# Mayor's Update

## COVID-19 Update

We had 10 new confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Newton over the past week, a continuation of the good news we've seen since vaccines became widely available. On Jan. 15, the date 300 of Newton's first responders received their first doses of vaccine, we reported 253 new cases over the previous week. Each month since then we've seen fewer people in Newton being infected with new cases falling to 112 on Feb. 18, 85 on March 15, 66 on April 16, and now only 10.



This week's 10 new cases are down from the 22 we saw last week and brings our cumulative total in Newton to 4,362.



Over the two-week tracking period used by the State from May 5 - 15, Newton had 40 new cases compared to 86 over the previous period.

The average daily incidence rate fell to 3.1 per 100,000, down from 6.7 last week, and our positivity rate (the percentage of tests that come back positive) is now 0.24% (with 24,326 tests performed).

Cases among the Boston College community accounted for 20% of Newton's confirmed cases during this two-week tracking period. Updated BC data can be found <u>here</u>.

#### Losses

The best news of all is that for the sixth week we have lost no one in Newton with COVID-19.

## Newton Public School COVID-19 Data

Over the past seven days, from May 13 - 19, the Newton Public Schools had no new cases of COVID-19.

Vaccination Update

This week's State vaccination information shows that 68,664 Newtonians, or 75% of our population, have had at least one dose.

The state data also shows that approximately 60% of Newton's population is now fully vaccinated with 15% partially vaccinated. (Last week we were at 56% and 16% respectively.)

Newtonians who are partially or fully vaccinated include:

95%+ of those who are 75 years old or more, 95%+ of those 65 - 74 years old, 95%+ who are 50 - 64 years old, 95%+ who are 30 - 49 years old, 65% who are 20 - 29 years old, and 56% who are 16 - 19 years old, 46% who are 12 - 15 years old.

## **Gun Shop Update**

At close to midnight last Monday night, May 17, the City Council deadlocked at 12 – 12 on whether to continue to debate an amendment to the City's zoning ordinance to require a special permit and limit the location of gun businesses to three locations in the City that meet buffer requirements from sensitive uses.

Half of the Council was in favor of voting on the zoning change that night. The other half wanted more time to consider the changes and to explore options to further restrict the potential locations of a gun store in Newton.

The tie vote meant that the City Council could move forward with the vote on the zoning ordinance that night.

But a councilor called for the vote to be "Chartered," effectively delaying the discussion and vote until the next full Council meeting which is scheduled for Wednesday, June 7.

On a separate but closely related track, the City Council's Zoning and Planning Committee will take up a discussion of a separate item to adopt an ordinance banning gun businesses entirely next Wednesday, May 26 at 6:30 p.m. Get the Zoom log in information <u>here</u>.

## Leaf Blowers

We have a new registration requirement for commercial landscapers who use leaf blowers in Newton. Starting on Labor Day, these companies will need to register with the Inspectional Services Department (ISD) before working on properties in the City.



The leaf blower noise ordinance was passed into law by the City Council four years ago and among other things prohibits the use of all leaf blowers at or above 65 decibels. (There are no exceptions.)

These new changes, passed by the City Council this week, require landscapers to register with ISD, provide contact information, and attest that they understand Newton's bylaw. The landscapers will also be required to post registration information on their company vehicles. The registration fee is \$50, and companies can be fined for violations. Multiple fines could result in a suspension of operating privileges in Newton.

Homeowners please know that the changes include a provision that they can be held responsible and fined if an unregistered landscaper violates the noise ordinance at their property. The City will post a list of registered landscapers this fall so homeowners will know who is in compliance with the ordinance. (We will remind everyone in late August.)

Please remember that gas-powered leaf blowers are prohibited from Memorial Day to Labor Day.

In the process of getting settled, new City of Newton Treasurer/Collector Ron Mendes stumbled across a legacy of late 19th century clerical practice: four bottles of **Commonwealth of Massachusetts Standard Record Ink**. This blue ink, registered for use in November 1899, was the official ink for records and other public documents in Massachusetts. The Federal Government would not adopt standard ink until 1914. A feather quill pen and antique pen stand were found nearby.
