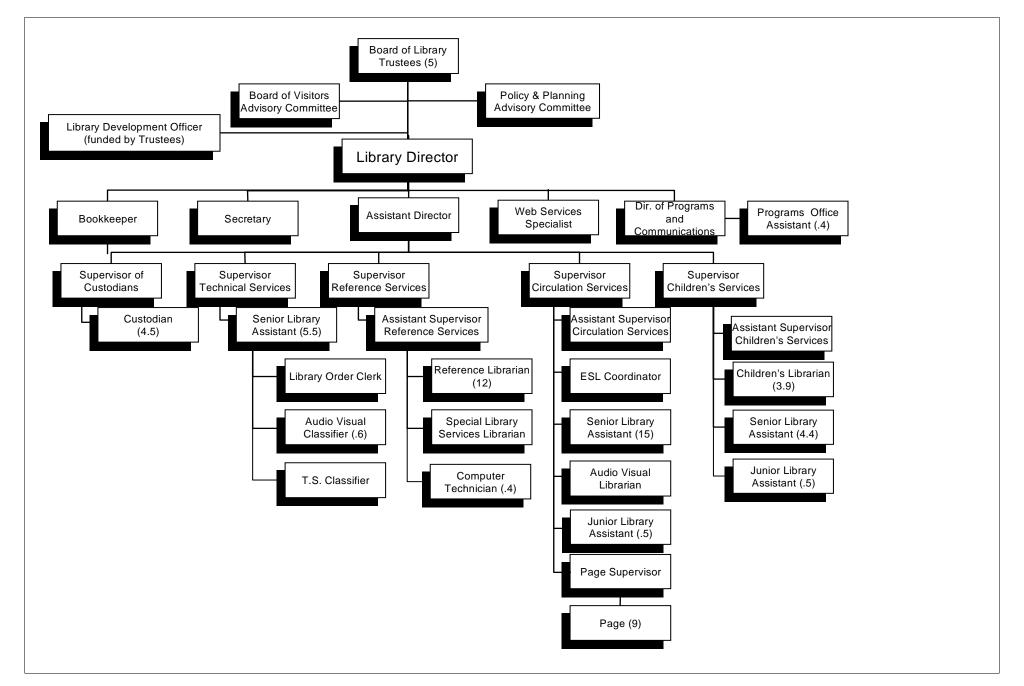

NEWTON FREE LIBRARY

DEPARTMENT DESCRIPTION

The mission of the Newton Free Library is to provide the widest possible range of library services for the educational, cultural and recreational enrichment of all members of the Newton community. Through the Theodore D. Mann Building, the library provides an extensive collection of print, non-print, and electronic resources, comprehensive reference service, and a wide array of educational and cultural programs for people of all ages. The Children's Department provides a full range of activities for infants through middle school, with the goal of assisting children in their educational pursuits, and ultimately instilling in them a curious mind and a love for reading and learning.

The Main Library continues to loan more items than any other library building in the state as it has for many years. We continue to work particularly hard on providing adequate technology in the library - and a virtual library through our web site. Use of the web site and our electronic resources is growing considerably as we provide our users with access to a wide range of information 24/7.

The Newton Free Library ranked 5th in the country as compared to public libraries in communities of the same size by Hennen's American Public Library Ratings. The ratings are based on 15 input and output measures. A new rating system, the LJ Index of Public Library Service 2009, has earned the Newton Free Library a star rating based on output measures

compared to other peer libraries based on operating expenditures rather than population of the community.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

1. The Newton Free Library's circulation increased slightly from FY07 to FY08.

2. Interlibrary loans TO other libraries remained higher than loans FROM other libraries. This indicates that our collections continue to satisfy the majority of borrower's needs without relying on loans from other Minuteman Library Network libraries.

4. The Library significantly expanded and improved access to library services available 24/7 through its website for patrons. Patrons may search the Minuteman library catalog and reserve library materials, including new feature films; pay fines online; renew materials; reserve museum passes; make recommendations for library materials; and request Interlibrary loan for materials not found in the Minuteman catalog.

The reference staff has joined a cooperative to provide access to online reference service 24 hours/day and seven days/week. Patrons can also e-mail reference questions directly to Newton Free Library reference staff and receive a response the next business day. The reference staff offers many online classes at the library and for several of these classes including applying for a job online, exploring travel resources, and readers advisory, training materials are available through the library's website. The library's flickr site, a social networking project where reference staff have posted hundreds of Newton library photographs, has been used as a model in teaching librarians how to use flickr to market library services and for interdepartmental staff development purposes.

In FY09 the library subscribed to 44 online databases, 26 of which Newton residents can access from home. The library also provides access to 37 databases, of which 36 have remote access, provided by the state and the Minuteman Library Network. In addition the reference staff has added links to quality free websites arranged by subject.

We offer a blog for children and several blogs for adults on books and reading, job searching, ESL, poetry, travel, and retirement. Patrons can learn about a topic, find links for more information, and post comments. The library offers an online service for young adults and adults that provides personalized reading lists of fiction and nonfiction books. The "Books for You" service has an online form to fill out with the patron's reading preferences and what types of book suggestions they are looking for. The request is submitted online and within two weeks a library staff member provides a list of ten annotated titles that is emailed to the patron. All of these annotated book recommendations have also been compiled by genre into a bibliography available on the library's homepage.

