Mayor's Update



Armory Milestone

The redevelopment of the West Newton Armory on Washington Street into 100% permanently affordable housing achieved a major milestone on Wednesday night. The project received unanimous approval from the members of the City's Zoning Board of Appeals for its Chapter 40B Comprehensive Permit at its third public hearing.

This achievement is the culmination of nearly four years of strategic planning, collaboration, and careful attention

to the many aspects of sensitively revitalizing an iconic building to serve people needing deeply affordable apartments. I am particularly grateful for the hard work and persistence of our Director of Housing and Community Development Amanda Berman and Housing Program Manager Eamon Bencivengo.

In 2019, the Massachusetts National Guard decommissioned the 100-year old Armory and transferred management to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The State then offered Newton the opportunity to purchase the Armory for \$1 if we redeveloped it into 100% affordable housing. I enthusiastically seized on this opportunity and sought, and subsequently received, State and City Council approval to pursue this goal.

In the summer of 2021,

the City released a Request For Proposal to solicit proposals from qualified affordable housing developers to undertake this redevelopment project. I formed a nine-member Review Committee to examine and interview the seven proponents the City received. Following the group's recommendation, in December 2021 I selected Metro West Collaborative Development/Civico Development to partner with us in the redevelopment of the Armory.

Metro West Collaborative Development is a Newton-based non-profit affordable housing developer. They have a long and successful track record of creating, financing and managing affordable housing. Civico Development is a for-profit housing developer that has built community-focused mixed-income housing throughout the Boston region.

The approval is for 43 apartments for intergenerational family housing. These apartments will be deeply affordable to individuals and families with incomes ranging between 30% and 60% of our area median income. (A family of four earning 30% of the area median income is \$42,050 while a family of four earning 60% of the area median income is \$84,120

The historic front of the Armory will be preserved with an addition built behind it. Parking will be provided underground. The project will be environmentally sensitive, with the entire site designed and constructed to achieve Enterprise Green Communities standards and the new residential portion built in accordance with Passive House standards.

To help Metro West/Civico achieve this vision, the City has allocated nearly \$5 million in combined CPA, HOME, CDBG, and Inclusionary Zoning funds to the project. With an estimated total cost of \$25 million dollars, Metro West/Civico is also seek financing from private, state, and federal sources, with the Low Income Housing Tax Credit program being especially important. Having received the approval of the Zoning Board of Appeals, the application for Tax Credit financing will be submitted next week.

The next milestone is the start of construction. We anticipate groundbreaking in Spring 2025 with a ribbon-cutting scheduled for the Fall 2026.

One thing that is striking is that even with dedicated, experienced people leading our effort and continuous attention, moving from the vision of the Armory as affordable housing to the reality of move-in day will take seven years.

Celebrate 100,000 NewMo Rides With a Free One

NewMo, Newton's shared ride transportation system, is celebrating its 100,000th ride and we couldn't be prouder. NewMo launched three years ago as a transportation service for seniors and we expanded in October 2021 to serve everyone.

More than 12,000 people have registered to use NewMo. In the last 12 months alone, ridership doubled with the system now providing more than 300 trips each weekday.

This flexible, friendly and affordable service makes it possible for people to get to appointments, to work, to public transit stations, and to school without the expense or environmental impacts of using a personal vehicle.

Interestingly, NewMo is particularly helpful to people with limited options and tight budgets. NewMo users earn less, own fewer vehicles, and have fewer options for transportation than Newton's overall population.

 56% of NewMo users come from households earning less than 80% of the area's median income (AMI) for a family of three (\$126,000), and 39% are from households earning less than 50% of the AMI for a family of three (\$53,350).

- 27% live in households without a car.
- 19% say they chose NewMo because they had "no viable alternative."

Survey and trip data also show that NewMo supports critical trips, helps more people access transit, and provides transportation to school or jobs.

- 49% of seniors using NewMo are going to medical appointments.
- 32% of non-seniors are going to jobs.
- 23% of non-seniors are connecting to transit, allowing more of us to access public transportation without a car and from further away.
- Newton North and Newton South High Schools are among the top destinations.

NewMo is also having a positive impact on carbon emissions.

- 30-40% of trips are shared.
- All of the vehicles, with the exception of the wheelchair accessible vans, are low-or no- emissions electric or hybrid vehicles. NewMo intends to transition the remaining hybrids to full electric vehicles this year. (We'll continue to use the two gas-powered wheelchair accessible vans until good EV models are available.)

Still haven't taken your first ride?

NewMo operates everywhere in Newton from 7:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. For those over 60 years old, NewMo also operates from 9 a.m. to noon on the weekends and provides door-to-door service (instead of corner-to-corner service). **The first five trips are free for all new users**. After that, all rides are \$2, or 50 cents for riders with low incomes who qualify. (To apply for the low-income rate, contact Nfreedman@newtonma.gov)

Signing up on a smartphone and booking a ride is simple. Download the NewMo app, create an account, select a payment method, enter the requested information, and you're ready to book a ride. Rides can also be booked by telephone. Call 617-655-8019 to request your ride.

