

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.)

This 2 family house was moved to its present site c. 1917 and is unusual in its configuration for the neighborhood, which is predominantly of simple gable houses. More complex in its massing, the house is  $2\frac{1}{2}$  stories in height, has 2 offset pavillions, one of which contains the porches. Gabled dormers appear on the south side of the roof adding to the picturesque quality of the house.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.)

Built by Stephen O'Brien c. 1885, this house was moved to its present location in 1915 to make way for City Hall, a few blocks away. Originally, it was located at 367 Homer Street. Stephen O'Brien was a builder, as were many of the Irish immigrants who settled in West Newton. He built this house as a 2-family residence, a practice which began more seriously decades after this house's construction. The area was known on the 1874 Atlas as Cold Spring City, named for the spring which crosses it, but was known more commonly as Cork City for the number of residents who came from County Cork, Ireland. Mary Morrison, who lives there today, is a descendant of one such resident, Stephen O'Brien. Her grandfather was employed by the nearby cemetery and 2 women in the family were city employees, a well-known pattern of employment among the Irish in West Newton.
