
# Newton Youth Commission

### February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month!

Data from CDC's Youth Risk Behavior Survey and the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey indicate that:

- Nearly 1 in 11 female and approximately 1 in 14 male high school students report having experienced physical dating violence in the last year.
- About 1 in 8 female and 1 in 26 male high school students report having experienced sexual dating violence in the last year.
- 26% of women and 15% of men who were victims of contact sexual violence, physical violence, and/or stalking by an intimate partner in their lifetime first experienced these or other forms of violence by that partner before age 18.

# The More You Know! Newton School Committee & City Council Summary

The **City Council** is Newton's legislative branch of municipal government and is made up of 24 members: sixteen at-large Councilors and eight Ward Councilors. Councilors are elected every two years. The Council meets twice per month, on the first and third Mondays of each month. In addition, the Council has six Standing Committees that meet once per month: Finance, Land Use, Programs & Services, Public Facilities, Public Safety & Transportation and Zoning & Planning. Topics include permitting, appointments, budgets, zoning ordinance, and land use. For more information and specific details please visit: **Newton City Council** 

The **Newton School Committee** consists of nine voting members: one person is elected (citywide) from each of Newton's eight wards and the Mayor serves as an ex-officio member. Local School Committees derive their authority from the Constitution of Massachusetts, statutes, and the regulations of the State Board of Education (newton.k21.ma.us/page/108). During the month of January, the School Committee discussed the Lincoln-Eliot School Building Project, reviewed elementary & middle school updates, received recommendations from the Medical Advisory Group, and updated Newton Public Schools COVID testing strategy from pool testing to at-home weekly rapid antigen testing.
