Disappointing News from MBTA

The City of Newton was officially notified by MBTA officials that their grant application for construction funding of our three commuter rail stations in Auburndale, West Newton and Newtonville was not included in the latest round of federal All Stations Accessibility Program (ASAP) grant awards.

This is disappointing news for the people of Newton and beyond who rely on the Framingham/Worcester commuter rail line. The news is a particular blow to

people with disabilities as these three stations are impossible for people with physical disabilities to access due to numerous, steep stairs.

The cost of the design work for the three stations is fully funded and the MBTA is approaching the 75% design phase.

The grant would have funded up to 80% or \$132 million of the \$170 million cost of construction to replace the three stations featuring fully accessible, high-level side platforms, elevators and accessible pathways to each platform.

These new stations will be a gamechanger for commuters living or working in Newton, improving frequency, accessibility and reliability on this crucial line that connects Worcester with Boston and may even extend to the Berkshires.

Congressman Jake Auchincloss has been working to include \$7 million for the construction in the omnibus appropriations bill winding through Congress this week. This federal bill will be debated and hopefully finalized, with the project funding, before the end of the year.

I will work with Congressman Auchincloss, our delegation at the State House and City Councilors to support the MBTA in reapplying for the next round of federal station accessibility grants. This is my top priority for funding from the State and I will continue to work with the MBTA and with incoming Gov. Healey and her administration to fund construction of these vital commuter rail stations.

Check Fraud

The Newton Police Department is continuing to see a significant jump in the number of reports of fraudulent checks and they believe the thefts are primarily due to "mailbox fishing."

What is mailbox fishing? Thieves gain access to U.S. Post Office Mailboxes and steal mail. They then comb through the letters looking for checks and other forms of money or personal information. They use a solvent to wash the original writing off the check so they can easily alter the dollar amount and payee. Next, they typically ask a middleman to deposit the check on their behalf in exchange for a cut of the stolen funds.

Victims of this scam can end up losing hundreds, if not thousands of dollars. In addition, they face the real hassle of closing bank accounts and reopening new ones.

How can you protect yourself?

- Use security pens with specially formulated gel ink that embeds itself to the paper fibers to help prevent against check washing and document fraud.
- Pay bills electronically. For example, the City of Newton offers secure, online payment on our website at newtonma.gov for City bills. (Sign up to make your payments online here). Prefer to pay with a check? The payment drop box in the front circle at City Hall (1000 Commonwealth Avenue) is video monitored 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Payments can also be made in person at the Treasury Department on the first floor of City Hall during business hours, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- Keep check stock and any blank checks in a safe place.
- Never sign checks in advance while leaving the amount and payee blank.
- Use mail boxes inside United States Postal Service Offices.
- Check your accounts to make sure checks written are cashed for the intended amounts.

If you become a victim of mail theft or check fraud, report the incident to Newton Police at 617-796-2100. Be mindful, however, that these crimes are exceptionally difficult to solve.

If you see a downed power line or pole, please report it to Eversource at 800-592-2000 and stay away from the hazard until officials make the area safe for everyone. With many of us traveling for the holiday weekend, please remember to never drive near, under or over a downed power line.

Holiday Wellness

It feels like all of us know someone under the weather. Whether the flu, RSV or COVID-19, respiratory infections are hitting our region hard.

MWRA tracking shows COVID-19 in wastewater has jumped since November 1 (see the latest chart here), and the CDC community tracker now rates Middlesex County as Medium and advises people at high risk of getting very sick to wear a mask when indoors in public.

With the holidays here, is if safe to gather indoors with friends and extended family?

Yes, according to Newton's Dr. Ashish Jha, the White House Coronavirus Response Coordinator. He notes that we're at the point where it's safe to get together in groups, but "you still have things to do."

Those things include testing, treatment and getting the updated booster, Jha told ABC's "This Week" on Sunday. (Remember, though, if you're not feeling well, stay home.)
