COVID-19 Update

The COVID-19 numbers continue moving in the right direction. We had only 38 additional confirmed cases of COVID-19 between April 29 and yesterday, May 5, compared to 53 new cases over the previous six-day period and 84 new cases prior to that. (Newton experienced its highest number of new cases in one week, 253, between Jan. 6 - 13, 2021.) These new cases bring our cumulative total of Newtonians who have had confirmed cases of COVID-19 to 4,330.

Most importantly, this week, for the fourth week in a row, no one in Newton died with COVID-19. This is the first time since we began reporting about deaths more than a year ago that we've gone this long without losing one of our neighbors. I am filled with hope.

But, there is a huge caveat.

Dr. Rochelle Walensky, Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, said we can be hopeful if:

(1) Everyone who can does their part and gets vaccinated.

(2) We continue to slow the spread by wearing masks indoors in public places and outdoors when 6 feet of physical distancing isn't possible, washing hands, and staying away from large crowds ... until more people are vaccinated.

Next Year's City Budget

Next Wednesday night, May 12, I will present the City of Newton's Fiscal Year 2022 Budget to the City Council during a virtual Zoom meeting.

This budget reflects our values. While we're still feeling the economic effects of the pandemic on our revenue, this budget helps those that are hurting, provides excellent services, supports the Newton Public Schools, and makes long-lasting investments to make Newton a better City.

I will also include preliminary plans for targeted investments of our first allocation of the \$65.2 million in American Rescue Plan Act funding coming to Newton. Helping the vulnerable, recovering and rebuilding, and investing in a better Newton will be our focus.

Newton Free Library's Doors Spring (More) Open

With the State's reopening plan moving forward, the Newton Free Library is opening its doors a bit wider.

Newton's Library is now open for 45-minute visits (extended from the 15 previously allowed), and physically distanced computers are available for public use by appointment or walk-in use. To reserve a computer in advance: <u>Schedule an Appointment</u> or call the Library at 617-796-1360.

New chairs are also out on the plaza out front on Homer Street, so bring a laptop (or borrow one of the Library's) and get some sunshine while using the expanded outdoor WIFI.



Returning books? Starting this Friday, May 7, patrons can

once again return library items directly into the automated sorter (green conveyor belt) inside so they will be checked in and cleared instantly.

When visiting the Library, keep in mind that Homer Street is now one-way from Walnut Street to Commonwealth Avenue with new reverse-angled parking options. This change creates more parking near the Library in preparation for the City's upcoming Library parking lot solar canopy construction project. Learn about the project <u>here</u>.

Appreciating Our Teachers and Nurses

This week we shine a bright light on our teachers and nurses, two groups of professionals who, this year in particular, deserve our gratitude.

Day after day, we saw teachers on Zoom doing their best to engage and support students from kindergarten to grade 12. Today, too, is Nurse Appreciation Day. Our Newton Public School nurses helped scared students, parents and guardians and guided our educators when we were fully remote and as we came back into the school buildings. Our nurses in our Health and Human Services Department did contact tracing, gave vaccines, explained constantly changing directives, and provided guidance. Nurses at Newton-Wellesley Hospital and beyond worked long shifts surrounded by a virus that could literally kill and comforted the patients who were otherwise alone.


