Mayor's Update



Our COVID-19 data this week continues to show improvement. We had 185 new confirmed cases in Newton over the past seven days from May 26 to June 1, nearly 100 fewer than the 281 new cases over the previous seven days.


As of Tuesday, May 31, Newton-Wellesley Hospital reports there are a total of 19 patients who are hospitalized with COVID-19, and none of these patients are being cared for in the ICU. Approximately 50% of these patients are hospitalized primarily for COVID-19. Over the past week, the number of patients hospitalized with COVID-19 has ranged from as low as 11 and as high as 21, but the overall trend has been a slight decline over the past few weeks.

The data about Newton from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health's two-week tracking period from May 15 to 28 also shows positive cases heading down. Our incidence rate in Newton, which measures the number of cases per 100,000 population, is now at 43.1 compared to 54.2 last week. Our positivity rate is 7.4% of the 8,132 tests performed on Newton residents, compared to 8.1% (9,193 tests) last week.

We lost no one in Newton this week who died with COVID-19.

The latest MWRA wastewater tracking data from Tuesday, May 31 shows the curve is flattish or taking a small turn upward, but thankfully well below the peak of omicron in December/January. Click [here](#) to see all the data.

Newton Public Schools

The Newton Public Schools had 161 cases among students and 34 among staff from May 26 to June 1. (Over the previous seven days, there were 257 cases among students and 36 among staff.)




Newton Highlands Village Enhancement


