# **Mayor's Update**

# March 14, 2023: Vote on Override Proposal

Last Thursday, the City Council in a "Committee of the Whole" voted unanimously to put three Override questions on a ballot for Newtonians to decide on Tuesday, March 14, 2023.

The full City Council will meet this Monday, November 21 for a final vote.

In the weeks ahead, the City Council will also make decisions on early voting by mail and early in-person voting.



Residents will vote on three questions:

- Question 1: An operating override to fund Newton Public School student needs, street and sidewalk paving and safety improvements, tree planting and maintenance, park and recreational facility improvements and maintenance, improvements to Horace Mann Elementary, sustainability and climate resiliency, and Senior Services programming and operations.
- Question 2: A debt exclusion override to renovate or replace Countryside Elementary School.
- Question 3: A debt exclusion override to renovate or replace Franklin Elementary School.

The Council's "Committee of the Whole" also unanimously moved forward my proposal to expand our tax assistance/deferral programs for older residents, veterans and surviving spouses or minor children, and people who are disabled, as well as the City's Water and Sewer Discount program. I know how important it is to provide further relief to vulnerable residents. Find more information about these programs <a href="https://example.com/here/">here</a>.

The City Council's votes came after an extensive presentation on the City's finances by our Chief Financial Officer Maureen Lemieux, who was joined by our Chief Operating Officer Jonathan Yeo, Interim School Superintendent Kathy Smith, and Assistant School Superintendent Liam Hurley. CFO Lemieux's presentation focused on our revenues, expenses & capital investments, the City's general operating budget, our debt capacity, the one-time Federal pandemic funding, and other revenue sources.

#### Winter Overnight Parking Ban

The citywide Overnight Parking Ban will again go into effect this winter the week after next on Thursday, Dec. 1. It extends through Friday, March 31, 2022. During these four months, parking on City streets is prohibited from 2:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m.

Last winter, I and the City Council heard from those of you who wrote in to share how challenging the winter overnight parking ban can be.

When the Commonwealth was under the COVID-19 State of Emergency declared by Governor Baker, I was able to lift the ban to ease the burden on college students and family members home during the pandemic. During that winter, we found that we were still able to get cars off the streets during heavy snowstorms by declaring a snow emergency, so that our plows could clear our roadways curb to curb.

The COVID-19 State of Emergency ended in June 2021, so my ability as Mayor to lift the ban wasn't an option last winter or now. Any permanent changes to the parking ban need to be decided the City Council. I know the City Council continues to consider what changes may be appropriate. Council President Susan Albright and Councilor Andrea Kelley recently put forward a docket item for the full Council to discuss modifying the Overnight Parking Ban to help alleviate the burden on residents without a place to park their car during the winter.

Are you looking for a place to park your vehicles from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. from Dec. 1 through March 31? Free Municipal Parking Lot stickers are available to residents from the Newton Police Department. You need a valid driver's license and vehicle registration. (Proof of residency is also required if your car is not registered in Newton.) Parking permits are given out on a first-come first-serve basis. Where are our municipal parking lots? Lexington/Melrose Streets (same lot - two entrances); Cherry/Elm Streets (same lot - two entrances); Chapel Street; Adams

Street; Austin Street; Cypress Street; Langley Road; Pearl Street; Richardson Street; Pelham Street; Hartford Street; and Chestnut Street (angled spots at end of Chestnut St in Pettee Square). Click <a href="here">here</a> for map locations of municipal parking lots.

Please know that if we have to declare a Snow Emergency, the municipal parking lots become unavailable (since we need to plow them). For most nights in the winter, though, they are an option.

#### **Update on Leaves/Yard Waste**

### Collection

With the tremendously high volumes of leaves and yard waste set out at the curb at this time of year, our DPW yard waste collection team is not always able to complete our regular curbside collection routes in one day.

Sometimes we are picking up your leaves a day late. Please leave the leaves out and we'll be swinging by (and our apology for the inconvenience). If it is *two* days past your regular collection day and yard waste is still at the curb, please ping us and report a missed yard waste pickup either by calling 311 or on our online reporting system <a href="here">here</a>.

Alternatively, through Thursday, December 9, residents can drop off yard waste at our Resource Recovery Center at 115 Rumford Avenue. Residents can drop-off yard waste bags or empty their own barrels during regular hours (Monday-Friday 7 a.m. – 2:30 p.m. and Saturdays 9 a.m. – 1 p.m.). Please know that only yard waste that meets the <u>guidelines</u> will be accepted and we cannot accept any yard waste from contractors.

Looking ahead, we will be picking up Christmas trees (undecorated only!!) during the first two weeks in January.

# State Economic Development Bill Includes Support for Projects in Newton

After many months of back-and-forth between the Baker Administration and the state legislature, the Economic Development Bill that was finally approved included funding for important Newton projects. Thanks go to Senator Cindy Creem, Representative Kay Khan and Representative Ruth Balser for sponsoring amendments totaling \$2,095,000 to make Newton a more sustainable, fun, and pedestrian & bike friendly City.

We're grateful for:

- \$150,000 towards our Newton Highlands Village Enhancement Project
- \$150,000 for the purchase of additional bike share stations
- \$70,000 for the City of Newton to expand our composting program and make some composting starter kits available to residents free of charge

- \$75,000 towards the design and construction of our new <u>Spears Park</u> community garden
- \$400,000 towards the replacement of our Gath Memorial Pool at Albemarle
- \$1,250,000 to install a <u>bridge and shared-use path</u> across the Charles River at Christina Street (just off of Needham Street) to the conservation area in Needham
- \$75,000 for the Commonwealth's Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) to develop a landscape management plan for the Charles River conservation area along Quinobequin Road

A few months ago, we let everyone know that Representative John Lawn successfully sponsored an amendment to the FY2023 state budget for \$200,000 to improve Coletti-Magni Park in Nonantum and Senator Creem sponsored a \$75,000 amendment to support our NewMo transportation program.

Huge thanks to our state delegation for championing projects for Newton at the State House.
