## **COVID-19 Case Update**

Our Newton data this week continues to show a low level of COVID-19 and another slight uptick in cases with 12 confirmed new cases between July 7 - 14. We had 7 new cases between June 30 and July 6, and 11 between June 23 - 30. There was just one new case between June 16 - 23. Our cumulative total of cases over the course of the pandemic is now 4,409.

The average daily incidence rate over the past two-week state tracking period from June 27 - July 10 is 1.6 per 100,000, up a bit from the 1.2 reported last week, and from 0.5 from the June 6 - 19 state reporting period.

The percent of tests performed on Newton residents that came back positive is now 0.4% of the 5,663 tests performed. (The rate was 0.2% of the 6,726 tests performed from June 6 – 19). For comparison purposes, on Jan. 15, the day our Health and Human Services Department administered the first vaccines to our first responders, we reported an incidence rate of 37.1 cases per 100,000 people and a positivity rate of 2.96% of the 17,703 tests administered over the two week period of Dec. 27 to Jan. 9.)

Being fully vaccinated continues to be the best protection against COVID-19.

Again this week, for the fifteenth week in a row, the best news is that no one in Newton died with COVID-19.

## **Mosquito Season**

Mosquitos are out, biting, and, unfortunately, spreading diseases. Mosquitos in cities and towns surrounding Newton have recently tested positive for West Nile Virus.

During these hot, humid summer days when mosquitos flourish, here are some simple steps to protect ourselves and our family from bites and the illnesses they can cause:

- Use an <u>EPA-registered insect repellent</u> when outdoors
- Wear long-sleeved clothing
- Schedule outdoor activities to avoid the hours from dusk to dawn –peak mosquito times
- Repair damaged screens
- Remove standing water around your residence since mosquitos can breed in even small amounts of water.

Between June 13 and July 10, we had a total of five "breaking and entering" of houses in the city. In all five instances, the victims were of Asian descent. Thankfully, no one was at home during the break ins (which all occurred during the day and on weekends with money, jewelry and handbags being the primary target).

The Newton Police Department is reporting one additional home break in this week. The homeowner reported this latest one which occurred on River Street in West Newton on Monday, July 12. The homeowner in this case was not Asian (and no one was at home).

Altogether, Newton has had 46 residential break ins year to date in 2021. (There are a total of 54 break ins so far in 2021 including those at commercial properties.)



During the pandemic when people were home, the year to date number was considerably lower (19) and in 2019, the year to date number was 36.

Newton Police and our Detective Bureau are continuing to actively investigate all of these break ins. They are looking for similarities among the victims, trying to lift fingerprints, canvassing each neighborhood by knocking on doors and speaking with residents, seeking more video footage, adding directed patrols (104 in the area of the five break ins involving Asian families, and 2,409 anti-crime related patrols citywide during that period). Yesterday afternoon Chief John Carmichael and Lt. Bruce Apotheker joined Michelle Luo, Co-President of the Chinese American Association of Newton, to speak with residents in the Country Club Road area of Oak Hill where a break-in occurred on July 10. NPD is also working with law enforcement partners throughout the area, including Middlesex County District Attorney Marian Ryan.

NPD recommends several precautions we can all take to help safeguard ourselves and our property:

- Lock the doors and windows of your home and car.
- Tell a trusted neighbor or friend when you are away so they can check on your home.
- Notify the post office to stop your mail when you are away, and stop newspaper deliveries so they don't pile up on your doorstep or driveway. (You can put a vacation stop on the TAB delivery <a href="here">here</a>, or call the TAB at 1-888-697-2737.)
- Remove any ladders or furniture from your yard that could be used to climb to a second story window or balcony.
- Get a timer to turn on lights when you are away, and consider adding motion detecting lights outside your home.

- Leave a battery powered radio on when you're gone so it sounds like people are home.
- Consider getting an alarm system, a security camera or ring camera to video record people who are on your property or who come to your door.

Having your home broken into is traumatic under any circumstances; add that the victims may have been purposely targeted because they are Asian, and it's beyond upsetting.

These suspects are stealing some things that are valuable but replaceable, but also family heirlooms and sentimental possessions that can never be replaced. Most of all, for the victims and so many other Newtonians, they have stolen the sense of security and safety that is so essential.

In addition to taking steps to make our homes more secure, we can also work together to make our neighborhoods safer.

Let's all do our jobs as neighbors. Meet the people who live next door and across the street, exchange phone numbers, watch out for each other, and take care of one another.

Let's use these break ins to build bridges. With the pandemic winding down, let's get back to the great Newton tradition of having neighborhood block parties. Fill out a Block Party form with NPD <a href="here">here</a> and Newton's DPW crews will drop off barricades to block off your street.
