's Luncheonette, Cabot's, Brewer's Coalition, Little Big Diner, etc.
- Do you like working with kids, adults, or working alone?
- Do you like working with computers or technology?

FOR YOUR FIRST JOB, CONSIDER...



Restaurants

Some restaurants might hire you as a host, counter service, prep cook, busser, or even server. These are great first jobs and teach you lots of skills that help you later in life – how to talk to people, how to problem solve, and how to thrive in challenging environments!



Odd Jobs

You might want to advertise your services to your neighbors and family friends — help out with odd jobs for cash! Ex: moving furniture, pet sitting, basic yard work, cleaning out someone's garage, etc.



Lifeguard

Consider becoming a lifeguard!
Often local pools/the
YMCA/beaches will hire teens
and this is a great skill you can
use long-term – many people
who earn a lifeguard
certification continue to work
as one part-time to earn extra
money, even if they have
another job.



Hands-On

Like to be outdoors? Some landscaping companies will hire summer help with mowing, lawn care, planting flowers, etc.! It's a great first job, and very safe to do right now!

WHAT ARE THE OPTIONS?

Camp Counselor/CIT (if/when Camps are open – applications usually come out in Jan.)

Babysitting – Consider putting out flyers or advertising on parent groups on Facebook, Newton NextDoor, or Newton Neighbors Helping Neighbors!

Odd Jobs (lawn care, running errands, etc.)

Dog Walking – advertise online!

Retail/Customer Service

Grocery Stores

Coffee Shops

Tutoring – advertise in your neighborhood, online, to your parents' friends, etc.

Lifeguard

WHICH NEWTON BUSINESSES HIRE TEENAGERS?

Remember, we're in a pandemic, so it might be harder to find a job right this minute, but lots of these places might still be hiring and it can't hurt to try!

- Grocery Stores Stop and Shop, Whole Foods, and Star Market
- Camps Newton Community Education (interns AND counselors), and Parks and Recreation (CIT and counselors)
- Restaurants Johnny's, Sandwichworks, Cabot's, Bruegger's,
 Brewer's Coalition, JP Licks, Rancatores (and probably more)
- Coffee Shops Starbucks and Dunkin'
- YMCA, Boys and Girls Club, Gath Pool, Crystal Lake
- Retail TJ Maxx, Michaels, West Newton Cinema, local shops
- Childcare/Babysitting Promote your services with a flyer in your neighborhood or online on parenting Facebook groups!
- Help Around Town like Craigslist for posting work for teens!
- Post your services on NextDoor, Newton Neighbors Helping Neighbors, or Facebook

REQUESTING AN INTERNSHIP – VIA EMAIL

- Introduce yourself, and be professional and formal (as you would on a job application)
- Be brief give reasons why you'd be a fit, state your ask (what kinds of work/projects are you looking for, who do you want to work with, what dates/times do you want to work there, etc.)
- Make your request months in advance give them time to reply
- Include your contact information
- Use a professional email address (your name@gmail)

- Be polite
- Be sure to let them know if you're available remotely or in person
- Attach a resume with your request if possible
- If you don't hear from them, follow up in a week or so to check in (more on this in another slide)
- Follow up give them a week or so to respond and then check in

REQUESTING AN INTERNSHIP, CONT'D

- Here is an example of an introductory email requesting an internship
- Email is preferred be sure you do your homework to find best contact(s)
- Use your contacts is there a person you know who can help you make an introduction somewhere?
- Will it be paid or unpaid? Make sure you have an idea in mind first –
 never ask in an inquiry, but wait until you're offered the position. If
 you absolutely need to be paid, seek only advertised paid positions.

Check out your local political campaigns – often they will take HS students on as interns! Right now is a FANTASTIC time to get involved in a political campaign you care about – everything from City Council, to School Committee, to State Reps and Congress!



Call and Email businesses/offices/organizations you are interested in and offer to intern for them – be sure to have a timeframe and a plan/idea of the work you might like to do.



WHAT YOU NEED

- Positive Attitude!
- Ideas about what you'd like to do/what you're interested in
- Hours you're available
- A resume doesn't hurt, but isn't always necessary. If you don't have one and want to make one, ask your parents or guidance counselor!
- A working, professional email address and phone number
- If you're being paid, a Work Permit Mass.gov (if you're under 18 – go to your school's website for instructions)



THE IMPORTANCE OF FOLLOWING UP

- Once you apply for the job/internship, following up with a phone call/email a few days later is one of the most important steps!
- Give them your name and let them know the position you applied for. Let them know you're calling/emailing to follow up on your application and that you're hoping to know more soon.
- If you've had an interview, ALWAYS send a thank you note a day or two after!
- Be sure to write down any further instructions if they tell you "we will let you know by X date and time", note that. If they say, "Please call back on X date", do that.
- Do not expect that simply applying will be enough many times a follow up is what is most important and can make you stand out.
