I'm so pleased to be Mayor of a City that jubilantly supports the dignity and self-worth of our LGBTQ+ community and proudly flies the Pride flag.

We gather this year filled with hope after a traumatic year, and a traumatic four years, especially thankful to be together in person.

We gather to celebrate the LGTBQ+ community with so many of you:

City Councilor Holly Ryan, among the county's first openly transgender elected officials. and an effective and persistent voice for decades working for equality across the state;

Brooke Foucault Welles and the Human Rights Commissioners;

Linda Walsh and Shin-Yi Lao "LOUD without the D" of the Newton Health and Human Services Department and Lt. Bruce Apotheker of the Newton Police Department.

Also with us this evening is Nevena Pilipovic-Wengler, Newton's community engagement specialist in our Planning Department. Nevena is working on Zoning Redesign and this summer she and the Planning team are trying to learn as much as they can about Newtonians' vision for our village centers. She's here because she wants to hear from *everyone*, including, specifically, members of our LGBTQ+ community. She is pulling together a focus group exclusively for our LGBTQ+ community. Interested? After the program, introduce yourself to her.

Fifty two years after the Stonewall Uprising which sparked a liberation movement, and 51 years after the first Pride flag was flown and after 5 decades plus of struggle, sacrifice, political victories and violent protests, we stand together here still in the midst of another time of struggle – yet still hopeful, hopeful that we together will do the vital work necessary to bend the arc of justice.

We are here tonight to fly the Pride flag knowing that across our country fundamental LGBTQ+ rights are being challenged and acts of violence, bullying and harassment abound.

Right now, as I speak, there are more than 125 bills before state legislatures seeking to take healthcare away from transgender children.

Right now, transgender girls are being denied an opportunity to play schools sports.

We must move forward.

We will do the critical work together here, in the good City of Newton, where our Pride flag flies as a symbol of the spirit of inclusivity, pride, unity and celebration for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer people of our community.

I'm so pleased to introduce this year's award recipients who demonstrated extraordinary resilience and commitment to LGBTQ+ lives in Newton and beyond.
