
COVID-19 Updates and Losses

Newton Cases

We had 71 new confirmed cases of COVID-19 over the past seven days from Feb. 24 – March 3, the first time since just before Thanksgiving that there have been fewer than 100 new people who tested positive in Newton during a single week. These additional cases bring Newton's cumulative total to 3,617.



The data continue to show that we're flattening another curve in the pandemic. Over the two-week tracking period used by the State from Feb. 14 - 27, Newton had 214 cases, compared to 209 during the previous two weeks, and 206 during the period prior to that. (The prior two periods saw 261 and 367 new cases respectively.)




Newton COVID-19 Cases

Our incidence rate in Newton also held essentially steady, with just a slight uptick to 16.7 cases per 100,000 this week from 16.3 over the past two State reporting periods.

Newton's positivity rate is also again under 1% this week. Of the 36,660 tests administered to Newton residents over the past two week reporting period, 0.64% came back



positive, a very slight decrease from the 0.66% reported over the previous two weeks. The statewide positivity rate is now 1.93%, from 2.15% last week (with 1.25 million tests performed in Massachusetts during the current two-week reporting period).

The news is also improving at Boston College. The Boston College community accounted for 24% of the positive COVID-19 cases in Newton over the past two-week reporting period, a decline from the 40% over the previous two weeks. The Boston College <u>website</u> today shows 18 total positive cases reported starting on Monday, March 1.

(FYI – The other colleges and universities in Newton have consistently accounted for a very small percentage of Newton cases since the start of the pandemic.)

The news is good, but it will only be sustained if we all continue to follow the safety protocols which by now are all too familiar: wear masks, wash hands, distance physically, limit gatherings, stay home when not feeling well, and follow travel orders.

Newton Public School Data

We have 11 people in the Newton Public Schools who tested positive for COVID-19 during the seven day period of Feb. 25 – March 3, bringing the cumulative total to 286. This includes 7 students learning in person, 2 staff members working in person and 2 Distance Learning Academy/remote learning students. Vaccines

We just found out that our Health and Human Services staff can get access to data on Newtonians that have received vaccinations. We'll bring you that information next week. I'm glad educators, childcare workers and school staff will soon be able to sign up for an appointment. Our Health and Human Services staff are well prepared to give vaccinations to Newton Public School staff right here in Newton but the State so far is sending them to pharmacies or mass vaccination sites. If that changes, we'll let you know.

Losses

This week we lost another two Newton residents, bringing the number of people in our community who died with COVID-19 to 203. As I write these words, I think of the beautiful tribute that appeared on our chair memorial on the lawn of City Hall over the weekend. A framed photo was placed on one of the chairs along with long-stemmed roses spread among the rows. The chairs may be empty, but the lives are not forgotten. May the memory of our 203 neighbors be as a blessing.



Summer Camps 2021

Thankfully Newton's Parks, Recreation and Culture Department can open some inperson camps this summer. They range from Summer Fun and Outdoor Adventure Camps for our younger campers to Sports and Golf Camps for our older ones.

The formats include half-day, full-day and extended day in-person options. We'll follow CDC and Massachusetts Department of Public Health guidelines with the campers grouped into cohorts. For safety reasons, campers won't be going on field trips or to off-site activities this summer. We'll also offer some virtual programs as well for families who prefer this format.



Bike Sharing Expanding

More good news for our bike sharing program— The City of Newton just secured from MassDOT a Winter Shared Streets grant for \$199,919 to fund 4 additional Bluebikes stations with 44 more bike share bicycles.

The City currently has 8 bike share stations (West Newton Square, just outside of West Newton Square at the Armory, Washington Street at Crafts Street near Whole Foods, two in Newton Centre at the Langley parking lot and on Union Street near the T station, two in Newton Corner on Washington Street at Centre Street and on Washington Street at Bacon Street, and one in Nonantum at the former library building). An additional station will be added shortly in Newtonville at the main Washington and Walnut Street intersection, bringing the total to 9 stations.

The beauty of having four more is the creation of a web of stations so people have more options for picking them up and dropping them off. Our neighbors in Watertown, Brookline and Boston are also part of Bluebikes.



We're starting the site planning for the new stations and expect to have them installed in May. Do you have a suggestion for where they should go?
