- **High schoolers + young adults (ages 15-25):** Monday, October 17th*, 7-8pm Virtual event Register here (*rescheduled from the original October 4th)


Library docent hours: The City is also available at the Newton Free Library exhibit to help guide your visit and assist you with the feedback tool. We will be there:

The City is collecting input on proposed updates for the village center zoning until October 16.


Zoning is important because it regulates how land in Newton can be developed and what kinds of new buildings are allowed. For example, zoning can influence 2 store and business activity through 2 parking and density requirements, whether 2 green space or 2 public spaces are required in new developments, or the amount of 2 housing supply near 2 public transportation.



What is the city asking for input on? A set of proposed changes for the village center zoning, building upon the engagement takeaways from last summer. The Newton City Council's Zoning and Planning Committee (ZAP) have given City staff the green light to further refine and get community feedback. This includes the types of zoning districts for village centers, allowed heights and parking requirements.

How do community members give input? Give input through the online feedback tool: https://tinyurl.com/ZoningFeedbackTool. (*Click here for a PDF of the feedback tool, formatted for printing. Please note that this has lower visual quality than the online tool.)*

In addition, conversations will be facilitated in 3 main ways listed below:



(1) Library exhibit

Visit the Newton Free Library for the City's exhibit on the zoning proposals. It covers zoning history, each proposed zoning change, mapping and MBTA Communities, and how zoning changes are made in the city. It also has an engagement table for community members to sit at, discuss the exhibit, and submit their input through the feedback tool on their cell phone, personal laptop, or a library computer.

Location: Second floor, in Room C.

Hours: The exhibit is open at the same time as Newton Free Library's hours (click here.) See the hours that staff will be on-hand above.





Can't go to the library exhibit? Visit it 'virtually': Click here for the document version of the library exhibit. It includes a suggested agenda for guided discussion if using as a group for an in-person or virtual convening.

Image descriptions


Top image: Mayor Ruthanne Fuller and Councilor Pam Wright absorb information in the exhibit section on design standards.
