



FY2023-FY2027 CIP

Summary



- CIP includes 222 new and continuing projects
- Investment of \$387 million during the FY2023 FY2027 five-year period (including \$8 million to be docketed during the remainder of this FY)
- Includes 41 projects with all or some funding approved totaling \$127 million
- Substantive changes were to the CIP compared to FY22 Plan approved in June
- Eight projects were added
- Many updates were made to project descriptions, funding, time schedules and priorities.

Athletic Field Projects

Major Project Holds From FY2022 - FY2026 CIP

- Newton Early Childhood Program (at renovated 687 Watertown Street)
 - Project was ready to bid in Spring when put on hold
 - Project bid and construction began in September
- Lincoln-Eliot at 150 Jackson Road
 - Project was in feasibility stage when put on hold
 - Design re-initiated. Design enrollment and classroom # set by School Committee
- Children's Room Expansion at Newton Free Library
 - Project was ready to bid in Spring when put on hold
 - Project bid and construction began in September
- Countryside/Franklin/Ward/Underwood/Horace Mann Elementary School Renovations
 - All planning for these projects was put on hold in Spring. MSBA submission work continues for 2021.
 - MSBA accepted Countryside into Eligibility Period. \$1.25 million in APRA funds for Feasibility Study
 - Planning for other projects and studies will resume shortly




Burr, McGrath and Brown/Oak Hill Athletic Field Renovations



- Design/Engineering Funded (\$420k) by CPC and approved by Council
- These 3 grass fields are high priority
- Albemarle Field Project already in the CIP
- Forte Park and Braceland Field are also in high priority category

Newton South Brandeis Field Lights

- Late High School start time has helped create an afternoon/evening/night-time field crunch
- Brandeis Field has synthetic turf that withstands high levels of use
- Agreement will be reached between Parks, Recreation & Culture, NPS, and youth leagues on shared usage




Newton South Field Map

New City Park at 150 Jackson Road

- First new City park in decades
- @2 acres at north end of larger Lincoln-Eliot School Project site
- Park designed for school and community children use, growing number of local older residents, and others
- Increase local tree canopy (and keep small existing forest)
- Improve stormwater runoff from site
- City applying for state and local grants



Marty Sender Greenway Trail (Auburndale) – Phase 2



Phase 1:

- From the clubhouse to the intersection aligned with Chaske Avenue
- Distance: Approximately <u>0.2 Miles</u>
- Improve accessibility to 4 outlook areas facing the cove
- A large portion cuts through the City's floodplain
- Phase funded by CDBG
- Construction out to bid in October, 2021

Phase 2:

- From the Chaske Avenue intersection to Commonwealth Avenue
- Distance: Approximately <u>0.25 Miles</u>
- Traverses the confluence of wooded wetlands and the city's flood plain at the rear of Lyons Park
- Requires planning and ConComm approval to address path through muddy conditions at the rear of Lyons Park
- CPC funding eligible


Cabot Park Improvements



- Parks, Recreation & Culture project in cooperation with City ADA Coordinator and Public Buildings (\$)
- \$100,000 allocation from remainder of Cabot School funds
- Well-used basketball facilities need replacement
- Accessible pathway(s) needed from Parkview Ave area

Newton Center for Active Living (NewCAL)

- Site now chosen
- New building option chosen
- 250+ public meetings held so far
- Mid-2025 opening date, maybe earlier
- \$16.65 million in CIP (bond funded)
- Temp home options for Senior Services under review











Transportation Network Improvement Program




Cold-in-Place Recycling Process for Chestnut Street Paving

Focus Areas



Annual Target by In-House Crews:

- Fix 2 miles existing
- Install 2 miles new

Sidewalk Condition Inventory and Plan

- DPW is completing an inventory of all sidewalks/accessible ramps
- Inventory done by mid-2022
- Then develop a sidewalk/accessible ramp prioritized list, based on asset management criteria (like roads)
- Prioritization plan expected before end of 2022.






- CIP Book Details Street Tree Program planting plan 2022-2027

- Forestry Program staff set to complete Citywide inventory of trees in 2022






Water System Capital Improvement Program

Other CIP and Project Highlights

- Newton South Artificial Turf Replacement funds moved into FY23
- Newton North Artificial Turf Replacement funds moved into FY25
- Building Adaptations Program (\$1.8m in ARPA funds)
 - Police HQ Ventilation
 - Fire Stations #1 and #2 Ventilation
 - City Hall, War Memorial Ventilation
- Move of Emergency Dispatch from Police HQ to Fire HQ
 - Better facilities for staff doing difficult job
 - Frees up current Dispatch area for other Police needs
- Trails and Accessible Pathways
 - \$150,000 in ARPA funds for projects on Parks/Conservation Lands
 - Creation of new Trails Advisory Committee as outcome of OSR Plan
- Commercial and Residential Water Meter Replacement Program
 - 150 large commercial meters to be replaced
 - All 26,000 residential and small commercial meters, and AMI systems to be replaced over few years
 - New customer portal to be created for easy water use/bill tracking