To commemorate the 100,000th ride, NewMo is offering everyone one free ride until February 15. The free ride is automatic, so go ahead and book your ride.

COVID-19

There's an encouraging dip in the latest MWRA wastewater tracking data which has been an accurate predictor of COVID-19 case trends since the pandemic began. After an uptick over the holidays, the latest seven-day average shows a significant decline. (See the latest MWRA data here.)

While COVID-19 levels in wastewater are declining, we know the virus is still circulating. The CDC community tracker now categorizes Middlesex County (where Newton is located) as Yellow – or in the medium risk category.),In the yellow category, the CDC recommends that people at high risk of getting very sick wear a high-quality mask when indoors in public. Covid-19 Booster Clinics

Additional City sponsored, free COVID-19 booster clinics are available in Newton through the end of the month.

The Newton Department of Public Health and Human Services is continuing its partnership with Holtzman Medical Group to offer the updated, bivalent COVID-19 booster vaccine.

These clinics are open to anyone ages 6 months and older (ages 6 months - 5 years will be Moderna only).

People who recently had COVID may consider delaying the booster by 3 months from symptom onset or positive test. Learn more about the COVID-19 vaccine here.

The latest evidence for the effectiveness of the bivalent booster is compelling, according to Dr. Ashish Jha. On Monday, he provided statistics that people 65 and older who had the bivalent booster had an 81% reduction in hospitalizations and an 86% reduction in death compared to people 65 and older who did not get the updated booster.

Free COVID-19 Consultations on Treatment

Exploring Concepts for Dudley Road Parcel

We are pursuing discussions with NOW Communities/Civico Development to explore their concept of preserving open space with clustered housing on 15 acres between Dudley and Brandeis Roads.

The City's team reviewed nine potential partnership proposals as we explore options for the land adjacent to Newton South High School. The current owners of the land have given the City a specific period of time to consider purchasing the property at an asking price of \$24 million.

The NOW Communities/Civico Development proposal that the team chose is responsive to our goals. Their preliminary site plan envisions open space with permanent conservation restrictions mixed with a new residential cluster of homes, pedestrian connections between Brandeis and Dudley Roads, and a set-aside for City/school facility expansion needs. The housing idea contemplates 75 to 125 total units. There is a mix of single and 3-to-6-unit buildings of 1.5 and 2.5 stories, all of which would be for home ownership. Twenty percent would be made affordable, with 10% available to households at 80% AMI and 10% to households at 110% AMI, in line with the City's inclusionary zoning requirements.

Our next steps in the exploration phase includes further due diligence on the site, financial feasibility analysis by the NOW/Civico team, a continuing dialogue with the City on a potential partnership scenario, and conversations with the owner.

Planning the Future of 1-95/128

Interested in the future of I-95/128 from Newton to Lexington? MassDOT (with input from communities, including Newton, along this busy highway corridor) is coming forward with draft recommendations for long-term changes.

MassDOT's study has been formally underway since 2021. They have been considering new transit connections, highway ramp changes, additional bike and pedestrian trails, and new land uses such as parkland, workplaces and more.

Plans Underway for Override Voting

Mail-In Ballots

Ballot applications to vote by mail in the Tuesday, March 14 Override Election (as well as a possible primary election in September for City Councilors and School Committee members and the November general election) are expected to begin arriving at every Newton voters' home the first week in February.

Completed and signed applications can be mailed to the Newton City Clerk's Office (1000 Commonwealth Ave., Newton, MA 02459) or placed in one of the two secure drop boxes in front of City Hall. If you prefer to vote by mail, please try and get your application back to the Clerk's Office as soon as possible so election staff have time to process your application and mail a ballot to your home.

Election staff in the City Clerk's office expect to begin sending *ballots* for the override election to voters who completed applications the week of February 13.

Early In-Person Voting: 5 days in March

Plans are still being finalized for early in-person voting. The Newton Election Commission voted this week to schedule five days of early, in-person voting at City Hall in early March. The recommendation will be presented to the City

Council's Programs and Services Committee on Wednesday, Jan. 18 with a vote of the full City Council expected on Feb. 6. Stay tuned for the finalized dates of early, in-person voting.

Election Day: Tuesday, March 14

Polls across the City will be open on election day, March 14, from 7:00 a.m. 8:00 p.m.

How Will the Override Impact Newton Public Schools?

Interim School Superintendent Kathy Smith and her team are now preparing two budgets to present to the School Committee on Monday, Jan. 23. One will show the impact of providing the \$4.5 million that will be available to NPS if the override passes, and the other will show the impact to the Newton Public Schools if the override fails.
