
Mayor's Update



On Monday, I had the honor of administering the oath of office to Newton Police Chief John F. Carmichael, Jr.

Chief Carmichael went through 17 sets of interviews, a rigorous evaluation at an assessment center, and thorough reference and background checks. I know he is the right person, at this critical moment in time, to lead our strong and good Newton Police Department into its next chapter.

He started work right away getting to know the officers, dispatchers and civilian staff at NPD, our department heads and City and School employees, and all of us. I know he dunked at least one basketball with a group of kids he saw playing hoops on his way to City Hall yesterday afternoon.

He also wasted no time getting involved in the nitty-gritty of everyday policing. Yesterday, just before noon, Newton Police Officers responded to a report of a breaking and entering in progress in the 300 block of Watertown Street.

Arriving officers learned the suspect had fled the scene and put out a description over the radio of three suspects and their vehicle.

A Detective Sergeant heard the description, spotted the vehicle, and eventually stopped it on Bridge Street, arresting the three suspects (all from Boston) at the scene and charging them with breaking and entering.

Where was Chief Carmichael? He helped out by directing the stalled traffic around the arrest scene on Bridge Street.

Good work done by all.

COVID-19 Update

We're continuing to see good COVID-19 numbers this week.

We had 5 new confirmed cases in Newton, one more than last week, bringing our cumulative total number of cases to 4,376.

Newton had 9 new cases during the two-week tracking period used by the State from May 23 – June 5, compared to 8 over the previous two weeks, and 14 during the two-week tracking prior to that. The average daily incidence rate is 0.7 per 100,000, up slightly from 0.6 last week, and the percent of tests performed on Newton residents that came back positive is now 0.13% of the 7,453 tests performed.

I can also report again, for the ninth week in a row, the great news that no one in Newton died with COVID-19.

Again, this week the Boston College community accounted for none of Newton's new cases.

Over the past seven days, from June 3 - 9, the Newton Public Schools reported one new case of COVID-19.

This week's State vaccination information shows that 71,901 Newtonians, or 78% of our population, have had at least one vaccine dose. The state data also shows that more than 69% of Newton's population is now fully vaccinated with 9% partially vaccinated. (Last week we were at 65% and 12% respectively.) State data shows 95%+ of Newton residents who are ages 30 and older are partially or fully vaccinated. To see more detailed vaccination information, click here.

Clean Recycling

Back in 2018, we asked for help in cleaning up our recycling- and you delivered.

The City of Newton went from having 18% of our recycling contaminated to 9% after a robust education campaign that included inspectors checking recycling bins.

Why is this important? Our contract with Waste Management includes fines if our recycling is more than 10% contaminated with things that shouldn't be included in the recycling bins.

What are some of the things that should NOT go in our recycling bins? Plastic bags and plastic utensils, black plastic takeout food trays, food or beverage cartons, Styrofoam, shredded paper, wood, clothing and textiles, tissues and napkins, and medicine bottles.

With your help, the City of Newton has not paid one penny in fines because of contaminated recycling, since February 2019.

Let's keep it that way.

We're now launching another education campaign. We'll soon be seeing large permanent decals (see the photo) on our recycling bins, designed by the <u>MassDEP</u> <u>Recycle Smart</u> campaign, to remind us of what materials are okay to go in the green carts.

Since we're going to be adding decals on each recycling bin, we'll also be gathering some data. Data will help us better understand how these services are functioning and how we can improve, with an emphasis on advancing waste reduction efforts. Waste reduction is important for the environment, and also because disposal costs are expected to continue to increase significantly in the next 10 years.

We're looking for volunteers interested in recycling education and waste reduction, and they must pass a background check.

Details about the project:

- Volunteers will walk neighborhood routes, adhere stickers to recycling carts, lift cart lids and document observations to help us make improvements. (NOTE: This is not an enforcement project; there will not be any fines.)
- The project starts on Monday, June 14 and will run through mid-October.
 Volunteers are needed weekday mornings from 7:00 a.m.— 10:00 a.m. We are looking for volunteers who will commit to walking a minimum of one route per week.
- Our goal is to get a sticker on every bin in the City, so we're looking for as many volunteers as we can get.
- This is a fair-weather project. If it is raining, the routes that day will be cancelled.

Help us provide recycling education to reduce recycling contamination while getting some exercise and spending time outside. Also help us gather information that will inform decisions regarding Newton's waste and recycling collection services.




Ciccone with a memorial brick in front of Newton Fire