The library website provides access to "Bookletters", a database that allows patrons to sign up for monthly e-mail delivery of customized annotated booklists on many different subjects. Currently there are 40 lists available and they are e-mailed to 2,446 patrons. In addition to these booklists, reference staff has prepared bibliographies and pathfinders on many different subjects, including Newton history, which are available to patrons through the library's website.

We have tracked use of the library's website on days that the library was closed, including Sundays in the summer and holidays. The range of visitors is from 463 patrons on Christmas Day December 25, 2008 to 1,010 patrons on Veterans' Day November 11, 2008. On summer Sundays in 2008, when the library was closed, the average number of visitors to the library's website was 707. On March 5, 2009 during hours the library was open there were 1,373 users on the library's website, and 374 (or 21% of the total) on the same day when the library was closed.

5. The Library received an LSTA federal grant administered through the Mass. Board of Library Commissioners in FY08, "Mother Goose on the Loose," to enable the Children's Room to offer innovative, emergent literacy programs for babies, toddlers and their caregivers, both in the library and out in the community. In addition, the Children's Department offered expanded programming in FY08 in the Main Library as well as in the schools and to family daycares.

6. The Library received a two year grant from the Financial Regulatory Authority Investor Education Foundation (FINRA) and the American Library Association in FY08

- called Smart Investing @ Your Library® to sponsor a Retirement Planning Club for Women. Over 100 women registered for the Club. Members as well as the general public attend monthly meetings with speakers on such topics as mutual funds, asset allocation, social security, and library resources. The grant provides educational modules through the library's website that attracts over 1,000 views/month. The library has a retirement blog available to patrons through its website. Using grant funds the library was able to purchase books, newsletters, and databases. The grant also allowed the library to work with a marketing firm to design a new logo, tagline, and brochure that will help attract new patrons and market library services. NPR interviewed library staff implementing the grant, club members, and volunteers, and also taped the February 2009 program. They were highlighted on national NPR radio Saturday, February 28, 2009, and can be heard through the NPR website.
- 7. The Young Adult Librarians continued to implement a twoyear federal grant administered through the Mass. Board of Library Commissioners for young adult services. The librarians formed a teen advisory board, created and furnished a new young adult area on the second floor, and presented many successful young adult programs.
- 8. In FY 2008, 299 adult programs and exhibits were planned and presented at the library including art shows and receptions, club meetings, concerts and lectures/author talks. Close to 11,000 patrons attended these events. We partnered with several city agencies and community organizations including, among others, the Department of

Public Works, Health and Human Services, the Newton Schools Foundation, Newton History Museum, the Newton Symphony Orchestra and Green Decade/Newton. Specifically the Foundation for Racial, Ethnic and Religious Harmony provided the Programs Office with a grant that allowed us to present and outstanding Black History Month event. In addition, the Director of Programs and Communications was honored by being selected to serve on the Public Relations Committee of the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners. The committee is engaged in a multi-year effort to increase awareness of libraries and their services and to increase library use throughout the Commonwealth.

9. In FY09 the library's ESL program, A Legacy for Literacy, received a \$1,500 grant from the Foundation for Racial, Ethnic, and Religious Harmony for a series of Cultural Competency Workshops for tutors, and to purchase materials on diverse cultures for the literacy collection.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Goal 1. The Library will meet patrons' reference and circulation needs in FY10.

Objective A. The Library will maintain current levels of circulation staff productivity in the face of significant demand.

The chart gives statistics for the number of loans made by each full time equivalent employee working at the library and the number of loans for every hour that the library is open. It compares Newton with 9 other area libraries. Newton staff continues to work efficiently, charging out more items per hour open and per FTE than any other library in the area

The circulation at the library will remain stable in FY09, and we will continue to satisfy customer service demands effectively with current circulation staff. Circulation of print materials is expected to rise in FY09. Starting July 2008 the Newton Free Library met patron demand for a new service that allows reserves to be placed on feature films. This new service will keep DVDs on the hold shelf waiting for patrons to pick them up, and will therefore decrease overall circulation of AV materials.

Goal 2. The Library will provide suitable and ample collections of materials to meet the needs of the community.

Objective A. Continue to maintain a collection that satisfies the great majority of our borrower's needs.

This number is the total percentage of loans at each of the libraries that has been borrowed from another Minuteman library because it is not owned or available at the listed library. 6% of the 1,955,025 items that the Newton Free Library loaned to its patrons in FY08 came from another library in the Minuteman Library Network. This was the smallest % in the Network, and we will continue to maintain this low percentage in FY09 and FY10.

Objective B. Evaluate and extensively develop book, audio visual, and electronic collections using FY10 Collection Goals and Objectives so that areas that are developed show significant increases in circulation from FY09.

Each year the Library Director and Board of Trustees develop goals and objectives for the collection based on user needs. These goals address subject and format areas that require additional development and funding. Following is an analysis, using circulation figures, of areas of the collection that received additional development in FY09. It compares loans from October 2007 (FY08) with loans from October 2008 (FY09) after we had purchased many new items in the areas designated for development.

In FY09 the Library purchased several new electronic products including Tell Me More (interactive webbased language learning program), Morningstar, and Value Line Investors Survey. In FY10 we will continue to expand our electronic resources and to improve our marketing of them so that more Newton residents use the library at home and at work.

Objective B. Create online index to Newton newspapers that can be accessed from the library's website.

Objective C. Develop an online system for processing ESL student and tutor applications, which will cut down on data entry time and eliminate errors by 80-90%.

Objective D. Create web-appropriate format for presentation of popular booklists for children.
