School Supplies & Backpacks

Clothing

Healthy Food

Every student in the NPS system can access free breakfast and lunch at their school. You can also visit Newton's <u>food pantries</u> and the <u>freedge</u> for free, healthy food! *If you are not currently receiving P-EBT benefits for your student, call the Social Services Department at 617-796-1420 to discuss eligibility.

Low-Cost Internet

Bats

Warm summer weather in mid-July through August is also the time when bats may make their way into the living spaces of our homes.

Most bats are harmless, but a very small percentage may carry rabies, which makes any direct contact with a bat cause for action. Rabies is a very serious viral disease that can be prevented by getting vaccinated after exposure.

If a person or pet has had contact with a bat, capture the bat without damaging its head so it can be tested for rabies. You can do this yourself, or call the non-emergency line at the Newton Police Department, 617-796-2100, to find out if an Animal Control Officer is available to capture the bat and transport it to a lab for testing. Private pest control companies also provide this service.

Monkeypox Update

On July 23, 2022, the World Health Organization (WHO) <u>declared the ongoing multi-country outbreak of monkeypox to be a public health emergency of international concern</u>. Since early May 2022, the WHO and US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), as well as state and local health departments, have been tracking an outbreak of monkeypox that has spread across multiple countries, including the US, that don't normally have cases of monkeypox. As of August 11, 2022, 31,800 cases have been confirmed worldwide, including 31,425 in countries that have not historically reported monkeypox. As of August 11, 2022, 10,392 cases have been confirmed in the US, including 174 in Massachusetts.

What is Monkeypox?

Monkeypox is part of the same family of viruses as smallpox, with similar, but milder symptoms. <u>Symptoms</u> include rash, fever, headache, muscle aches, swollen lymph nodes, chills, and exhaustion. Infections with the type of virus identified in this outbreak – the West African type – are rarely fatal.

How Does it Spread?

The monkeypox <u>virus spreads mostly through close</u>, <u>intimate contact</u> with someone who has monkeypox. At this time risk to the general public is low, but you should talk to your healthcare provider if you develop symptoms of monkeypox, even if you don't think you had contact with someone who has monkeypox. You can take steps to <u>prevent getting monkeypox</u> and <u>lower your risk during social gatherings and sex</u>.

Vaccines

Vaccines can help protect against monkeypox illness when properly administered before or soon after exposure. In the US, there is currently a limited supply of monkeypox vaccine. MA is following the CDC eligibility criteria which currently prioritize known contacts and those who are most at risk of exposure to an individual

with monkeypox. More information about monkeypox vaccination in MA can be found here

Mosquitoes



During these hot, humid summer days when mosquitos flourish, it's important to take precautions against bites that can cause illness. Mosquitoes in our area, including Newton, have recently tested positive for West Nile Virus (WNV). The WNV risk level for Newton has been raised to Moderate. The risk level in Newton for Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE), another mosquito borne illness, is currently listed as remote. You can monitor Newton's mosquito-borne disease risk level and the risk level in other Massachusetts communities here.


Here are some simple steps to protect yourself and your family from bites and the illnesses they can cause:

- Use an EPA-registered insect repellent when outdoors.
- Avoid scheduling outdoor activities from dusk to dawn during peak mosquito activity.
- Remove standing water around your residence since mosquitos can breed in even small amounts of water.

Save a Life. Be the Match!

We're helping to spread the word about the Be The Match campaign to help grow the registry of potential bone marrow donors. 70% of patients don't have a blood stem cell donor match in their family. A bone marrow transplant may be the best or only hope for someone who has been diagnosed with blood cancers, like leukemia and lymphoma, and other life-threatening diseases.

When you the join Be the Match Registry, your tissue type is added to the registry. If you're called to donate, the typical time commitment for the donation process is 20-30 hours spread out. Most adult donors (85%) are asked to provide blood stem cells collected from circulating blood and is similar to donating platelets or plasma. Some donors (15%) are asked to provide blood stem cells collected from the donor's pelvic bone while under anesthesia. You can join the registry today if you are between the ages of 18-40 years old and able to meet certain health guidelines.

To join the Be The Match registry, use the following link: https://my.bethematch.org/CityofNewton. Those who register will receive a free cheek swab kit in the mail. After swabbing your cheek, you simply mail the swab with the pre-paid envelope and you will be added into the registry.
