C-19 Booster Clinics

With updated COVID-19 boosters now available to protect us against the newer Omicron variants, our partners at the Holtzman Medical Group will be providing five vaccine clinics in Newton.

Our Newton Health and Human Services staff is working with Holtzman on final details so stay tuned. I'll provide dates, location(s) and scheduling information as soon as it's available.

What are the updated booster vaccines?

On Sept. 1, the CDC issued <u>recommendations</u> for COVID-19 boosters after the FDA authorized <u>updated booster formulas</u> from both Pfizer and Moderna. These new boosters contain a formula that both boosts immunity against the original coronavirus strain and also protects against the newer Omicron variants that account for most of the current cases.

Why do I need a booster?

Staying up to date on vaccines, including boosters, is the most effective way to prevent serious illness, hospitalization, and death from COVID-19. Vaccine protection decreases over time, so boosters restimulate the immune system and increase vaccine effectiveness. Boosters are an important defense, even if you've already had COVID.

Who should get the new booster?

Pfizer's updated booster shot is recommended for individuals 12 and older, and Moderna's updated booster shot is recommended for adults 18 and older. Everyone age 12 and older is eligible for an updated booster dose at least two (2) months after their last COVID-19 vaccine (either since their last booster dose, or since completing their primary series).

Dr. Ashish Jha said yesterday, "If you've had a recent infection or were recently vaccinated, it's reasonable to wait a few months."

People can get either the Pfizer or Moderna updated booster regardless of whether their primary series or most recent dose was with Pfizer, Moderna, Novavax, or the Johnson & Johnson vaccine. Questions about which brand is right for you? Reach out to your healthcare provider.

Need to find out when you had your last booster or provide proof of vaccination?

Request, view, and print your vaccination records and your COVID-19 card from the official Massachusetts Immunization Information System (MIIS) at myvaxrecords.mass.gov.

Where can I get vaccinated?

In addition to the Holtzman clinics being scheduled, boosters are available at many other locations in Newton and across the state. Check <u>vaxfinder.mass,gov</u> to find a clinic and schedule a vaccine or booster.

Newton COVID-19 Case Update

We had 227 new confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Newton over the past three weeks since Aug. 18 when we last reported this data.

The latest incidence rate in Newton as of Aug. 31 is 14.6 cases per 100,000 population, up from 12.6 during the previous two-week State testing period. Our positivity rate is currently 6.2% of the 3,304 tests performed on Newton residents returning positive, up from the previous 5.0% (3,572 tests).

The number of family, friends and neighbors in Newton who have died with COVID-19 since the pandemic began remains at 206.

Plans to build a senior center at the site of the current facility on Walnut Street in Newtonville received final approvals from the City Council in early August and we're beyond thrilled to be moving forward towards a ribbon cutting in the Summer or Fall of 2024 for our new center.

We have been hard at work planning for an interim site for the senior center programs and services to move to during construction.

Newton Highlands will be our primary temporary home during construction of our new senior center.

Staff will welcome you to small and medium sized programs at the Brigham House, 20 Hartford Street (next to the municipal parking lot), and larger ones at the Hyde Community Center gym, 90 Lincoln Street. The Hyde is familiar to many of us since the Senior Center has been offering programs there already through a generous partnership with the Hyde and its Executive Director John Rice and the Hyde Board of Directors.

We also will be using a few other space such as the War Memorial at City Hall, the Newton Free Library and Park, Recreation and Culture facilities for some programs.

We plan to close most of the programs at the current Senior Center at 345 Walnut Street on Thursday Nov. 10. We expect to reopen at the Brigham House and the Hyde a week later on Monday Nov. 28.

Newton's Economic Stability/Mobility Initiative

We are investing \$1.75 million of the City of Newton's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to support the economic stability and mobility of individuals and families with limited resources who were hurt most by the pandemic, disproportionally people of color. The Newton Community Needs Assessment, completed this past winter, identified this as a critical need.

Working with our Advisory Committee and our partners at UMass Donahue Institute (UMDI), we've reached another milestone in turning this plan into action.

Join us on Thursday, Sept. 15 at 6:00 p.m. for an Information Session led by Christina Citino, Senior Research Manager UMDI. Along with our Health & Human Services and Housing staff, Christina has helped lead this effort, guiding the Advisory Committee in its work defining the program and developing a Request for Proposals (RFP) to identify partners in implementing this critical work.

At the meeting, Christina will share information about the process and the Advisory Committee's work to date. Following a short presentation about the status of the initiative and next steps, we'll be answering questions and listening to ideas and comments.

Thank You to Nicole Freedman

I have such a mix of emotions as I announce Newton's Director of Transportation Planning Nicole Freedman has accepted a new position as Executive Director of the New England Mountain Bike Association at the end of the month.

I am thrilled for Nicole as she embarks on a new professional adventure.

That said, we'll miss her a lot here in Newton.

During her six years, Nicole helped improve transit for so many of us. She was a driving force behind Newton in Motion, NewMo, helping to conceive, secure funding and launch our successful on-demand ride share program that first served seniors and now is citywide for everyone of all ages. NewMo is averaging 1,200 rides per week.

Nicole envisioned a network of bikes for rent across the City. She helped secure the necessary grant funding to bring first LimeBikes and then Bluebikes to Newton. Newton now has 16 Bluebikes stations across our City. We've also installed another 32 bike racks in seven village centers and another 74 at 18 schools.

Nicole helped advance the concept and implementation of "complete street" designs. This means having streets that work for drivers, pedestrians, bicyclists (and diners!). She most recently secured \$6 million in design and construction funding for a complete redesign of the Commonwealth Avenue Carriageway in Auburndale to create new linear parks and separated bike and pedestrian ways. She helped bring advance the bike friendly design and forthcoming construction improvements at Albemarle Park, the Washington Street Redesign Pilot, and shepherded the installation of nine miles of painted bike lanes across the City.

That's not all. During the pandemic, Nicole headed up the Newton Al Fresco dining and Project Pop Up initiatives.

Nicole has left an indelible mark on our City. For her vision, tenacity, grace, and enthusiasm, I am most grateful.

Affordable Housing Opportunity

The City of Newton is accepting applications for affordable homeownership for a 2-bedroom, 2-bath condominium (Apt. 106E) at 77 Court Street. Check it out at the open house this Sunday, Sept. 11, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Priced at \$273,390, the condo

has an open floor plan with 1,280 sq. ft of living space. The condominium fee is \$154 per month, and the buyer will also pay \$10.52 per thousand or \$244 per month in property taxes.

The unit is deed restricted to ensure permanent affordability. It will be made available through an application and lottery process and sold to a household with an income at or below 80% of the Area Median Income. The City of Newton is also offering a Down Payment/Closing Cost Assistance grant of \$10,000 to eligible applicants for the purchase. (See the maximum household income limits below.)
