Shared Streets Grant III

We have some more good news for biking, walking and dining outdoors in Newton. MassDOT just awarded the City of Newton a third *Shared Streets and Spaces Grant* for \$150,969.

The City recently completed two Shared Streets and Spaces projects using \$353,000 in funding from previous grant rounds. These rounds added two Park & Pedal electric bike stations and six new Bluebikes bikeshare stations (plus one station move).

This third round of funding supports three important initiatives focused on safe streets, shared mobility and, we hope, outdoor dining.

We will be installing Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFB) at three crosswalks in Newton Centre. At these intersections, people using the crosswalk will be able press a button which turns on flashing yellow lights to alert approaching cars and thus increase pedestrian safety.

The grant will also fund one new bike share station and one to two station moves. (As we optimize our system for ridership, if a station is very low performing, we move it to a location where it will benefit more residents.)

Lastly, we hope to construct platforms for 3 or 4 restauranteurs in their outdoor dining areas to raise the seating from street level up to sidewalk level. This helps customers with all levels of mobility enjoy outdoor dining.

Per the grant requirements, all projects must be implemented by December 31, 2021. Special thanks go to Nicole Freedman, Director of Transportation Planning, for shepherding the grant application process. For more information, please contact Nicole at <u>NFreedman@newtonma.gov</u>.
